A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CONTINUING COMPETENCY FOR NURSES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that to ensure public 2 health, candidates for initial nurse licensure are required to 3 pass a national examination that measures the minimum 4 competencies needed to perform safely and effectively as newly 5 licensed, entry-level registered or practical nurses. In 6 today's health care environment, because technology and practice 7 are continually changing and new health care systems are 8 emerging, the challenge of licensure boards is to assure 9 consumers that nurses are competent throughout their practice 10 careers. Research shows that continuing education alone is not 11 enough to ensure competency in post-entry nurses. According to 12 the Institute of Medicine, "[A]n emerging concept ... includes 13 components of [continuing education] but has a broader focus, 14 such as teaching how to identify problems and apply solutions, 15 and allowing health professionals to tailor the learning 16 process, setting, and curriculum to their needs."

17 The legislature further finds that continuing competency
18 that ensures continued patient health and safety requires
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1 lifelong learning and ongoing redefinition based on the 2 individual's experience, change in practice setting, and educational advancement. Each nurse must maintain and augment 3 4 the necessary knowledge and skills to be current in practice. 5 To do this, each nurse needs a self-assessment tool that enables 6 the nurse to: assess and adapt to their learning needs; stretch 7 learning from the classroom to the point of care; match the need for continuing education to the learning for competence; and 8 9 support increased personal accountability for lifelong learning 10 to ensure safe practice.

11 The legislature therefore finds that the Hawaii nurse 12 continued competency program, which contains these elements and 13 learning activity options, must be established for nurses 14 licensed in Hawaii.

Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to require licensed registered nurses and licensed practical nurses to submit evidence of continuing competency at each renewal period, beginning with the June 30, 2017, licensing biennium.

19 SECTION 2. Chapter 457, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 20 amended by adding five new sections to be appropriately 21 designated and to read as follows:

18	For fir	st-time license renewals, if the initial license was

21	renewal peri	od. If the initial license was issued more than
22	twelve month	s prior to the renewal date, the licensee shall be
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1	required	to obtain fifteen units of approved continuing
2	competenc	e units for the first renewal period.
3	(c)	Upon application for license renewal or reinstatement,
4	each lice	nsee shall attest to completion of one of the learning

4	(f)	Acceptable documentation for completion of the
5	learning a	activities under subsection (d) includes the following
6	evidence:	
7	(1)	For national certification or recertification: a copy
8		of a certificate that includes the name of the
9		licensee, name of the certifying body, date of
10		certification, and date of certification expiration.
11		Certification shall be initially attained during the
12		licensure period, have been in effect during the
13		entire licensure period, or have been recertified
14		during the licensure period;
15	(2)	For contact hours of continuing education: the name
16		of the licensee, title of educational activity, name
17		of the provider, number of contact hours, and date of
18		activity;
19	(3)	For a board approved refresher course: written
20		correspondence from the provider with the name of the
21		licensee, name of the provider, and verification of
22		successful completion of the refresher course;
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1	(4)	For post-licensure academic education: a copy of the
2		licensee's transcript with the name of the licensee,
3		name of the educational institution, dates of
4		attendance, name of course with grade, and number of
5		credit hours received. Coursework shall demonstrate
6		relevance to nursing, health, or both;
7	(5)	For a nursing project: an abstract or summary of the
8		project, the name of the licensee, role of the
9		licensee as principal or co-principal investigator,
10		date of project completion, statement of the problem,
11		project objectives, methods used, and summary of
12		findings;
13	(6)	For authoring or co-authoring a peer reviewed
14		published nursing-related article, paper, book, or
15		book chapter: a copy of the publication, including
16		the name of the licensee and the publication date;
17	(7)	For developing and conducting a nursing education
18		presentation or presentations totaling at least five
19		contact hours: a copy of the program brochure or
20		course syllabi, objectives, content, and teaching
21		methods, and date and location of presentation; and

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1	<u>(8)</u> <u>F</u>	or six hundred forty hours of active practice in
2	<u>n</u>	ursing: name of the licensee, number of hours worked
3	<u>i:</u>	n a calendar or fiscal year, name and address of the
4	e	mployer, and signature of supervisor. If self-
5	<u>e</u> 1	mployed, hours worked may be validated through other

17	Documentati	on of acceptable evidence shall be consistent with
18	subsection	(f) and shall be submitted to the board no later than
19	the last da	y of the renewal month.
20	(i) U	nless exempted, failure of a licensee to meet
21	continuing	competency requirements shall result in disciplinary
22	<u>action in a</u>	ccordance with this chapter. Failure to present
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1	evidence o	of compliance to the board upon request shall
2	constitute	e a forfeiture of the license.
3	<u>\$457-</u>	Authorized providers of continuing competence
4	units. (a	a) Continuing education may be taken in a conventional
5	classroom	setting, via online courses, professional journals,
6	correspond	lence, or other emerging venues.
7	(b)	Continuing competence units shall be obtained from the

