#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO NATURAL RESOURCES.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 182, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
3	and to read as follows:
4	"§182- Penalties, fees, and costs collected. All
5	penalties, fees, and costs established and collected by the
6	department pursuant to this chapter shall be deposited in the
7	special land and development fund established under section
8	<u>171-19.</u> "
9	SECTION 2. Section 171-95, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10	amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows:
11	"(c) For the purposes of this section, "renewable energy
12	producer" means:
13	(1) Any producer or developer of electrical or thermal
14	energy produced by wind, solar energy, hydropower,
15	geothermal resources, landfill gas, waste-to-energy,
16	ocean thermal energy conversion, cold seawater, wave
17	energy, biomass, including municipal solid waste,
18	biofuels or fuels derived from organic sources,

	nydrogen ruers derived primarriy from renewable
	energy, or fuel cells where the fuel is derived
	primarily from renewable sources that sell all of the
	net power produced from the demised premises to an
	electric utility company regulated under chapter 269
	or that sells all of the thermal energy it produces to
	customers of district cooling systems; provided that
	up to twenty-five per cent of the power produced by a
	renewable energy producer and sold to the utility or
	to district cooling system customers may be derived
	from fossil fuels; or
(2)	Any grower or producer of plant or animal materials
	used primarily for the production of biofuels or other
	fuels; provided that nothing herein is intended to
	prevent the waste product or byproduct of the plant or
	animal material grown or produced for the production
	of biofuel, other fuels, electrical energy, or thermal
	energy, from being used for other useful purposes."

SECTION 3. Section 182-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

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amended as follows:

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         ""Department" means the department of land and natural

         ""Geothermal resources" means the natural heat of the

    fluids, brines, associated gases, and steam, in whatever form,

         "Geothermal resources exploration" means either of the
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    following:

              Conducting non-invasive geophysical operations,
         (1)

              including geochemical operations, remote sensing, and
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              other similar techniques; or
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Drilling exploration wells for, but not limited to, 1 (2) 2 the extraction and removal of minerals of types and 3 quantities; that are reasonably required for testing and analysis to provide 4 5 ground truth or determine the economic viability of geothermal 6 resources. The term does not include "geothermal resources 7 development". 8 "Mining lease" means a lease of the right to conduct mining 9 operations, including geothermal resource exploration or 10 development, on state lands and [on lands sold or leased by the 11 State or its predecessors in interest with a reservation of 12 mineral rights to the State.] reserved lands." SECTION 4. Section 182-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 13 14 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows: 15 All minerals in, on, or under state lands or reserved "(a) 16 lands [which hereafter become state lands] are reserved to the 17 State; provided that the board [of land and natural resources] 18 may release, cancel, or waive the reservation whenever it deems 19 the land use, other than mining, is of greater benefit to the 20 State as provided for in section 182-4. Such minerals are 21 reserved from sale or lease except as provided in this chapter. 22 A purchaser or lessee of any such lands shall acquire no right, 2014-0511 SB SMA-1.doc

- 1 title, or interest in or to the minerals. The right of the
- 2 purchaser or lessee shall be subject to the reservation of all
- 3 the minerals and to the conditions and limitations prescribed by
- 4 law providing for the State and persons authorized by it to
- 5 prospect for, mine, and remove the minerals, and to occupy and
- 6 use so much of the surface of the land as may be required for
- 7 all purposes reasonably extending to the mining and removal of
- 8 the minerals therefrom by any means whatsoever."
- 9 SECTION 5. Section 182-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 10 amended to read as follows:
- 11 "§182-4 Mining leases on state lands. (a) If any mineral
- 12 is discovered or known to exist on state lands, any interested
- 13 person may notify the board [of land and natural resources] of
- 14 the person's desire to apply for a mining lease. The notice
- 15 shall be accompanied by [a fee of \$100] the required fees, as
- 16 established by the department, together with a description of
- 17 the land desired to be leased [and], the minerals involved, and
- 18 any information and maps that the board by rule may prescribe.
- 19 As soon as practicable thereafter, the board shall cause a
- 20 public notice to be given in the county where the lands are
- 21 located, at least once in each of three successive weeks,
- 22 setting forth the description of the land, and the minerals

