A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that re-entry facilities house offenders in transitional environments while they learn to 2 reengage with the community, find employment, and become 3 4 familiar with the social services that will allow them to establish law abiding and productive lifestyles. Re-entry 5 6 facilities are instrumental in reducing the prevalent issue of 7 recidivism. Offenders confront many obstacles in their path to 8 successful reintegration, including social and economic 9 disadvantages, education limitations, mental and physical health issues, and substance abuse problems. Comprehensive re-entry 10 11 programs have shown the ability to reduce recidivism when offenders start the programs before their release. 12

13 The legislature further finds that there is a positive 14 economic impact from re-entry programs, supported by cost-15 benefit analyses. According to the Urban Institute, Maryland's 16 Reentry Partnership Initiative program returned \$3 in benefits 17 for every \$1 in new costs. Additionally, the State may apply



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for grants to support a re-entry program under the federal
Second Chance Act of 2007.

3 The legislature additionally finds that the State has an extensive problem with recidivism and prison capacity. To 4 5 alleviate these problems, this Act proposes the construction of 6 a comprehensive re-entry facility with two hundred fifty beds. 7 During the initial intake phase, offenders will be evaluated to 8 determine their readiness for release and participate in a 9 variety of educational, mental, and fitness programs. After 10 successful completion of the thirty day maximum intake phase, 11 offenders will enter the second phase where they will live in a 12 less restricted environment and engage in mandatory programs, 13 including victim impact and awareness, anger management, and 14 critical thinking sessions. Offenders will be able to 15 participate in other programs, including general education 16 development completion, computer training, money management, nutrition, job searching, and community volunteering. In the 17 18 final phase, offenders will work to secure jobs, save and pay a 19 portion of the cost for staying at the facility, and engage in 20 programs designed to build their skills and resume.

21 The legislature also finds that for a minimal additional 22 cost, a day reporting program may be established to provide a 2014-0482 SB SMA.doc

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1 location for the offenders and their parole officers to have 2 regular contact. The day reporting program will provide a combination of individual and group counseling, drug testing, 3 4 and flash incarceration when necessary. The immediate and long-5 term goals of the re-entry facility and day reporting program 6 include curbing recidivism, meeting the supervision needs of 7 adult offenders, providing programs and services, providing cost-effective solutions, providing a return to custody, and 8 9 promoting public safety.

10 The purpose of this Act is to authorize and appropriate 11 funds for the department of public safety to establish and 12 implement a residential re-entry facility and day reporting 13 program for criminal offenders.

14 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$100,000,000 or so 15 16 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for the department of public safety to plan, design, construct, and 17 18 finance a residential re-entry facility and day reporting 19 program for criminal offenders, as described in section 1 of 20 this Act; provided that the department of public safety may 21 enter into a public-private partnership for the development of 22 the re-entry facility and day reporting program and may contract 2014-0482 SB SMA.doc

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1 a third party for construction of the facility with no initial 2 costs to the contractor and a payment plan of up to thirty years. The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department 3 4 of public safety for the purposes of this Act.

5 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2014.

Recidivism; Criminal Offenders; Re-Entry Facility; Appropriation; Department of Public Safety

Description:

Makes an appropriation to the department of public safety for the establishment and implementation of a re-entry facility for criminal offenders, which will include residential and day reporting programs.

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
