A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the public utilities 2 commission is undergoing a major transition due to increased 3 work complexity and program responsibilities, particularly in 4 the area of energy regulation. To ensure that the mission of 5 the public utilities commission is adequately supported, the 6 commission should be transferred from an administratively 7 attached agency of the department of budget and finance to an 8 administratively attached agency of the department of commerce 9 and consumer affairs, which can provide the commission with the 10 additional administrative support and resources it needs. 11 The legislature further finds that the chair and other 12 commissioners of the public utilities commission have not 13 received a raise since 2005. Since that time, the duties and 14 workload of the chair and commissioners have significantly 15 increased. The legislature concludes that raising the 16 compensation for the chair and the commissioners is a proper 17 acknowledgment of the commission's increased workload and the 18 additional time the chair and commissioners must invest to 2014-1504 SB451 SD1 SMA-1.doc

1 complete their duties. An increase in compensation will also 2 ensure that the salaries of the chair and commissioners remain 3 competitive with other states' public utilities commissions. 4 The legislature additionally finds that the chair of the 5 commission is in need of an executive officer to assist with 6 managing the operations of the commission. Hiring of an 7 executive officer in charge of management and recruitment of 8 personnel, budget planning and implementation, strategic 9 planning and implementation, contract administration, and 10 implementation of administrative programs and projects will 11 enable the chair of the commission to focus on the growing 12 number and increasingly technical complexity of issues brought 13 before the commission. 14 The legislature also finds that the division of consumer advocacy of the department of commerce and consumer affairs 15 16 protects and advances the interests of Hawaii's consumers of 17 regulated public utilities. The executive director and staff 18 members of the division of consumer advocacy attend public 19 hearings held by the public utilities commission to get input 20 from the public, which helps them to better understand the 21 consumer's perspective on utility services and rates. Section 26-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows: 2 3 "(c) The board of acupuncture, board of public accountancy, board of barbering and cosmetology, boxing 4 5 commission, board of chiropractic examiners, contractors license 6 board, board of dental examiners, board of electricians and plumbers, elevator mechanics licensing board, board of 7 8 professional engineers, architects, surveyors, and landscape 9 architects, board of massage therapy, Hawaii medical board, 10 motor vehicle industry licensing board, motor vehicle repair 11 industry board, board of naturopathic medicine, board of 12 nursing, board of examiners in optometry, pest control board, 13 board of pharmacy, board of physical therapy, board of 14 psychology, board of private detectives and guards, real estate 15 commission, board of veterinary examiners, board of speech 16 pathology and audiology, and any board, commission, program, or 17 entity created pursuant to or specified by statute in 18 furtherance of the purpose of this section including but not 19 limited to section 26H-4, or chapters 484, 514A, 514B, and 514E 20 shall be placed within the department of commerce and consumer affairs for administrative purposes. 21

1 The public utilities commission shall be an autonomous 2 agency of the State. The public utilities commission shall be 3 assigned, for administrative purposes only, to the department of 4 commerce and consumer affairs." 5 SECTION 4. Section 269-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows: 6 7 "\$269-2 Public utilities commission; number, appointment 8 of commissioners, qualifications; compensation; persons having 9 interest in public utilities[+]; autonomous agency; authority. 10 (a) There shall be a public utilities commission of three 11 members, to be called commissioners, and who shall be appointed 12 in the manner prescribed in section 26-34, except as otherwise provided in this section. All members shall be appointed for 13 14 terms of six years each, except that the terms of the members 15 first appointed shall be for two, four, and six years, 16 respectively, as designated by the governor at the time of 17 appointment. The governor shall designate a member to be 18 chairperson of the commission. Each member shall hold office 19 until the member's successor is appointed and qualified. 20 Section 26-34 shall not apply insofar as it relates to the 21 number of terms and consecutive number of years a member can

- 1 serve on the commission; provided that no member shall serve
- 2 more than twelve consecutive years.
- 3 In appointing commissioners, the governor shall select
- 4 persons who have had experience in accounting, business,
- 5 engineering, government, finance, law, or other similar fields.
- 6 The commissioners shall devote full time to their duties as
- 7 members of the commission and no commissioner shall hold any
- 8 other public office or other employment during the
- 9 commissioner's term of office. No person owning any stock or
- 10 bonds of any public utility corporation, or having any interest
- in, or deriving any remuneration from, any public utility shall
- 12 be appointed a commissioner.
- (b) Effective July 1, [2005,] 2014, the chairperson of the
- 14 commission shall be paid a salary set at [eighty seven] ninety-
- 15 five per cent of the salary of the director of human resources
- 16 development, and each of the other commissioners shall be paid a
- 17 salary equal to ninety-five per cent of the chairperson's
- 18 salary. The commissioners shall be exempt from chapters 76 and
- 19 89 but shall be members of the state employees retirement system
- 20 and shall be eligible to receive the benefits of any state or
- 21 federal employee benefit program generally applicable to

