A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO VOTING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the age 1 qualification to vote in any state or local election in this 2 3 State is eighteen years of age. However, there is a growing 4 movement to lower the voting age even further. Youth suffrage proponents cite other countries that have a voting age lower 5 6 than the age of eighteen, such as Austria, Brazil, Cuba, 7 Indonesia, and Nicaragua. Proponents of lowering the voting age 8 in the United States argue that if sixteen- and seventeen-year-9 olds are old enough to pay income taxes, legally marry, or 10 obtain a license to drive a car, then they should accordingly 11 have the right to vote. Furthermore, if youth are allowed to 12 vote, the voter turnout among the youth will improve and 13 education about democracy would be better served. 14 In May 2013, the Takoma Park city council in Maryland 15 passed a series of city charter amendments relating to the 16 city's voting and election laws, including an amendment to allow 17 sixteen- and seventeen-year-olds to vote in city elections.

- 1 States to lower its voting age from eighteen to sixteen years of
- 2 age. The mayor of Takoma Park hoped that lowering the voting
- 3 age would help residents establish a lifelong habit of voting.
- 4 The purpose of this Act is to lower to the age
- 5 qualification for voting from eighteen to sixteen years of age
- 6 in all state and local elections only.
- 7 SECTION 2. Chapter 11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
- 8 by adding two new sections to be appropriately designated and to
- 9 read as follows:
- 10 "§11- Changing register; registered voter age; prior to
- 11 election day. (a) A registered voter who has reached the age
- 12 of eighteen years or who is seventeen years of age and will be
- 13 eighteen years of age by the date of the next federal, state, or
- 14 local election may notify the clerk to change the register to
- 15 allow that person to vote at any federal, state, or local
- 16 election pursuant to section 11-12.
- 17 (b) Upon notification to change the register pursuant to
- 18 subsection (a), if the clerk has evidence indicating that a
- 19 voter's registration should be changed to allow that person to
- 20 vote at any federal, state, or local election, the clerk shall
- 21 notify that person by first-class mail of the intent to change
- 22 the registration. The notification shall include:

2	(2)	Any evidence indicating that the age of the registered
3		voter is less than eighteen years of age according to

- 2 polling places in the county shall take applications from voters
- 3 who have reached the age of eighteen years since the last
- 4 election on the day of election.
- 5 (b) Any person who has attained the age of eighteen years
- 6 and is eligible to vote at the federal, state, and local
- 7 elections pursuant to section 11-12 may apply on a form
- 8 prescribed by the chief elections officer on the day of the
- 9 election. The register shall be updated, and the person shall
- 10 be eligible to vote at the federal, state, and local elections

- 8 SECTION 5. Section 11-12, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 9 amended to read as follows:
- 10 "\$11-12 Age; place of registering. (a) Every person who
- 11 has reached the age of eighteen years or who is seventeen years
- 12 of age and will be eighteen years of age by the date of the next
- 13 federal, state, or local election, and is otherwise qualified to
- 14 register may do so for that election. The person shall then be
- 15 listed upon the appropriate county general register and precinct
- 16 list. No person shall register or vote in any other precinct
- 17 than that in which the person resides except as provided in
- 18 section 11-21.
- 19 (b) A person who is otherwise qualified to register and is
- 20 at least sixteen years of age but will not be eighteen years of
- 21 age by the date of the next federal, state, or local election
- 22 may preregister upon satisfactory proof of age and shall be

- pursuant to chapter 91, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to allow 2
- 3 registered voters who are sixteen years of age but under the age
- of eighteen to vote at any state or local election, but not 4
- federal election. 5
- SECTION 16. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 6
- and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 7
- SECTION 17. This Act shall take effect upon its approval 8
- and upon ratification of a constitutional amendment lowering the 9
- age qualification for voting from eighteen to sixteen years of 10
- age in all state and local elections only. 11
