A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII ELECTION CAMPAIGN FUND.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Hawaii election
- 2 campaign fund was established pursuant to article II, section 5,
- 3 of the Hawaii State Constitution to provide funds for partial
- 4 public financing of campaigns for public offices of the State
- 5 and its political subdivisions. Candidate public financing
- 6 programs are voluntary programs in which public funds are
- 7 provided to candidates who agree to limit their campaign
- 8 spending. The primary purpose of these types of programs is to
- 9 reduce the role of large amounts of private money raised in
- 10 political campaigns and the obligations that are or can appear
- 11 to be associated with these contributions.
- 12 The Hawaii election campaign fund currently provides
- 13 funding for the partial public funding program and the
- 14 comprehensive public funding pilot program for the county of
- 15 Hawaii. However, the viability of those programs depends on the
- 16 amount of funds in the Hawaii election campaign fund. On
- 17 September 1, 2013, the campaign spending commission determined
- 18 that the comprehensive public funding pilot program would be 2014-0903 SB SMA-1.doc



- 1 inoperative for the 2014 election because the Hawaii election
- 2 campaign fund did not contain the statutorily required minimum
- 3 amount of \$3,500,000.
- 4 Furthermore, the partial public funding program and the
- 5 comprehensive public funding pilot program for the county of
- 6 Hawaii fail to provide sufficient financial incentives for
- 7 candidates to participate in these programs to adequately
- 8 compete against candidates who receive campaign contributions
- 9 from private sources. Thus, both programs have low
- 10 participation rates. For example, during the 2012 election, the
- 11 campaign spending commission reported that twenty-two candidates
- 12 received public funds under the partial public funding program
- 13 and a total of \$145,696 in public funds was disbursed from the
- 14 Hawaii election campaign fund. Also during the same election
- 15 year, eight candidates received public funds under the
- 16 comprehensive public funding pilot program for the county of
- 17 Hawaii and a total of \$215,344.23 in public funds was disbursed
- 18 from the Hawaii election campaign fund.
- 19 The purpose of this Act is to require the campaign spending
- 20 commission to collaborate with the legislative reference bureau
- 21 to submit proposed legislation to the legislature prior to the
- 22 regular session of 2015 to amend the partial public funding



- 1 program, with the goals of increasing candidate participation
- 2 and providing a competitive level of funding if the Hawaii
- 3 election campaign fund is infused with additional revenue.
- 4 SECTION 2. (a) The campaign spending commission shall
- 5 collaborate with the legislative reference bureau to draft
- 6 proposed legislation that amends the partial public funding
- 7 program under chapter 11, part XIII, subpart J, Hawaii Revised
- 8 Statutes, to increase candidate participation and enable the
- 9 program to provide a competitive level of funding if the Hawaii
- 10 election campaign fund is infused with additional revenue. The
- 11 campaign spending commission may request the assistance and
- 12 services of employees of any other department, board, bureau,
- 13 commission, task force, or agency as it may require and as may
- 14 be available to facilitate its work.
- 15 (b) The campaign spending commission, in collaboration
- 16 with the legislative reference bureau, shall draft proposed
- 17 legislation relating to the partial public funding program that
- 18 shall include but not be limited to amendments that:
- 19 (1) Establish qualifications for candidates seeking
- 20 certification for partial public funding including an
- 21 application process for certification, such as the

17		matching funds to certified candidates under the		
18		partial public funding program each election year;		
19		provided that the campaign spending commission shall:		
20		(A) Provide matching funds to a certified candidate		
21		from the Hawaii election campaign fund on a		
22		three-to-one basis;

1		(B)	Establish the base amount for matching funds for
2			each district by comparing the average amount
3			spent by the winning candidate in the previous
4			two general elections for the same district with
5			the average amount spent by all winning
6			candidates in the previous two general elections
7			for all districts statewide for the same office
8			and selecting the higher amount;
9		(C)	Establish that the base amount for matching funds
10			for each district shall be the expenditure limit
11			for each candidate seeking election in that
12			district; and
13		(D)	Establish that the maximum amount for which
14			matching funds will be provided to certified
15			candidates shall be based on a percentage of the
16			base amount for matching funds. This percentage
17			shall be determined by the campaign spending
18			commission based on the amount of moneys in the
19			Hawaii election campaign fund;
20	(5)	Esta	blish an order of priority, from highest to
21		lowe	st, for receipt of partial public funding as

follows: office of state representative, office of

3	(6)	Establish threshold amounts in the Hawaii election		
4		campaign fund that must be met in order for each		
5		office to receive partial public funds following the		
6		order of priority under paragraph (5);		
7	(7)	Establish guidelines for the use of partial public		
8		funds, disbursement of partial public funds, and		
9		penalties for any violations;		
10	(8)	Specify reporting requirements for candidates