1 officers and employees of the State, including those under 2 chapter 87A. 3 (c) The commission [is placed within the department of 4 budget and finance for administrative purposes.] shall be an 5 autonomous agency of the State and shall be assigned, for 6 administrative purposes only, to the department of commerce and 7 consumer affairs. The department of commerce and consumer 8 affairs shall not direct or exert authority over the day to day 9 operations or functions of the commission. 10 (d) Notwithstanding section 26-35(a)(5) to the contrary, 11 the commission's operational expenditures, such as the purchase of supplies, equipment, furniture, dues and subscriptions, 12 13 travel, consultant services, and staff training under specified 14 threshold limits to be agreed upon by the chairperson and 15 executive officer of the commission and the director of commerce 16 and consumer affairs, shall be subject to the review and 17 approval of the chairperson and executive officer and subject to 18 all applicable procurement laws and procedures; provided that 19 operational expenditures above the agreed upon threshold amount 20 may be reviewed and approved by the director of commerce and 21 consumer affairs."

1 SECTION 5. Section 269-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended to read as follows: "§269-3 Employment of assistants. (a) The chairperson of 3 the public utilities commission may appoint and employ 4 5 professional staff and other assistants for the public utilities 6 commission as the chairperson finds necessary for the performance of the commission's functions and define their 7 powers and duties. Notwithstanding section 26-35(a)(4) to the 8 9 contrary, the employment, appointment, applicable salary 10 schedules, promotion, transfer, demotion, discharge, and job 11 descriptions of all officers and employees of or under the jurisdiction of the commission shall be determined by the 12 13 chairperson and the executive officer, subject to applicable 14 personnel laws. The chairperson may appoint and, at pleasure, dismiss a chief administrator and attorneys as may be necessary, 15 16 and who shall be exempt from chapter 76. The chairperson may also appoint other staff with or without regard to chapter 76. 17 18 The chairperson of the commission shall appoint and employ an executive officer who shall be responsible for 19 20 managing the operations of the commission. The [director] executive director of the division of 3 consumer advocacy of the department of commerce and consumer 4 affairs shall be the consumer advocate in hearings before the 5 public utilities commission. The consumer advocate shall 6 represent, protect, and advance the interests of all consumers, 7 including small businesses, of utility services. The consumer 8 advocate shall not receive any salary in addition to the salary 9 received as [director] executive director of the division of 10 consumer advocacy of the department of commerce and consumer 11 affairs. 12 The responsibility for advocating the interests of the 13 consumer of utility services shall be separate and distinct from 14 the responsibilities of the public utilities commission and those assistants employed by the commission. As consumer 15 16 advocate, the [director] executive director of the division of 17 consumer advocacy of the department of commerce and consumer 18 affairs shall have full rights to participate as a party in 19 interest in all proceedings before the public utilities
- 21 SECTION 8. Section 269-52, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

Section 269-53, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 5 amended to read as follows: 6 "§269-53 Legal counsel. The [director] executive director 7 may appoint or retain, without regard to chapter 76, attorneys 8 to provide legal services for the division of consumer advocacy. 9 Nothing in this section precludes the [director] executive 10 director of the division of consumer advocacy of the department 11 of commerce and consumer affairs from requesting and securing 12 legal services from the attorney general and the department of the attorney general." 13 14 SECTION 10. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 15 or so 16 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 to 17 enable the chairperson of the public utilities commission to 18 appoint and employ an executive officer who shall be responsible 19 for managing the operations of the public utilities commission. 20 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the public 21 utilities commission for the purposes of this Act.

1 (a) No later than July 1, 2015, all rights, powers, functions, and duties of the department of budget and 2 3 finance as they relate to the public utilities commission are transferred to the department of commerce and consumer affairs. 4 (b) All officers and employees whose functions are 5 6 transferred by this Act shall be transferred with their 7 functions and shall continue to perform their regular duties 8 upon their transfer, subject to the state personnel laws and 9 this Act. 10 No officer or employee of the State having tenure shall 11 suffer any loss of salary, seniority, prior service credit, 12 vacation, sick leave, or other employee benefit or privilege as a consequence of this Act, and such officer or employee may be 13 14 transferred or appointed to a civil service position without the necessity of examination; provided that the officer or employee 15 possesses the minimum qualifications for the position to which 16 17 transferred or appointed; and provided that subsequent changes 18 in status may be made pursuant to applicable civil service and 19 compensation laws. 20 An officer or employee of the State who does not have 21 tenure and who may be transferred or appointed to a civil 22 service position as a consequence of this Act shall become a

