A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO URBAN AGRICULTURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 In recent years, Hawaii has moved away from SECTION 1. 2 producing its own food and has become more reliant on imported agricultural commodities. By some estimates, over eighty-five 3 per cent of the food consumed in Hawaii is imported. 4 places Hawaii in a precarious position when facing the dilemma 5 of food security, which is exacerbated by the increased costs of 6 7 transportation due to the rising price of petroleum. faces the further challenge of limited land and water resources, 8 9 two components that are critical to growing our own food. 10 However, the development of new technologies has begun to shift the traditional notions of where farming can occur. 11 12 Advances in aquaponics, hydroponics, and soil-based aerated container systems have made it possible to grow food in unique 13 places, including urban regions. These advances in agricultural 14 technologies have made it possible to create productive growing 15 16 areas on commercial and institutional rooftops. In Hawaii, a successful example of this concept can be seen on the roof of 17

the Castle Medical Center, where a garden has been created to



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- 1 supplement dietary needs of patients and staff with fresh
- 2 wholesome produce. This was accomplished utilizing proficient
- 3 engineering practices that did not compromise the structural
- 4 integrity of the medical center's roof or require extensive
- 5 drainage improvements.
- In the governor's new day plan, two of the guiding
- 7 principles for agriculture production are food security and
- 8 innovative agricultural practices. Rooftop agricultural
- 9 production would perfectly abide by those principles. One of
- 10 the best venues to publicly showcase this concept is the fifth
- 11 floor of the Hawaii state capitol building. It has many of the
- 12 attributes that would allow for a successful rooftop garden and
- 13 would serve as an excellent example to be emulated throughout
- 14 Hawaii.
- The purpose of this Act is to create rooftop gardens on the
- 16 fifth floor of the Hawaii state capitol building to promote
- 17 agricultural innovation and greater food security.
- 18 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 19 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$250,000, or so much
- 20 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 for the
- 21 development and implementation of a rooftop garden on the fifth
- 22 floor of the Hawaii state capitol building; provided that:

1	(1)	The garden will not compromise the structural
2		integrity of the building in any way or require
3		additional, extensive drainage improvements;
4	(2)	This appropriation shall not lapse at the end of the
5		fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; and
6	(3)	Any balance of the appropriation that is not
7		encumbered as of December 31, 2015, shall lapse to the
8		credit of the general fund on that date.
9	The	sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
10	agricultu	are for the purposes of this Act.
11	SECT	TION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2013.
