A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII CHILD WELFARE EDUCATION COLLABORATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the department of 2 human services has lost a large portion of its child welfare 3 services staff since 2009 and is still working to rebuild with 4 suitable experienced social workers. Twenty-one per cent of 5 child welfare services positions were eliminated during the 6 2009-2010 reduction in force. By nature, child welfare services 7 also experience attrition of its valuable workforce due to the 8 intense and difficult circumstances under which child welfare 9 services employees work. As of December 2013, child welfare 10 services had sixty-four vacant positions.

11 The legislature also finds that the department will face a 12 critical shortage of experienced child welfare services workers 13 and leaders in the coming five years. As of 2012, thirty-six 14 per cent of the child welfare services workforce had twenty-one 15 or more years of experience. However, there is concern about 16 impending retirements as more than thirty-six per cent of staff is fifty years of age or older, and almost thirty per cent of 17 18 staff is in their forties.

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1 The legislature further finds that between 1998 and 2008, 2 the department of human services, child welfare services branch, 3 and the University of Hawaii, Myron B. Thompson school of social 4 work, successfully ran the Hawaii child welfare education 5 collaboration. The program admitted one hundred nine students, 6 one hundred of which completed the program and twenty-five of 7 which are still employed at the department in child welfare 8 services positions.

9 The Hawaii child welfare education collaboration was a 10 successful workforce recruitment and training program that 11 provided a continuous stream of qualified social workers to fill 12 vacant child welfare positions. Each year, full-time and part-13 time students enter the program and receive a specialized child 14 welfare services curriculum, field integration seminars, and 15 practicum placement in child welfare settings. In return for 16 reimbursement of tuition, fees, and required educational 17 expenses, participants of the program, if restored pursuant to 18 this Act, will agree to become employed in child welfare 19 services for a minimum of three years after graduation. The 20 Hawaii child welfare education collaboration is needed to help 21 fill the current child welfare services position vacancies and 22 establish a future workforce of experienced child welfare



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workers. The program will not only help the department meet
 federal and state statutory mandates to keep children safe and
 avoid financial penalties, it will most importantly help keep
 Hawaii's children safe and increase the level of services for
 Hawaii's families.

Accordingly, the intent of this Act is to build a workforce
of highly qualified social workers who will increase the level
of child welfare services in Hawaii and improve outcomes for
Hawaii's children.

10 The purpose of this Act is to make an appropriation to the
11 University of Hawaii to restore the Hawaii child welfare
12 education collaboration between child welfare services and the
13 Myron B. Thompson school of social work.

SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$353,176 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for the Hawaii child welfare education collaboration between the department of human services, child welfare services branch and the University of Hawaii Myron B. Thompson school of social work.

The sum appropriated shall be expended by the University ofHawaii for the purposes of this Act.

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SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2014.