- 1 civil service employee without the loss of salary, seniority,
- 2 prior service credit, vacation, sick leave, or other employee
- 3 benefits or privileges and without the necessity of examination;
- 4 provided that such officer or employee possesses the minimum
- 5 qualifications for the position to which transferred or
- 6 appointed.
- 7 If an office or position held by an officer or employee
- 8 having tenure is abolished, the officer or employee shall not
- 9 thereby be separated from public employment, but shall remain in
- 10 the employment of the State with the same pay and classification
- 11 and shall be transferred to some other office or position for
- 12 which the officer or employee is eligible under the personnel
- 13 laws of the State as determined by the head of the department or
- 14 the governor.
- 15 SECTION 12. All commissioners serving on the public
- 16 utilities commission on the date prior to the effective date of
- 17 this Act shall continue as members of the public utilities
- 18 commission and their terms shall be unaffected by this Act.
- 19 SECTION 13. All appropriations, records, equipment,
- 20 machines, files, supplies, contracts, books, papers, documents,
- 21 maps, and other personal property heretofore made, used,
- 22 acquired, or held by the department of budget and finance

- 1 relating to the functions transferred to the department of
- 2 commerce and consumer affairs shall be transferred with the
- 3 functions to which they relate.
- 4 SECTION 14. All rules, policies, procedures, guidelines,
- 5 general orders, and other material adopted or developed by the
- 6 public utilities commission as an administratively attached
- 7 agency of the department of budget and finance, to implement
- 8 chapters 269, 269E, 271, 271G, 486H, and 486J, Hawaii Revised
- 9 Statutes, that are reenacted or made applicable to the public
- 10 utilities commission as an administratively attached agency of
- 11 the department of commerce and consumer affairs by this Act
- 12 shall remain in full force and effect until amended or repealed
- 13 by the public utilities commission pursuant to chapter 91,
- 14 Hawaii Revised Statutes. In the interim, every reference to the
- 15 department of budget and finance or director of finance in those
- 16 rules, policies, procedures, guidelines, and other material is
- 17 amended to refer to the department of commerce and consumer
- 18 affairs or director of commerce and consumer affairs, as
- 19 appropriate.
- 20 SECTION 15. All deeds, leases, contracts, loans,
- 21 agreements, permits, or other documents executed or entered into
- 22 by or on behalf of the public utilities commission transferred

- 1 or placed for administrative purposes within the department of
- 2 commerce and consumer affairs shall remain in full force and
- 3 effect.
- 4 SECTION 16. All relocation cost or expenses associated
- 5 with transferring the public utilities commission to the
- 6 department of commerce and consumer affairs shall be borne by
- 7 the appropriations allocation to the public utilities commission
- 8 or the department of commerce and consumer affairs with no
- 9 liabilities or liens arising from such relocation activity
- 10 accruing to the department of budget and finance.
- 11 SECTION 17. There shall be a transition period to
- 12 facilitate the transfer of the public utilities commission from
- 13 the department of budget and finance to the department of
- 14 commerce and consumer affairs. The year following July 1, 2014,
- 15 shall serve as a transition period, in which the state agencies
- 16 affected by this Act shall assist the chairperson in
- 17 implementing the transfer under this Act. Once the transfer is
- 18 completed, the department of commerce and consumer affairs shall
- 19 provide public notice that the transfer is completed in a
- 20 printed publication or electronic format that is accessible
- 21 statewide.

- 3 SECTION 19. All Acts passed by the legislature during the
- 4 regular session of 2014, whether enacted before or after the
- $\mathbf{5}$ · effective date of this Act, shall be amended to conform to this
- 6 Act unless such acts specifically provide that this Act is being
- 7 amended.
- 8 SECTION 20. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 9 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 10 SECTION 21. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2014.

Specifies that the public utilities commission is an autonomous agency of the state to be transferred from the department of budget and finance and assigned, for administrative purposes only, to the department of commerce and consumer affairs. Increases the compensation of the chair and commissioners of the public utilities commission. Clarifies the public utilities commission's authority concerning standard administrative practices, including operational expenditures and the hiring of personnel. Enables the chair of the public utilities commission to appoint and employ an executive officer to assist with managing the operations of the commission. Specifies that the executive director of the division of consumer advocacy shall be the consumer advocate in hearings before the public utilities commission. Appropriates funds for the hiring of an executive officer within the public utilities commission. (Proposed SD1)
