A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SALARY PERIODS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that, prior to the 2 implementation of the payroll lag for public employees, Hawaii 3 law did not allow any employer to delay payment of wages to an 4 employee for more than seven days after the end of a pay 5 period. The legislature believes that prompt payment of wages 6 earned is a fair and sound fiscal policy and that, currently, there are no facts to justify a payroll lag for public employees 7 8 whose base salaries often are already quite low. To require 9 public employees to wait longer to receive the paychecks that 10 they have already earned lowers the value of the wages that 11 public employees receive. Excessive delays are unfair to public 12 employees and constitute poor business and management practices. 13 The purpose of this Act is to ensure fair and timely 14 payment of wages to public employees by repealing the State's 15 authority to engage in unacceptable and abusive payroll delays.
- 16 SECTION 2. Section 78-13, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 17 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

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               Unless otherwise provided by law, all officers and
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    employees shall be paid at least semimonthly except that
    substitute teachers, part-time hourly rated teachers of adult
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    and evening classes, and other part-time, intermittent, or
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    casual employees may be paid once a month [and that the
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    governor, upon reasonable notice and upon determination that the
    payroll payment basis should be converted from predicted payroll
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    to after-the-fact payroll, may allow a one-time once a month
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    payroll payment to all public officers and employees to effect a
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    conversion to after-the-fact payroll as follows:
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         (1) The implementation of the after-the-fact payroll will
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              commence with the June 30, 1998, pay day, which will
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              be delayed to July 1, 1998;
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         (2) The July 15, 1998, pay day will be delayed to July 17,
              1998;
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         (3) The July 31, 1998, pay day will be delayed to August
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              3, 1998;
              The August 14, 1998, pay day will be delayed to August

              19, 1998;
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         (5) The August 31, 1998, pay day will be delayed to
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              September 4, 1998;
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1	(6)	The September 15, 1998, pay day will be delayed to
2		September 18, 1998; and
3	(7)	Thereafter, pay days will be on the fifth and the
4		twentieth of every month. If the fifth and the
5		twentieth fall on a state holiday, Saturday, or
6		Sunday, the pay day will be the immediately preceding
7		weekday.
8	The imple	mentation of the after-the-fact payroll shall not be
9	subject t	o negotiation under chapter 89.]. Payday shall be on
10	the first	and fifteenth of each month. If the first or the
11	fifteenth day falls on a state holiday, Saturday, or Sunday, the	
12	payday shall be the immediately preceding weekday. The	
13	implementation of the predicted payroll shall not be subject to	
14	negotiation under chapter 89."	
15	SECT	ION 3. The governor and the comptroller, in
16	implementing this Act, shall take any necessary steps to ensure	
17	that minimal disruptions occur in the payment of salary or wages	
18	to public employees.	
19	SECT	ION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
20	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.	
21	SECT	ION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