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- 1 desired to be leased. The board may hold the public auction of
- 2 the mining lease within six months from the date of the first
- 3 notice or any further time that may be reasonably necessary.
- 4 Whether or not the state land sought to be auctioned is then
- 5 being utilized or put to some productive use, the board, after
- 6 due notice of public hearing to all parties in interest, within
- 7 six weeks from the date of the first notice or any further time
- 8 that may be reasonably necessary, shall determine whether the
- 9 proposed mining operation or the existing or reasonably
- 10 foreseeable future use of the land would be of greater benefit
- 11 to the State. If the board determines that the existing or
- 12 reasonably foreseeable future use would be of greater benefit to
- 13 the State than the proposed mining use of the land, it shall
- 14 disapprove the application for a mining lease of the land
- 15 without putting the land to auction. The board shall determine
- 16 the area to be offered for lease and, after due notice of public
- 17 hearing to all parties in interest, may modify the boundaries of
- 18 the land areas. At least thirty days prior to the holding of
- 19 any public auction, the board shall cause a public notice to be
- 20 given in the State at least once in each of three successive
- 21 weeks, setting forth the description of the land, the minerals
- 22 to be leased, and the time and place of the auction. Bidders at



- 1 the public auction may be required to bid on the amount of
- 2 annual rental to be paid for the term of the mining lease based
- 3 on an upset price fixed by the board, a royalty based on the
- 4 gross proceeds or net profits, cash bonus, or any combination or
- 5 other basis and under any terms and conditions that may be set
- 6 by the board.
- 7 (b) Any provisions to the contrary notwithstanding, if the
- 8 person who discovers the mineral discovers it as a result of
- 9 exploration permitted under section 182-6, and if that person
- 10 bids at the public auction on the mining lease for the right to
- 11 mine the discovered mineral and is unsuccessful in obtaining
- 12 such lease, that person shall be reimbursed by the person
- 13 submitting the highest successful bid at public auction for the
- 14 direct or indirect costs incurred in the exploration of the
- 15 land, excluding salaries, [attorneys] attorney's fees, and legal
- 16 expenses. The department shall have the authority to review and
- 17 approve all expenses and costs that may be reimbursed.
- 18 (c) Any proposed mining operations to be undertaken by a
- 19 renewable energy producer, as defined in section 171-95, shall
- 20 require an application to the board for a mining lease on state
- 21 lands. Any provisions to the contrary notwithstanding, such
- 22 application for a mining lease on state lands may be granted by



- 1 the board in accordance with this section, or the board may, by
- 2 the vote of two-thirds of the members to which the board is
- 3 entitled, grant a mining lease to the renewable energy producer
- 4 without public auction."
- 5 SECTION 6. Section 182-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 6 amended to read as follows:
- 7 "§182-5 Mining leases on reserved lands. If any mineral
- 8 is discovered or known to exist on reserved lands, any
- 9 interested person may notify the board [of land and natural
- 10 resources] of the person's desire to apply for a mining lease.
- 11 The notice shall be accompanied by [a fee of \$100] the required
- 12 fees, as established by the department, together with a
- 13 description of the land desired to be leased and the minerals
- 14 involved and such information and maps as the board may by
- 15 [regulation] rule prescribe. The board may grant a mining lease
- 16 on reserved lands in accordance with section 182-4, or the board
- 17 may, by the vote of two-thirds of [its] the members to which the
- 18 board is entitled, without public auction, grant a mining lease
- 19 on reserved lands to the occupier thereof. Such a mining lease
- 20 may be granted to a person other than the occupier if the
- 21 occupier has assigned the occupier's rights to apply for a
- 22 mining lease to another person, in which case only such an