17		providers including but not limited to: American
18		Nurses Credentialing Center; American Association of
19		Critical-Care Nurses; and National Association for
20		Practical Nurse Education and Service, Inc.
21	<u>§</u> 457	- Exemption from continuing competence requirements.
22	<u>(a)</u> Prio	r to the expiration of a renewal period, a licensee may



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1	submit a	written request to the board for an exemption from the
2	continuin	g competence requirements in this chapter.
3	(b)	The request for an exemption shall include evidence
4	that, dur	ing the two-year period prior to the expiration of the
5	license:	
6	(1)	The licensee was residing in another country for one
7		year or longer, reasonably preventing completion of
8		the continuing competence requirements;
9	(2)	The licensee was ill or disabled for one year or
10		longer as documented by a licensed physician, surgeon,
11		clinical psychologist, or advanced practice registered
12		nurse, preventing completion of the continuing
13		competence requirements; or
14	(3)	A dependent family member of the licensee was ill or
15		disabled for one year or longer as documented by a
16		licensed physician, surgeon, clinical psychologist, or
17		advanced practice registered nurse, preventing
18		completion of the continuing competence requirements.
19	(c)	Exemptions shall be considered by the board on a case
20	by case b	asis. Exemptions shall not be granted unless proof,
21	deemed ap	propriate and sufficient by the board that the
22	applicant	can practice safely, is submitted to the board.

1	Exemptions shall not be granted for more than one renewal
2	period. In the event a licensee cannot complete the continuing
3	competence requirements during the two-year period after
4	receiving an exemption, the licensee may only renew the license
5	on an inactive status.
6	(d) When a licensee is absent from the State because of
7	military service for a period of one year or longer during the
8	two-year renewal period, preventing completion of the continuing
9	competence requirement, the board may provide an exemption from
10	the continuing competence requirement for more than one renewal
11	period.
12	<u>§457-</u> Record keeping for continuing competence. (a)
13	Each licensee shall keep and maintain records showing that each
14	course or activity for which credit is claimed has been
15	completed.
16	(b) These records shall reflect the title of the course or
17	activity, the date taken or completed, and the record of
18	participation.
19	(c) Each licensee shall retain records required pursuant
20	to this section for a period of four years after the course or
21	activity concludes. Each licensee shall provide copies of the



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1	records t	o the board or its designee within fourteen calendar
2	days afte	r being requested to provide such documentation.
3	<u>§457</u>	- Continuing competence; acceptable contact hours or
4	<u>continuin</u>	g education units. (a) The following are acceptable
5	contact h	ours or continuing education units that fulfill the
6	<u>continuin</u>	g competence requirements of this chapter:
7	(1)	One contact hour shall be equivalent to sixty minutes
8		of instruction;
9	(2)	One contact hour shall be equivalent to sixty minutes
10		of clinical or laboratory practice in an informal
11		offering or a minimum of fifty minutes of actual
12		organized instruction;
13	(3)	One continuing medical education unit shall be
14		equivalent to one contact hour of instruction; and
15	(4)	One continuing education unit shall be equivalent to
16		ten contact hours of instruction.
17	<u>(b)</u>	Academic credit shall be converted to contact hours as
18	follows:	
19	(1)	One quarter academic credit shall be equivalent to
20		twelve and one-half contact hours; and
21	(2)	One semester academic credit shall be equivalent to
22		fifteen contact hours.



1	(c)	Contact hour equivalencies shall be as follows:	
2	(1)	One continuing education unit shall be equivalent to	
3		ten contact hours;	
4	(2)	One continuing medical education credit shall be	
5		equivalent to sixty minutes; and	
6	(3)	One American Medical Association credit shall be	
7		equivalent to sixty minutes."	
8	SECTION 3. Section 457-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
9	amended by adding three new definitions to be appropriately		
10	inserted and to read as follows:		
11	" <u>"Co</u>	mpetence" means the application of knowledge, skills,	
12	and behaviors required to function effectively, safely,		
13	ethically, and legally within the context of the individual's		
14	role and environment.		
15	"Continuing competence" means the lifelong process of		
16	maintaining and documenting competence through ongoing self-		
17	assessment, development, and implementation of a personal		
18	learning plan, and subsequent reassessment.		
19	<u>"Uni</u>	t" means a relative value assigned to continuing	
20	competence activities in which one continuing competence unit is		
21	equivalent to at least fifty minutes of classroom or hands on		
22	instruction."		



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1	SECTION 4. The department of commerce and consumer	
2	affairs, in collaboration with the center for nursing, shall	
3	convene a stakeholder group to address any outstanding issues	
4	associated with the implementation of the continuing competence	
5	requirements pursuant to this Act and shall report to the	
6	legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of	
7	the regular sessions of 2015 and 2016.	
8	SECTION 5. New statutory material is underscored.	
9	SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2014;	
10	provided that the continuing competence requirements for	
11	registered nurses and practical nurses shall take effect with	
12	the licensing biennium beginning on June 30, 2017.
