A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the public utilities 2 commission is undergoing a major transition due to increased 3 work complexity and program responsibilities, particularly in 4 the area of energy regulation. To ensure that the mission of 5 the public utilities commission is adequately supported, the 6 commission should be transferred from an administratively 7 attached agency of the department of budget and finance to an 8 administratively attached agency of the department of commerce 9 and consumer affairs, which can provide the commission with the 10 additional administrative support and resources it needs. 11 The legislature further finds that the chair and other 12 commissioners of the public utilities commission have not 13 received a raise since 2005. Since that time, the duties and 14 workload of the chair and commissioners have significantly 15 increased. The legislature concludes that raising the 16 compensation for the chair and the commissioners is a proper 17 acknowledgment of the commission's increased workload and the 18 additional time the chair and commissioners must invest to 2014-1605 SB451 SD1 SMA-1.doc

complete their duties. An increase in compensation will also 1 2 ensure that the salaries of the chair and commissioners remain 3 competitive with other states' public utilities commissions. The legislature additionally finds that the chair of the 4 5 commission is in need of an executive officer to assist with 6 managing the operations of the commission. Hiring of an 7 executive officer in charge of management and recruitment of 8 personnel, budget planning and implementation, strategic 9 planning and implementation, contract administration, and implementation of administrative programs and projects will 10 11 enable the chair of the commission to focus on the growing 12 number and increasingly technical complexity of issues brought 13 before the commission. 14 The legislature also finds that the division of consumer 15 advocacy of the department of commerce and consumer affairs protects and advances the interests of Hawaii's consumers of 16 regulated public utilities. The executive director and staff 17 members of the division of consumer advocacy attend public 18 19 hearings held by the public utilities commission to get input 20 from the public, which helps them to better understand the 21 consumer's perspective on utility services and rates. - the legislature concludes that the executive director of the 1 2 division of consumer advocacy, rather than the director of 3 commerce and consumer affairs, should be the consumer advocate 4 in hearings before the public utilities commission. 5 The purpose of this Act is to adequately support the mission of the public utilities commission, ensure the efficient 6 operation of the public utilities commission, and ensure 7 8 important decisions relating to public utilities continue to be 9 made in the public interest by: Specifying that the public utilities commission is an 10 (1) autonomous agency of the State to be transferred from 11 the department of budget and finance and assigned, for 12 administrative purposes only, to the department of 13 commerce and consumer affairs; 14 Increasing the compensation of the chair and 15 (2) 16 commissioners of the public utilities commission; Clarifying the public utilities commission's authority 17 (3) concerning standard administrative practices, 18 19 including operational expenditures and the hiring of
- 21 (4) Enabling the chair of the public utilities commission 22 to appoint, employ, and dismiss an executive officer

- 12 department of commerce and consumer affairs shall be borne by
- 13 the appropriations allocation to the public utilities commission
- 14 or the department of commerce and consumer affairs with no
- 15 liabilities or liens arising from such relocation activity
- 16 accruing to the department of budget and finance.
- 17 SECTION 17. There shall be a transition period to
- 18 facilitate the transfer of the public utilities commission from
- 19 the department of budget and finance to the department of
- 20 commerce and consumer affairs. The year following July 1, 2014,
- 21 shall serve as a transition period, in which the state agencies
- 22 affected by this Act shall assist the chairperson in

- 1 implementing the transfer under this Act. Once the transfer is
- 2 completed, the department of commerce and consumer affairs shall
- 3 provide public notice that the transfer is completed in a
- 4 printed publication or electronic format that is accessible
- 5 statewide.
- 6 SECTION 18. The provisions of this Act are to be liberally
- 7 construed to effectuate its purpose.
- 8 SECTION 19. All Acts passed by the legislature during the
- 9 regular session of 2014, whether enacted before or after the
- 10 effective date of this Act, shall be amended to conform to this
- 11 Act unless such acts specifically provide that this Act is being
- 12 amended.
- 13 SECTION 20. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 14 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 15 SECTION 21. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.

Specifies that the public utilities commission is an autonomous agency of the State to be transferred from the department of budget and finance and assigned, for administrative purposes only, to the department of commerce and consumer affairs. Increases the compensation of the chair and commissioners of the public utilities commission. Clarifies the public utilities commission's authority concerning standard administrative practices, including operational expenditures and the hiring of personnel. Enables the chair of the public utilities commission to appoint, employ, and dismiss an executive officer to assist with managing the operations of the commission. Specifies that the executive director of the division of consumer advocacy shall be the consumer advocate in hearings before the public utilities commission. Appropriates funds for the transfer of the public utilities commission and for the hiring of an executive officer within the public utilities commission. Effective 07/01/2050. (SD1)
