A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Alzheimer's disease accounts for approximately sixty to seventy per cent of dementia 2 3 cases. As the disease progresses, functional abilities decline, 4 resulting in an individual's inability to carry out such basic 5 bodily functions as walking and swallowing, and ultimately leads 6 to death. The most important known risk factor for Alzheimer's 7 disease is age. According to the Alzheimer's Association, the 8 likelihood of developing Alzheimer's disease doubles about every 9 five years after age sixty-five, and almost half of the people 10 over eighty-five will have some form of memory loss. The legislature further finds that due to the aging of the 11 12 Hawaii population, the prevalence of age-related illnesses, 13 including Alzheimer's disease, is expected to increase. From 14 2010 to 2015, the Hawaii population over the age of sixty-five 15 will increase by sixty-seven per cent. The Alzheimer's 16 Association has projected that in 2025, there will be thirty-17 four thousand, or ten per cent, of Hawaii residents age sixty-18 five and older with Alzheimer's disease.

1	The purpose of this Act is establish the Alzheimer's
2	disease task force to assess the current and future impact of
3	Alzheimer's disease on Hawaii residents and develop strategies
4	to prevent and treat individuals with Alzheimer's disease,
5	enhance care quality and efficiency, and expand supports for
6	individuals with Alzheimer's disease and their families.
7	SECTION 2. (a) There is established within the departmen
8	of health for administrative purposes an Alzheimer's disease
9	task force to assess the current and future impact of
10	Alzheimer's disease on Hawaii residents and develop strategies
11	to prevent and treat individuals with Alzheimer's disease,
12	enhance care quality and efficiency, and expand supports for
13	individuals with Alzheimer's disease and their families.
14	(b) The Alzheimer's disease task force shall have twenty-
15	one members. The members of the task force shall include:
16	(1) The director of human services, or the director's
17	designee;
18	(2) The director of health, or the director's designee;
19	(3) The director of the executive office on aging, or the
20	director's designee;
21	(4) The president of the Hawaii health systems
22	corporation, or the president's designee;

1,	(5)	The administrator of the state health planning and
2		development agency, or the administrator's designee;
3	(6)	The chief of the adult mental health division, or the
4		chief's designee;
5	(7)	Two individuals diagnosed with early-stage Alzheimer's
6		disease to be appointed, one each, by the senate
7		president and speaker of the house of representatives;
8	(8)	Two individuals who are caregivers to individuals with
9		Alzheimer's disease to be appointed, one each, by the
10		senate president and speaker of the house of
11		representatives;
12	(9)	Two representatives of adult care homes that offer
13		special care units for individuals with Alzheimer's
14		disease to be appointed, one each, by the senate
15		president and speaker of the house of representatives;
16	(10)	Two representatives of nursing home facilities that
17		provide special care for individuals with Alzheimer's
18		disease to be appointed, one each, by the senate
19		president and speaker of the house of representatives;
20	(11)	Two representatives of the medical profession with
21		experience treating individuals with Alzheimer's

1		disease to be appointed, one each, by the senate
2		president and speaker of the house of representatives;
3	(12)	Two individuals of the Alzheimer's Association - Aloha
4		Chapter to be appointed, one each, by the senate
5		president and speaker of the house of representatives;
6		and
7	(13)	Two members at large appointed by the governor.
8	The	governor shall appoint the chairperson of the task
9	force.	
10	(C)	The Alzheimer's disease task force shall:
11	(1)	Assess the current and future impact of Alzheimer's
12		disease on Hawaii residents;
13	(2)	Examine the existing industries, services, and
14		resources available within the State to address the
15		needs of individuals with Alzheimer's disease and
16		their families and caregivers;
17	(3)	Develop a strategy to mobilize a state response to
18		Alzheimer's disease;
19	(4)	Examine state trends in the population of individuals
20		with Alzheimer's disease, including the changing
21		population of individuals with dementia and their
22		needs in all of the following areas:

1		(A)	State's role in providing long-term care, family
2	•		caregiver support, and assistance to individuals
3			with early-stage and early onset of Alzheimer's
4			disease;
5		(B)	State policy regarding individuals with
6			Alzheimer's disease and developmental
7			disabilities; and
8		(C)	Surveillance of individuals with Alzheimer's
9			disease for the purpose of developing proper
10			estimates of the number of individuals in Hawaii
11			with Alzheimer's disease;
12	(5)	Exam	nine existing services, resources, and capacity for
13		trea	ting and managing Alzheimer's disease, including
14		but	not limited to:
15		(A)	Type, cost, and availability of dementia
16			services;
17		(B)	Dementia-specific training requirements for long-
18			term care staff;
19		(C)	Quality care measures for long-term care
20			facilities;
21		(D)	Capacity of public safety and law enforcement to
22			respond to individuals with Alzheimer's disease;

1		(E)	Availability of home and community-based
2			resources for individuals with Alzheimer's
3			disease and availability of respite care to
4			assist families;
5		(F)	Inventory of long-term care dementia care units;
6		(G)	Adequacy and appropriateness of geriatric-
7			psychiatric units for individuals with behavior
8	t		disorders associated with Alzheimer's disease and
9			related dementia;
10		(H)	Assisted living residential options for
11			individuals with dementia; and
12		(I)	State support of Alzheimer's research through the
13			University of Hawaii John A. Burns school of
14			medicine and other resources; and
15	(6)	Exam	ine needed state policies or responses, including
16		but	not limited to:
17		(A)	Directions for the provision of clear and
18			coordinated services and supports to individuals
19			and families living with Alzheimer's disease and
20			related disorders; and

1	(B) Strategies to address any identified gaps in
2	· services for individuals and families living with
3	Alzheimer's disease and related disorders.
4	(d) Members of the Alzheimer's disease task force shall
5	serve without compensation for their service on the task force
6	but may be reimbursed for reasonable expenses, including travel
7	expenses, incurred for serving on the task force.
8	(e) The Alzheimer's disease task force shall submit a
9	report of its findings, recommendations, and proposed
10	legislation to the legislature no later than twenty days prior
11	to the convening of the regular session of 2015, and shall be
12	dissolved on July 1, 2015.
13	SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2014.

Description:
