A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY PRACTICE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that occupational
- 2 therapists treat patients with injuries, illnesses, or
- 3 disabilities through the therapeutic use of everyday life
- 4 activities. Occupational therapy assistants assist occupational
- 5 therapists in providing occupational therapy.
- 6 Although the regulation of occupational therapy practice is
- 7 codified in chapter 457G, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the language
- 8 in this chapter is incomplete in relation to certain aspects of
- 9 the profession, and does not require licensure of occupational
- 10 therapists or occupational therapy assistants. The legislature
- 11 notes that Hawaii is the last state in the country to license
- 12 occupational therapists and one of the last three states to
- 13 license occupational therapy assistants.
- 14 The legislature further finds that occupational therapists
- 15 and occupational therapy assistants should be licensed in Hawaii
- 16 in order to protect public health, safety, and the welfare of
- 17 the patients served by occupational therapists and occupational
- 18 therapy assistants. Licensing of occupational therapists and



- 1 occupational therapy assistants will ensure that occupational
- 2 therapy in Hawaii is provided by only qualified occupational
- 3 therapists and occupational therapy assistants and will help
- 4 meet insurer payer requirements, as some insurers require
- 5 occupational therapy to be provided by licensed individuals.
- 6 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to improve the
- 7 regulation of occupational therapists and occupational therapy
- 8 assistants by establishing an occupational therapy program and
- 9 licensing requirements for occupational therapists and
- 10 occupational therapy assistants, including provisions relating
- 11 to the practice of occupational therapy, qualifications, titles,
- 12 supervision of occupational therapy assistants, exemptions,
- 13 issuance of permanent and temporary licenses, licensure renewal,
- 14 and revocation or suspension of licenses.
- 15 SECTION 2. Chapter 457G, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 16 amended by adding nine new sections to be appropriately
- 17 designated and to read as follows:
- 18 "§457G-A Occupational therapy program. There is
- 19 established an occupational therapy program within the
- 20 department to be administered by the director.
- 21 §457G-B Practice of occupational therapy; qualifications;
- 22 titles. (a) Occupational therapists and occupational therapy

- 1 assistants shall have completed the educational requirements and
- 2 supervised field work established by the Accreditation Council
- 3 for Occupational Therapy Education and shall have passed a
- 4 national certification examination administered by the National
- 5 Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy.
- 6 (b) No person shall practice occupational therapy
- 7 gratuitously or for pay, offer to practice occupational therapy,
- offer occupational therapy, or represent, advertise, or 8
- 9 announce, either publicly or privately, that the person is an
- 10 occupational therapist, unless the person is appropriately
- licensed under this chapter. 11
- 12 (c) No person shall use, in connection with the person's
- 13 name or business, the words "occupational therapist licensed",
- "registered occupational therapist", "licensed occupational 14
- therapist", "occupational therapist", or "doctor of occupational 15
- 16 therapy", or the letters "OT", "OTR", "OTD", "OT/L", "OTR/L", or
- "OTD/L", or any other words, letters, abbreviations, or insignia 17
- 18 indicating or implying that the person is an occupational
- 19 therapist unless the person is appropriately licensed as an
- 20 occupational therapist under this chapter.
- 21 (d) No person shall use the title "occupational therapy
- assistant licensed", "licensed occupational therapy assistant", 22



- 1 the letters "OTA/L" or "COTA/L", or any other words, letters,
- 2 abbreviations, or insignia indicating or implying that the
- 3 person is an occupational therapy assistant unless that person
- 4 is appropriately licensed as an occupational therapy assistant
- 5 under this chapter.
- 6 §457G-C Supervision of occupational therapy assistants.
- 7 (a) An occupational therapy assistant may practice occupational
- 8 therapy only under the supervision of an occupational therapist
- 9 who is licensed to practice occupational therapy in the State.
- 10 The occupational therapist shall be responsible for occupational
- 11 therapy evaluation, appropriate reassessment, treatment
- 12 planning, interventions, and discharge from occupational therapy
- 13 based on standard professional guidelines. Supervision of an
- 14 occupational therapy assistant by an occupational therapist
- 15 shall be a shared responsibility. The supervising occupational
- 16 therapist and the supervised occupational therapy assistant
- 17 shall have legal and ethical responsibility for ongoing
- 18 management of supervision, including providing, requesting,
- 19 giving, or obtaining supervision.
- 20 (b) The supervising occupational therapist shall:

