A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FAILURE TO REPORT A MISSING CHILD.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 The Legislature recognizes that current State 2 law does not address the situation where a parent, legal quardian, or other person legally charged with the care or 3 custody of a child fails to report the death or disappearance of 4 5 the child, or where a caregiver actively conceals a child's death or disappearance. However, the Legislature recognizes that 6 7 our State law should penalize any caregiver who fails to report 8 a child's death or disappearance. 9 SECTION 2. Chapter 709, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 10 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to read as follows: 11 12 "§709-Failure to report a missing child. (1) A caregiver in custody of a child commits the offense of failure 13 14 to report a missing child if: (a) The child is under the age of sixteen;

- (b) The caregiver knowingly or negligently fails to verify 16
- 17 the safety and whereabouts of the child for a period in excess
- of forty-eight hours; and 18

19	SECTION 3. Chapter 709, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
20	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated

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1	"§709- Failure to report death of a child. (1) A
2	caregiver commits the offense of failure to report the death of
3	a child if a caregiver fails to report the death of a child who
4	was under the caregiver's custody to a law enforcement agency
5	within two hours of the discovery of the child's death.
6	(2) "Caregiver" means a parent, legal guardian, or other
7	person legally charged with the care or custody of a child.
8	(3) "Child" means a person under the age of eighteen years
9	(4) A person who violates this section commits a class C
10	felony."
1	SECTION 4. Chapter 709, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
12	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
13	and to read as follows:
14	"§709- False information to law enforcement regarding a
15	missing child. (1) A caregiver commits the offense of false
16	information to law enforcement regarding a missing child if the
17	caregiver knowingly gives false information to a law enforcement
18	officer with the intent to mislead the officer or impede either
19	a missing person investigation or a felony criminal
20	investigation that involves a child who is in the caregiver's
21	care.

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- 1 (2) "Caregiver" means a parent, legal guardian, or other
- 2 person legally charged with the care or custody of a child.
- 3 (3) "Child" means a person under the age of eighteen years.
- 4 (4) A person who violates this section commits a class C
- felony."

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- 6 SECTION 5. New statutory material is underscored.
- 7 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
