A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HISTORIC PRESERVATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Act 388, Session
- 2 Laws of Hawaii 1989, which established the Hawaii historic
- 3 preservation special fund, set forth a set of guiding principles
- 4 that are even more compelling and relevant today than they were
- 5 in 1989:
- 6 "The legislature . . . finds that as we begin to compete
- 7 economically in the Pacific Basin, we are beginning to realize
- 8 that much of our strength lies in our own uniqueness those
- 9 factors that provide us with a distinct advantage over our
- 10 competitors. . . .
- 11 The legislature further finds that another distinct
- 12 advantage that has not been fully tapped is our unique historic
- 13 heritage. The preservation and enhancement of this valuable
- 14 resource can provide an additional attraction to our visitors in
- 15 addition to our beautiful climate, environment, and people. But
- 16 more important, the preservation of special elements of our past
- 17 can instill a distinct pride in our people and serve as a
- 18 reminder, through our historic buildings, documents,

- 1 photographs, and sites, that we are indeed a unique people and
- 2 that we have a deep appreciation and sense of our place.
- 3 The purpose of this Act is to establish a Hawaii historic
- 4 preservation special fund to enhance and preserve elements of
- 5 our past that should be integrated into our daily living."
- In the current economic climate, the legislature finds that
- 7 it is difficult to pursue new financial resources, including
- 8 private and philanthropic grants, to ensure the preservation of
- 9 Hawaii's heritage assets without a corresponding commitment on
- 10 the part of the State to provide an underlying baseline of state
- 11 funding support.
- 12 The purpose of this Act is to expand the uses of the Hawaii
- 13 historic preservation special fund and to capitalize on
- 14 accelerated construction programming proposed by the
- 15 administration to assist in the restoration and preservation of
- 16 such heritage assets as the Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museum, Iolani
- 17 Palace, Washington Place, and Mauna Ala.
- 18 SECTION 2. Section 6E-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 19 amended to read as follows:
- 20 "S6E-16 Hawaii historic preservation special fund. (a)
- 21 There is established a Hawaii historic preservation special fund
- 22 into which shall be deposited the following moneys:



1	(1)	Appropriations by the legislature to the special fund;						
2	(2)	Gifts, donations, and grants from public agencies and						
3		private persons;						
4	(3)	All proceeds collected by the department derived from						
5	historic preserve user fees, historic preserve leases							
6		or concession fees, fees charged to carry out the						
7		purposes of this chapter, or the sale of goods; [and]						
8	(4)	Civil, criminal, and administrative penalties, fines,						
9		and other charges collected under this chapter or any						
10		rule adopted pursuant to this chapter [-]; and						
11	(5)	per cent of the one per cent of all state fund						
12	appropriations for capital improvements that are							
13	transferred to the works of art special fund pursuant							
14	to section 103-8.5.							
15	All interest earned or accrued on moneys deposited [in] into the							
16	fund shall become part of the fund. The fund shall be							
17	administered by the department; provided that the department may							
18	contract with a public or private agency to provide the day-to-							
19	day management of the fund.							
20	(b)	Subject to legislative authorization, the [department						
21	may expend moneys from the fund:] moneys in the fund shall be							
22	expended solely for the following purposes:							



1	(1)	For permanent and temporary staff positions;
2	(2)	To replenish goods;
3	(3)	To produce public information materials;
4	(4)	To provide financial assistance to public agencies and
5		private agencies in accordance with chapter 42F
6		involved in historic preservation activities other
7		than those covered by section 6E-9; [and]
8	(5)	To cover administrative and operational costs of the
9		historic preservation program $[-]$; and
10	(6)	For costs related to site modifications, display, and
11		interpretive work necessary to enhance the visitor
12		experience for the Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museum,
13		Iolani Palace, Washington Place, and Mauna Ala,
14		including specific preventive maintenance and repairs
15		to restore these facilities to a condition reflecting
16		their status in Hawaii's history and the unique
17		heritage of its arts and culture; provided that the
18		ordinary maintenance or repair of any feature does not
19		involve a change in design, material, or outer
20		appearance or a change in the characteristics that
21		qualified the historic property for entry in the
22		Hawaii register of historic places.

1	(c) The [department shall adopt rules in accordance with
2	chapter 91 for the purposes of this section] amount under
3	subsection (a)(5) shall be transferred into the Hawaii historic
4	preservation special fund by the comptroller. From July 1,
5	2013, through June 30, 2017, when the transferred moneys exceed
6	\$ annually, any moneys in excess of \$, but
7	not more than \$, shall be expended by the comptroller
8	for the purposes of subsection (b)(6), pursuant to subsection
9	<u>(e).</u>
10	(d) The comptroller shall work with the Bernice Pauahi
11	Bishop Museum, Friends of Iolani Palace, Washington Place, and
12	state parks division of the department to decide on the specific
13	site modifications, display, interpretive work, and preventive
14	maintenance and repair projects to be undertaken at the
15	respective facilities for the purposes of subsection (b)(6).
16	(e) Expenditures from the Hawaii historic preservation
17	special fund shall be made by the comptroller."
18	SECTION 3. Section 103-8.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
19	amended by amending subsections (b) and (c) to read as follows:
20	"(b) The works of art special fund shall be used solely
21	for the following purposes:

1	(1)	Costs related to the acquisition of works of art,					
2		including any consultant or staff services required to					
3		carry out the art in public places and relocatable					
4		works of art programs;					
5	(2)	Site modifications, display, and interpretive work					
6		necessary for the exhibition of works of art;					
7	(3)	Upkeep services, including maintenance, repair, and					
8		restoration of works of art;					
9	(4)	Storing and transporting works of art[-]; and					
10	(5)	Deposit into the Hawaii historic preservation special					
11		fund for uses specified in section 6E-16.					
12	(c)	The one per cent amount, which is included in all					
13	capital i	mprovement appropriations, shall be calculated at the					
14	time the appropriation bills are signed into law. The moneys						
15	shall be	transferred into the works of art special fund upon					
16	availability of moneys from the appropriations. Each agency						
17	receiving	capital improvement appropriations shall calculate the					
18	one per c	ent amount and transfer the moneys into the works of					
19	art speci	al fund. Of the moneys transferred into the works of					
20	art speci	al fund, per cent shall be transferred to the					
21	Hawaii historic preservation special fund for uses specified in						
22	section 6	E-16."

1	SECTION 4	. The	comptroller	shall	submit	to	the	governor
2	and the legisl	ature:						

- 3 (1) No later than twenty days prior to the convening of
 4 the regular sessions of 2014, 2015, and 2016, a
 5 complete and detailed report on any site
 6 modifications, display, interpretive work, and
 7 specific preventive maintenance and repairs for the
 8 Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museum, Iolani Palace,
 9 Washington Place, and Mauna Ala; and
- No later than twenty days prior to the convening of 10 (2) the regular session of 2017, a final report on the 11 12 projects and expenditures for the Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museum, Iolani Palace, Washington Place, and 13 Mauna Ala, and recommendations for a long-term plan to 14 restore and protect state-owned historic heritage 15 properties and facilities to ensure that all Hawaii 16 residents and visitors are able to access and benefit 17 from the arts, culture, and heritage experiences that 18 these properties and facilities provide. 19
- 20 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 21 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

Description:

Requires an unspecified percentage of all state fund appropriations designated for the construction and renovation of state buildings to be deposited into the Hawaii historic preservation special fund. Adds the costs related to site modifications, display, and interpretive work necessary to enhance the visitor experience for the Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museum, Iolani Palace, Washington Place, and Mauna Ala to the uses of the fund. Requires reports to the governor and legislature.
