A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that reentry facilities house offenders in transitional environments while they learn to 2 reengage with the community, find employment, and become 3 4 familiar with the social services that will allow them to 5 establish law abiding and productive lifestyles. Reentry 6 facilities are instrumental in reducing recidivism. Offenders 7 confront many obstacles in their path to successful 8 reintegration, including social and economic disadvantages, education limitations, mental and physical health issues, and 9 substance abuse problems. Comprehensive reentry programs have 10 11 been shown to reduce recidivism when offenders start the 12 programs before their release.

13 The legislature further finds that there is a positive 14 economic impact from reentry programs, supported by cost-benefit 15 analyses. According to the Urban Institute, Maryland's Reentry 16 Partnership Initiative program returned \$3 in benefits for every 17 \$1 in new costs. Additionally, the State may apply for grants

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to support a reentry program under the federal Second Chance Act
 of 2007.

3 The legislature additionally finds that the State has an 4 extensive problem with recidivism and prison capacity. To 5 alleviate these problems, this Act proposes the construction of 6 a comprehensive reentry facility with two hundred fifty beds. 7 During the initial intake phase, offenders will be evaluated to **8**° determine their readiness for release and participate in a 9 variety of educational, mental, and fitness programs. After 10 successful completion of the thirty day maximum intake phase, offenders will enter the second phase where they will live in a 11 12 less restricted environment and engage in mandatory programs, 13 including victim impact and awareness, anger management, and critical thinking sessions. Offenders will be able to 14 participate in other programs, including general education 15 16 development completion, computer training, money management, nutrition, job searching, and community volunteering. In the 17 final phase, offenders will work to secure jobs, save and pay a 18 portion of the cost for staying at the facility, and engage in 19 20 programs designed to build their skills and resume.

21 The legislature also finds that for a minimal additional 22 cost, a day reporting program may be established to provide a SB2309 SD2 LRB 14-1844.doc

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1 location for the offenders and their parole officers to have 2 regular contact. The day reporting program will provide a 3 combination of individual and group counseling, drug testing, and flash incarceration when necessary. The immediate and long-4 5 term goals of the reentry facility and day reporting program 6 include curbing recidivism, meeting the supervision needs of 7 adult offenders, providing programs and services, providing cost-effective solutions, providing a return to custody, and 8 9 promoting public safety.

10 The purpose of this Act is to authorize and appropriate 11 funds for the department of public safety to establish and 12 implement a residential reentry facility and day reporting 13 program for criminal offenders, including offenders in the work 14 furlough program.

SECTION 2. The director of finance is authorized to issue 15 16 general obligation bonds in the sum of \$ or so much 17 thereof as may be necessary and the same sum or so much thereof 18 as may be necessary is appropriated for fiscal year 2014-2015 19 for the department of public safety to plan, design, construct, 20 and finance a residential reentry facility and day reporting 21 program for criminal offenders, as described in section 1 of 22 this Act; provided that the department of public safety may



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1 enter into a public-private partnership for the development of 2 the reentry facility and day reporting program and may contract 3 a third party for construction of the facility with no initial 4 costs to the contractor and a payment plan of up to thirty 5 years.

6 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of7 public safety for the purposes of this Act.

8 SECTION 3. The appropriation made for the capital
9 improvement project authorized by this Act shall not lapse at
10 the end of the fiscal biennium for which the appropriation is
11 made; provided that all moneys from the appropriation
12 unencumbered as of June 30, 2016, shall lapse as of that date.
13 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
