A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO BEACH MANAGEMENT FOR THE NORTH SHORE OF OAHU.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the northwest facing

2 shore of the north shore of Oahu, stretching from Sunset beach

3 to Waimea bay, is a spectacular coastline of primary importance

4 to state residents and visitors from around the world for its

5 beautiful sandy beaches, famous surf breaks, recreational

6 opportunities, marine resources and wildlife, and vistas.

7 Several important north shore beaches are at increasing risk of

erosion and deterioration from a combination of high energy

9 waves, winter surf, tsunami events, sea level rise and climate

10 change, and coastal erosion and intensive use by people

11 accessing the shoreline. Estimates indicate that nearly half of

12 all visitors to Oahu visit the north shore during their stay,

13 and most of the shoreline beach parks and coastal access areas

14 along the north shore have visibly inadequate infrastructure to

15 handle the high number of residents and the millions of visitors

16 who are attracted to these beaches each year, causing additional

17 erosion and damage to natural resources.

Recently, homes in the Ke Nui road area on the north shore 1 2 have been damaged and are still at risk from high surf and 3 eroding beaches, causing significant disruption and calls for government action in the short- and long-term for beachside 4 In addition, some key sections of Kamehameha 5 homeowners. 6 highway, including sections along Laniakea beach and Chun's reef, are currently subject to erosion due to high surf and 7 storm events, and loss of sand. The Pupukea marine life 8 9 conservation district, which stretches from Waimea bay to 10 Shark's cove, is experiencing high levels of shoreline erosion due to poor management, severely eroded walkways due to lack of 11 12 infrastructure and planning, and parking lot and road collapse 13 due to sink holes and over-use. Other areas along the coastline 14 are at risk from the lack of overall planning for protection of 15 the beaches, beach access areas, and shoreline uses. 16 Nonetheless, Hawaii's beaches and coastline are part of the 17 public trust, held by the State for the benefit of the people, 18 and the State has a fiduciary duty to affirmatively protect 19 beaches and coastal access. 20 Therefore, the legislature finds that long-term protection 21 of the northwest-facing north shore beaches from Sunset beach to

Waimea bay, which are subject to a common wave regime and share

common beach erosion characteristics, requires a comprehensive

    assessment and modern management plan that recognizes the risks

    of climate change and sea level rise. The large number of
    government, business, private, and community entities involved
4

    in the north shore would benefit from participating in the
6
    development and implementation of a comprehensive beach
7
    management plan for this vulnerable area.

         In 2010, the University of Hawaii sea grant college program
9
    successfully produced a beach and dune management plan for
10
    Kailua beach, which provided an extensive analysis of the
    current state of this important beach and recommended management
11

    measures for federal, state, and local government, as well as
13
    community partners, in response to threats such as climate
14
    change and sea level rise. This study serves as a useful
15
    prototype for the implementation of beach management plans at
16
    other locations and demonstrates the effectiveness of location-
17
    specific beach management policies and practices, which the
18
    north shore would greatly benefit from. The north shore's
19
    northwest-facing coastline is more than five times longer than
20
    the 2.6 mile stretch of Kailua beach surveyed and will require
21
    greater funding and resources to accomplish such comprehensive

1 The purpose of this Act is to provide funds for the 2 University of Hawaii sea grant college program to create a north 3 shore beach management plan covering the area from Sunset beach to Waimea bay, with substantial community input, over a two-year 4 5 period. 6 SECTION 2. (a) The University of Hawaii sea grant college 7 program shall, over a period of two years, create a north shore beach management plan for the north shore of Oahu stretching 8 from Sunset beach to Waimea bay. Recommendations may include 9 10 innovative means to address erosion of private property. 11 addition, recommendations may include planning to set homes and vehicular traffic back from the beach and ensure that 12 13 recreational access, vistas, and traffic issues relating to the receding coastline will be addressed. 14 The plan under subsection (a) shall include: 15 (b) Substantial community input; 16 (1)17 (2) Various scenarios covering a period of twenty to one 18 hundred years; 19 (3) Temporary and emergency erosion management; 20 (4)Beach and dune management techniques based on sediment

transport;

         The sum appropriated shall be expended by the University of

    Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.

1 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2014.