1 assignee may be granted a mining lease. Any provisions to the 2 contrary notwithstanding, if the board decides that it is 3 appropriate to grant a geothermal mining lease on the reserved 4 lands, the surface owner or the owner's assignee shall have the 5 first right of refusal for a mining lease. If the occupier or 6 the occupier's assignee of the right to obtain a mining lease 7 should fail to apply for a mining lease within six months from the date of notice from the board of a finding by the board that 8 9 it is in the public interest that the minerals on the reserved 10 lands be mined, a mining lease shall be granted under section 11 182-4; provided that bidders at the public auction shall bid on 12 an amount to be paid to the State for a mining lease granting to 13 the lessee the right to exploit minerals reserved to the State." 14 SECTION 7. Section 182-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows: 15 16 "§182-6 Exploration. Any person wishing to conduct **17** geothermal resources exploration on state or reserved lands 18 shall apply to the board [of land and natural resources who], 19 which shall issue exploration permits upon terms and conditions 20 as it shall by [regulation] rule prescribe. During and as a 21 result of the exploration, no minerals of such types and 22 quantity beyond that reasonably required for testing and 2014-0511 SB SMA-1.doc

- 1 analysis shall be extracted and removed from such state lands[-]
- 2 or reserved lands. Upon termination of the exploration permit,
- 3 all exploration data, including the drill logs and the results
- 4 of the assays resulting from the geothermal resources
- 5 exploration, shall be turned over to the board and kept
- 6 confidential by the board. If the person shall not make
- 7 application for a mining lease of the lands within a period of
- 8 six months from the date the information is turned over to the
- 9 board, the board in its discretion need not keep the information
- 10 confidential.
- 11 This section shall be construed as authorizing the board to
- 12 issue an exploration permit for geothermal resources as well as
- 13 minerals."
- 14 SECTION 8. Section 182-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 15 amended as follows:
- 1. By amending subsection (a) to read:
- "(a) Prior to the public auction contemplated in section
- 18 182-4 or 182-5, or the granting of mining lease without public
- 19 auction contemplated in section 182-4 or 182-5, the board [of
- 20 land and natural resources] shall cause a mining lease for the
- 21 land in question to be drawn. The lease shall describe the land
- 22 and shall contain, in addition to such other provisions which



- 1 the board may deem appropriate, specific provisions as provided
- 2 in this section."
- 3 2. By amending subsections (d) to (f) to read:
- 4 "(d) The lessee shall covenant and agree that the lessee
- 5 shall commence mining operations upon the leased lands within
- 6 three years from the date of execution of the lease; provided
- 7 that so long as the lessee is actively and on a substantial
- 8 scale engaged in mining operations on at least one such lease on
- 9 the same minerals, the covenant shall be suspended as to all
- 10 other leases held by the lessee.
- 11 Any interested party may, however, request that a mining
- 12 lease contain a research period under which the lessees shall be
- 13 required to expend money in research and development to
- 14 establish a method to make economical the mining and processing
- of the [mineral deposits contained] minerals identified in the
- 16 lease. If the board determines that the research period would
- 17 be beneficial, it shall fix the period of research and shall
- 18 also fix a minimum expenditure for labor performed or money
- 19 spent by the lessee [in] on research and development and the
- 20 method by which the lessee shall establish that such expenditure
- 21 in fact be made. In such leases, the obligation to commence

- 1 mining operations within three years shall not commence until
- 2 the expiration of the research period.
- 3 (e) For the period of the lease the lessee shall have the
- 4 exclusive right of possession of the minerals leased and the
- 5 exclusive rights to mine and remove the minerals by means which
- 6 shall be reasonable and satisfactory to the board and to occupy
- 7 and use so much of the surface of the land as may reasonably be
- 8 required, subject to the provisions of section 182-3. The right
- 9 to use the surface shall include the right to erect
- 10 transportation facilities thereon, construct plants for
- 11 beneficiating, drying, and processing the minerals for electric
- 12 power generation and transmission and such other uses as may be
- 13 approved by the board. Such other uses may include uses
- 14 necessary or convenient to the [winning and] processing of the
- 15 minerals; provided that the lessee shall comply with all water
- 16 and air pollution control laws, and rules of the State or its
- 17 political subdivisions.
- 18 (f) The lessee may retain all minerals separated from the
- 19 land as a part of the process of mining the minerals specified
- 20 in the mining lease; provided that the lease may prescribe the
- 21 accounting and testing procedures by which the amount and
- 22 quality of such additional materials shall be determined for the