1	(1)	Determine the frequency, level, and nature of
2		supervision with input from the occupational therapy
3		assistant; and
4	(2)	Base the supervision determination on a variety of
5		factors, including the clients' required level of
6		care, treatment plan, and experience and pertinent
7		skills of the occupational therapy assistant.
8	<u>(c)</u>	The supervising occupational therapist shall supervise
9	the occupa	ational therapy assistant to ensure that the
10	occupation	nal therapy assistant:
11	(1)	Does not initiate or alter a treatment program without
12		prior evaluation by and approval of the supervising
13		occupational therapist;
14	(2)	Obtains prior approval of the supervising occupational
15		therapist before making adjustments to a specific
16		treatment procedure; and
17	(3)	Does not interpret data beyond the scope of the
18		occupational therapy assistant's education and
19		training.
20	<u>§4576</u>	G-D Exemptions. (a) Nothing in this chapter shall be
21	construed	to prohibit any person from acting within the scope of
22	a license	issued to that person under any other law; provided
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- 1 that the person shall not claim to be an occupational therapist
- 2 or occupational therapy assistant, or that the person is
- 3 performing occupational therapy, unless the person is also
- 4 licensed under this chapter.
- 5 (b) Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to prohibit
- 6 students in an educational program for occupational therapists
- 7 or occupational therapy assistants from participating in
- 8 activities that are conducted as part of the educational program
- 9 and are under the guidance and supervision of a licensed
- 10 occupational therapist.
- 11 (c) Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to prohibit
- 12 a person licensed as an occupational therapist in another state
- 13 or foreign country from practicing occupational therapy in this
- 14 State if the person is part of an educational demonstration or
- 15 instructional program or seminar sponsored by an educational
- 16 institution, hospital, medical care program, the Occupational
- 17 Therapy Association of Hawaii, or any other similar person or
- 18 group, for the duration of the program or seminar and confined
- 19 to the purpose of the program or seminar.
- 20 (d) Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to prohibit
- 21 an occupational therapist who is practicing in the United States
- 22 Armed Services, United States Public Health Service, or

19	(10)	Appoint an advisory committee composed of practicing
20		occupational therapists and occupational therapy
21		assistants to assist with the implementation of this
22		chapter.

§457G-F Permanent license. An applicant for a permanent
license to practice as an occupational therapist or occupational
therapy assistant shall submit proof of educational
qualifications and any other information required by the
director on an application form prescribed by the director. The
director shall maintain a current list of schools of
occupational therapy that are approved by an agency recognized
by the United States Department of Education or Council on
Postsecondary Accreditation.
In the case of foreign-trained persons, the applicant shall
have completed the National Board for Certification in
Occupational Therapy occupational therapist eligibility
determination process and shall have passed a national
certification examination administered by the National Board for
Certification in Occupational Therapy.
§457G-G Temporary license. (a) An applicant for a
permanent license under section 457G-F may also apply for a
temporary license, pending approval of a permanent license, by
providing the following to the director:
(1) Evidence that the applicant has submitted an
(1) Evidence that the applicant has submitted an application to take the national certification

7	license.	(a) The biennial renewal fee shall be paid to the
8	departmen	t on or before December 31 of each even-numbered year.
9	Failure,	neglect, or refusal of any licensee to pay the biennial
10	renewal f	ee on or before this date shall constitute a forfeiture
11	of the li	cense. A forfeited license may be restored upon
12	written a	pplication within one year from the date of forfeiture
13	and the p	ayment of the delinquent fee plus an amount equal to
14	fifty per	cent of the delinquent fee.
15	(b)	Upon written request of a licensee, the director may
16	place the	licensee's active license on an inactive status.
17	During th	e inactive period, a licensee shall not engage in the
18	practice	of occupational therapy. The license may be
19	reactivat	ed at any time by making a written request to the
20	director	and by payment of the renewal and any other applicable
21	fees. A	licensee's inactive status shall not deprive the

1	director	of the director's authority to institute or continue
2	any disci	plinary or enforcement action against the licensee.
3	<u>§457</u>	G-I License revocation or suspension; probation of
4	licensee.	(a) In addition to any other actions authorized by
5	law, any	license issued under this chapter may be revoked or
6	suspended	by the director at any time for any cause authorized
7	by law, i	ncluding but not limited to the following:
8	(1)	Obtaining a fee on the assurance that a manifestly
9		incurable disease can be permanently cured;
10	(2)	Wilfully betraying patient confidentiality;
11	(3)	Making an untruthful and improbable statement in
12		advertising one's practice or business;
13	(4)	False, fraudulent, or deceptive advertising;
14	(5)	Being habituated to the excessive use of drugs or
15		alcohol or being or having been addicted to, dependent
16		on, or a habitual user of, a narcotic, barbiturate,
17		amphetamine, hallucinogen, or other drug having
18		<pre>similar effects;</pre>
19	(6)	Practicing occupational therapy while the ability to
20		practice is impaired by alcohol, drugs, or mental
21		instability;

1	<u>(7)</u>	Procuring a license through fraud, misrepresentation,		
2		or deceit, or knowingly permitting an unlicensed		
3	person to practice occupational therapy;			
4	(8)	Professional misconduct, gross negligence, or manifest		
5		incapacity in the practice of occupational therapy;		
6	(9)	Conduct or practice contrary to the ethics of the		
7		profession of occupational therapy in the United		
8		States;		
9	(10)	Violation of the conditions or limitations upon which		
10		a temporary license is issued or an exemption is		
11		granted; or		
12	(11)	Violation of this chapter or the rules adopted		
13		pursuant thereto.		
14	(b)	To reinstate a suspended license, or to grant		
15	licensure	to an applicant whose license was previously revoked,		
16	the direc	tor may require further education or training or		
17	require p	roof of competence in performance.		
18	<u>(c)</u>	In lieu of revoking or suspending a license, the		
19	director	may place the licensee on probation, the terms of which		
20	may requi	re observation of the licensee by an appropriate group		
21	or societ	y of occupational therapists."		

1	SECTION 3. Section 45/G-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended as follows:

8		<u>(B)</u>	Habits, routines, roles, rituals, and behavior
9			<pre>patterns;</pre>

12			activity demands that affect performance; and
13		(D)	Performance skills, including motor and praxis,
14			sensory-perceptual, emotional regulation,
15			cognitive, communication, and social skills;

18		<u>(A)</u>	Establishment, remediation, or restoration of a
