## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ACCESS TO JUSTICE.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. This Act shall be known as the Hawaii Justice
- 2 League Program Act of 2014.
- 3 The legislature finds that there is a lack of access to
- 4 justice within the State in both civil and criminal contexts.
- 5 The supreme court of Hawaii access to justice commission,
- 6 established in 2008 to increase access to justice in civil legal
- 7 matters for low- and moderate-income residents, found that one
- 8 of the reasons for the severe disparity among citizens'
- 9 abilities to access the judicial system is the insufficient
- 10 number of attorneys choosing to practice public interest law.
- 11 The legislature finds that few new lawyers are able to
- 12 practice public interest law due to the high cost of attending
- 13 law school, the debt that law school graduates incur to finance
- 14 their legal education, the high cost of living in Hawaii, and
- 15 the compensation which is much lower than in other practice
- 16 areas. Because of these circumstances, new lawyers pursuing
- 17 public interest jobs often cannot service their student loan

- 1 only do so by maintaining a "no-frills" subsistence level
- 2 lifestyle. The increasingly high cost of attending law school
- 3 requires lawyers to seek out higher paying jobs that allow for
- 4 repayment of student loans.
- 5 The legislature further finds that twenty-six other
- 6 jurisdictions nationwide have loan repayment assistance programs
- 7 to encourage lawyers to pursue public interest work within their
- 8 jurisdiction. Additionally, the legislature finds that the
- 9 current federal programs, although helpful, are inadequate to
- 10 incentivize public interest work in Hawaii because it is more
- 11 economically feasible for lawyers to live in jurisdictions that
- 12 offer a lower cost of living and higher salary levels.
- 13 Loan repayment programs have been successfully used in
- 14 Hawaii to increase the number of educators serving in hard-to-
- 15 fill teaching positions, and the legislature believes that loan
- 16 repayment programs can also be used to encourage and enable
- 17 lawyers to pursue public interest work in the State.
- 18 The legislature finds that encouraging law students and
- 19 lawyers to practice public interest law is essential to ensuring
- 20 access to the justice system. Therefore, it is the intent of
- 21 the legislature in enacting this legislation to provide for the

- 1 partial repayment of student loans of lawyers who provide public
- 2 interest legal services.
- 3 The purpose of this Act is to establish the Hawaii justice
- 4 league program, under the University of Hawaii William S.
- 5 Richardson school of law, to provide student loan repayment for
- 6 lawyers who agree to pursue public interest work in Hawaii.
- 7 SECTION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by
- 8 adding a new chapter to be appropriately designated and to read
- 9 as follows:
- 10 "CHAPTER
- 11 HAWAII JUSTICE LEAGUE PROGRAM
- 12 § -1 Definitions. As used in this chapter, unless the
- 13 context requires otherwise:
- 14 "Lawyer" means a person licensed to practice law in this
- 15 State and in good standing.
- 16 "Loan repayment" means the payment, per year, of up to
- 17 per cent of a Hawaii justice league program participant's legal
- 18 training costs, including but not limited to the cost of in-
- 19 state tuition at the University of Hawaii William S. Richardson
- 20 school of law, for a maximum of five years.

1	"Participant" means a lawyer who is receiving loan		
2	repayment assistance through the Hawaii justice league loan		
3	repayment assistance program established under section -3.		
4	"Public interest work" means work for an organization that		
5	has been granted tax exempt status as a charitable organization		
6	by the Internal Revenue Service pursuant to section 501(c)(3),		
7	501(c)(4), 501(c)(5), or 501(c)(6) of the Internal Revenue Code		
8	of 1986, as amended; local, state, or federal government; Native		
9	Hawaiian public interest organizations; and low-income community		
10	based private practice.		
11	§ -2 Hawaii justice league program established. The		
12	Hawaii justice league program is established to encourage		
13	lawyers to pursue public interest work in Hawaii. The program		
14	shall be administered by the University of Hawaii William S.		
15	Richardson school of law. In administering the program, the		
16	University of Hawaii William S. Richardson school of law shall:		
17	(1) Adopt rules and develop guidelines to administer the		
18	program pursuant to section -4;		
19	(2) Identify and designate areas of the State and		
20	populations with the greatest need for public interest		
21	work;		

