A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO YOUTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that in the United States
- 2 more than one-fourth of all children, or fifteen million, are
- 3 left alone and unsupervised after school. Thirty per cent of
- 4 middle school students, or nearly four million, are left
- 5 unsupervised until their parents return home from work.
- 6 The legislature further finds that juvenile violence peaks
- 7 in the after-school hours on school days and in the evenings on
- 8 non-school days. Sixty-three per cent of violent crimes
- 9 committed by juveniles occur on school days, while nearly one-
- 10 fifth of all juvenile violent crimes occur between the hours of
- 11 3:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. During fiscal year 2013, police in
- 12 Hawaii made almost two thousand arrests of juveniles between the
- 13 ages of twelve and fourteen.
- 14 The legislature finds that according to the superintendent
- 15 of education's annual report of 2011, Hawaii's school dropout
- 16 rate has reached over sixteen per cent, with a graduation rate
- 17 of only approximately eighty per cent. Nearly half of the high

- 1 school dropouts reported that they started high school ill-
- 2 prepared.
- 3 The legislature further finds that research indicates that
- 4 each disconnected youth costs taxpayers nearly \$14,000 per year.
- 5 This amount can continue and even increase as some
- 6 disenfranchised youth come into contact with the juvenile
- 7 justice system. The stakes of youth disengagement are high.
- 8 Once students are disconnected, recruitment, enrollment, and
- 9 retention programs require stronger and more persistent
- 10 outreach, more intensive services, and more long-term
- 11 participation.
- 12 Middle and intermediate school years are a pivotal time for
- 13 keiki, a time when they can succumb to peer pressure and
- 14 significantly derail their education and futures. Accordingly,
- 15 participation in high-quality after-school programs can lead to
- 16 improved school attendance, better behavior, and better academic
- 17 performance. Keeping our keiki engaged in positive after-school
- 18 activities will help keep them on the path toward graduation and
- 19 productive futures.
- 20 Currently, there are approximately thirty-nine thousand
- 21 middle and intermediate public school students in Hawaii.
- 22 Approximately half of the roughly fifty-one middle and

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- 1 intermediate schools in the State receive some federal or state
- 2 funding for after-school programing; however, the funding is
- 3 inconsistent or unreliable.
- 4 The legislature finds that in March 2013, the lieutenant
- 5 governor established the resources for enrichment, athletics,
- 6 culture, and health initiative to develop a standardized
- 7 framework and funding for after-school programs for public
- 8 middle and intermediate school students throughout the State.
- 9 The establishment of a state-subsidized after-school program for
- 10 middle and intermediate public school students is important to
- 11 the future of keiki and the welfare of our State as a whole.
- 12 The legislature further finds that the office of youth
- 13 services, within the department of human services, provides
- 14 comprehensive front-end services and programs for youth to
- 15 prevent delinquency and reduce the incidence of recidivism. The
- 16 office is dedicated to creating opportunities for youth to
- 17 develop competencies that foster resiliency and enable them to
- 18 achieve a successful transition to young adulthood. The
- 19 legislature determines that the objectives of the resources for
- 20 enrichment, athletics, culture, and health initiative are wholly
- 21 aligned with those of the office of youth services.
- The purpose of this Act is to:

1	(1)	Statutorily establish the resources for enrichment,			
2		athletics, culture, and health program within the			
3		office of youth services to provide a standardized			
4		framework and funding for after-school programs in			
5		public middle and intermediate schools;			
6	(2)	Establish a revolving fund to receive fees and other			
7		moneys to supplement the costs of administering and			
8		operating the program;			
9	(3)	Appropriate funds for establishing the resources for			
10		enrichment, athletics, culture, and health program to			
11		provide funding for after-school programs in middle			
12		and intermediate public schools; and			
13	(4)	Establish one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) position			
14		to support the program and appropriate funds for that			
15		position.			
16	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 352D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is			
17	7 amended by adding three new sections to be appropriately				
18	18 designated and to read as follows:

15		athletics, culture, and health program; and
16	(4)	Ensure each after-school program meets contractual
17		expectations.
18	<u>(c)</u>	The office may establish participation fees and other
19	charges t	o be assessed to each student for the cost of
20	administe	ring and operating the program. The revenues shall be
21	deposited	l into the revolving fund established pursuant to

- 4 <u>health program revolving fund.</u> (a) There is established the
- 5 resources for enrichment, athletics, culture, and health program
- 6 revolving fund to be administered by the office.
- 7 (b) The revolving fund shall consist of:
- 8 (1) Fees collected by the office for administering and
- 9 operating the resources for enrichment, athletics,
- 10 culture, and health program, and for the provision of
- program services;
- 12 (2) Legislative appropriations;
- (3) All interest earned on the deposit or investment of
- moneys in the revolving fund; and
- 15 (4) Any other moneys made available to the revolving fund 16 from any other sources.
- 17 (c) Moneys in the resources for enrichment, athletics,
- 18 culture, and health program revolving fund shall be used to
- 19 supplement the costs of administering and operating after-school
- 20 programs in middle and intermediate public schools. The office
- 21 may also use the money to:

9	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general					
10	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much					
11	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 to be					
12	deposited into the resources for enrichment, athletics, culture,					
13	and health program revolving fund.					
14	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the resources for					
15	enrichment, athletics, culture, and health program revolving					
16	fund the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary					
17	for fiscal year 2014-2015 to carry out the purpose of this Act,					
18	including the establishment and operation of the resources for					
19	enrichment, athletics, culture, and health program and hiring of					
20	one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) position for the office of					
21	youth services.					

- 1 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 2 human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 3 SECTION 5. In codifying the new sections added by section
- 4 2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
- 5 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
- 6 the new sections in this Act.
- 7 SECTION 6. New statutory material is underscored.
- 8 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
