A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Act 253, Session Laws of Hawaii 2000, and Act
2	300, Session Laws of Hawaii 2006, sought to reduce the number of
2	300, Session Daws of Hawaii 2000, Sought to reduce the number of
3	civil service exempt employees in public service within the
4	State. The legislature finds that since the enactment of these
5	Acts, there have been few conversions of civil service exempt
6	positions to civil service positions and conversions are
7	overdue.
8	The purpose of this Act is to:
9	(1) Require, rather than permit, hiring to be done in
10	accordance with civil service laws when the state
11	historic preservation division of the department of
12	land and natural resources hires professional and
13	technical staff; and
14	(2) Require any civil service exempt positions created
15	after July 1, 2014, to expire after three years of its
16	enactment unless affirmatively extended by the

legislature.

9		normal civil service recruitment procedures. Any such
10		contract may be for any period not exceeding one year;

13		determines that recruitment through normal recruitment
14		civil service procedures would result in delay or
15		noncompliance, such as the Felix-Cayetano consent

(26)	Positions in the Hawaii National Guard youth and adult
	education programs; and

1	(27) From July 1, 2012, to June 30, 2015, persons hired or
2	contracted to perform repair, maintenance, or capital
3	improvement projects work on vacant housing units

8	Nothing in this section shall be deemed to affect the civil

10	SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
11	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
12	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050;
13	provided that the amendments made to section 76-16(b), Hawaii
14	Revised Statutes, by this Act shall not be repealed when section
15	76-16(b), Hawaii Revised Statutes, is reenacted on July 1, 2015,
16	pursuant to section 5 of Act 159, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012.