1	(3)	Establish Criteria and a Certification process for
2		what constitutes eligible public interest work;
3	(4)	Establish criteria for the selection by the University
4		of Hawaii William S. Richardson school of law of
5		lawyers to participate in the program;
6	(5)	Define and determine compliance with the service
7		commitments of the program;
8	(6)	Collect and manage reimbursements from participants
9		who do not meet their service commitments under the
10		program;
11	(7)	Publicize the program, particularly to maximize the
12		number of participants in areas of the State where
13		there is greatest need for public interest work; and
14	(8)	Solicit and accept grants and donations from public
15		and private sources for the program, including
16		maximizing the use of federal matching funds.
17	\$	-3 Hawaii justice league loan repayment assistance
18	program.	(a) There is created within the Hawaii justice league
19	program,	the Hawaii justice league loan repayment assistance
20	program t	o be administered by the University of Hawaii William
21	S. Richar	dson school of law, in partnership with a lending
22	financial	institution whose operations are principally conducted
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- 1 in Hawaii. The Hawaii justice league loan repayment assistance
- 2 program shall provide loan repayments to lawyers who make the
- 3 service commitment under subsection (b). The University of
- 4 Hawaii William S. Richardson school of law shall make loan
- 5 repayments directly to a financial institution to offset the
- 6 loan repayment for which the Hawaii justice league program
- 7 recipient would otherwise be liable. The University of Hawaii
- 8 William S. Richardson school of law shall prioritize loan
- 9 repayments in accordance with the greatest need for public
- 10 interest work.
- 11 (b) The Hawaii justice league program shall provide loan
- 12 repayments on behalf of a lawyer who agrees to serve for a
- 13 maximum of five years as a lawyer pursuing public interest work
- 14 in Hawaii; provided that eligible lawyers, as applicable, shall
- 15 have graduated from a duly accredited law school within the
- 16 United States; provided further that preference shall be given
- 17 to graduates of the University of Hawaii William S. Richardson
- 18 school of law, as applicable.
- 19 (c) Eligible participants in the Hawaii justice league
- 20 loan repayment assistance program shall be determined by the
- 21 University of Hawaii William S. Richardson school of law on a
- 22 competitive basis and in accordance with subsection (b).

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- 1 If a participant in the Hawaii justice league loan 2 repayment assistance program fails to satisfy the recipient's 3 service commitment under subsection (b), the Hawaii justice 4 league loan repayment assistance program participant shall be 5 liable for the repayment of the outstanding balance of the loan 6 to the lending financial institution under subsection (a). addition, the University of Hawaii William S. Richardson school 7 8 of law may seek reimbursement for any loan repayment made by the university on behalf of the Hawaii justice league program loan 9 10 repayment assistance participant. In accordance with chapter 103D, the University of 11 (e) 12 Hawaii William S. Richardson school of law may enter into written contracts with collection agencies to collect delinquent 13 14 reimbursements of loan repayments. All payments collected, exclusive of a collection agency's commissions, shall revert and 15 be credited to the Hawaii justice league special fund. A 16 17 collection agency that enters into a written contract with the 18 University of Hawaii William S. Richardson school of law to 19 collect delinquent reimbursements of loan repayments pursuant to this section may collect a commission from the debtor in 20 21 accordance with the terms of and up to the amounts authorized in
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the written contract.

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Rules. The University of Hawaii William S. 1 S Richardson school of law shall adopt rules to administer this 2 chapter. The rules shall be adopted pursuant to chapter 91, but 3 4 shall be exempt from public notice and public hearing 5 requirements. -5 Hawaii justice league special fund. (a) 6 There is established a Hawaii justice league special fund, which shall be 7 administered by the University of Hawaii William S. Richardson 8 9 school of law, and into which may be deposited: 10 Any funds appropriated by the legislature for the (1) Hawaii justice league loan repayment assistance 11 12 program; 13 (2) Gifts, donations, and grants from public agencies and 14 private persons; (3) Reimbursements of loan repayments under the Hawaii 15 16 justice league loan repayment assistance program; Proceeds of the operations of the Hawaii justice 17 (4)league loan repayment assistance program; 18 19 Interest earned or accrued on moneys deposited into (5) the fund; and 20 21 (6) Deposits from the University of Hawaii tuition and

fees special fund established in section 304A-2153.

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- 1 (b) The University of Hawaii William S. Richardson school
- 2 of law may expend moneys from the fund for the purposes of this
- 3 chapter, including the operational expenses of the Hawaii
- 4 justice league program.
- 5 § -6 Report to the legislature. The dean of the
- 6 University of Hawaii William S. Richardson school of law shall
- 7 report to the legislature on the status of the Hawaii justice
- 8 league program no later than twenty days prior to the convening
- 9 of each regular session beginning with the regular session of
- 10 2016."
- 11 SECTION 3. The University of Hawaii William S. Richardson
- 12 school of law shall implement the Hawaii justice league program
- 13 no later than June 30, 2015.
- 14 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
- 15 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 16 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for
- 17 deposit into the Hawaii justice league special fund.
- 18 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the Hawaii justice
- 19 league special fund the sum of \$ or so much thereof as
- 20 may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for the purposes of
- 21 establishing and administering the Hawaii justice league
- 22 program.

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- 1 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the University of
- 2 Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.
- 3 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.

## Report Title:

Hawaii Justice League; Loan Repayment; Public Interest; Access to Justice; Appropriation