- 1 purpose of computing the excise tax thereon[-] and applicable
- 2 royalty that may be set by the board for the use of such
- 3 minerals."
- 4 SECTION 9. Section 182-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 5 amended to read as follows:
- 6 "\$182-9 Deposit; first year's rental. All bidders shall,
- 7 prior to the date of public auction, post with the board [of
- 8 land and natural resources a deposit of \$500.] the required
- 9 deposit, as established by the department. The board shall
- 10 refund to unsuccessful bidders such amount within two days after
- 11 the auction. All bidders, prior to the auction, shall satisfy
- 12 the board of their financial ability to conduct mining
- 13 operations and of their capability to develop a mine. The
- 14 successful bidder shall pay to the board the amount of the first
- 15 year's rental within two days after the acceptance of the bid by
- 16 the board and the [\$500 deposit] required deposit, as
- 17 established by the department, shall be credited against such
- 18 sum. If the deposit exceeds the first year's rental, the excess
- 19 shall be refunded. All rentals thereafter are payable in
- 20 advance once a year."
- 21 SECTION 10. Section 182-10, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 22 amended to read as follows:

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"\$182-10 Revocation of mining leases. A mining lease may 1 2 be revoked if the lessee fails to pay rentals when due or if any 3 of the terms of the lease or of law are not complied with, or if 4 the lessee wholly ceases all mining operations for other than 5 reasons of force majeure or the uneconomic operation of the 6 mining lease for a period of one year without the written 7 consent of the board [of land and natural resources]; provided that the board shall give the lessee notice of any default and 8 9 the lessee shall have six months or such other time limit as 10 provided by the rules [and regulations] from the date of the 11 notice to remedy the default." 12 SECTION 11. Section 182-14, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 13 amended to read as follows: 14 "\$182-14 Rules [and regulations]. Subject to chapter 91, the board [of land and natural resources] may [make, promulgate] 15 16 adopt and amend such rules [and regulations] as it deems 17 necessary to carry out this chapter and to perform its duties 18 thereunder, all commensurate with and for the purpose of 19 protecting the public interest. All such rules [and 20 regulations | shall have the force and effect of law." SECTION 12. Section 182-17, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 21

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amended to read as follows:

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1	"[+]§182-17[+] Penalty for violation. (a) Any person who
2	violates any provision of this chapter, or any [regulation] rule
3	adopted pursuant hereto[, shall be fined not more than \$500 for
4	each offense.] to this chapter may be subject to a fine imposed
5	by the board. Such fine shall not exceed \$5,000 per violation.
6	If any person after receiving written notice for a violation
7	fails to cure such violation within such time and under such
8	conditions as determined by [the rules and regulations,] the
9	board, such person shall be subject to a citation for a new and
10	separate violation. There shall be a fine $\underline{\text{of}}$ not more than
11	[\$500] $$5,000$ for each additional violation.
12	(b) No provision of this chapter shall bar the right of
13	any injured person to seek other legal or equitable relief
14	against a violator of this chapter.
15	(c) Except as otherwise provided by law, the board or its
16	authorized representative by proper delegation may set, charge,
17	and collect administrative fines or bring legal action to
18	recover administrative fees and costs as documented by receipts
19	or affidavit, including attorney's fees and costs; or bring
20	legal action to recover administrative fines, fees, and costs,
21	including attorney's fees and costs, or payment for damages

- 1 resulting from a violation of this chapter or any rule adopted
- pursuant to this chapter."
- 3 SECTION 13. Sections 182-3(a), 182-11, 182-13, and 182-15,
- 4 Hawaii Revised Statutes, are amended by substituting the word
- 5 "board" wherever the phrase "board of land and natural
- 6 resources" appears, as the context requires.
- 7 SECTION 14. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 8 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 9 SECTION 15. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
