A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGRICULTURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

	BE II ENACIED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:
1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii is located
2	approximately 2,506 miles from the continental United States.
3	About eighty-five to ninety per cent of Hawaii's food is
4	imported which makes Hawaii particularly vulnerable to natural
5	disasters and global events that disrupt shipping and other
6	modes of transporting food. Furthermore, the economic impact of
7	food import replacement is significant. Food expenditures of
8	local consumers in 2004 to 2005 amounted to \$3,700,000,000.
9	Assuming that eighty-five per cent of the food we consume is
10	imported, this translates to \$3,145,000,000 of food expenditures
11	leaving the state each year.
12	The office of planning, in cooperation with the department
13	of agriculture, issued a report in October 2012, entitled
14	"Increased Food Security and Food Self-Sufficiency Strategy: A
15	State Strategic/Functional Plan Prepared in Accordance with HRS

16 Chapter 226 Hawaii State Plan and the Hawaii Comprehensive

17 Economic Development Strategy." The executive summary of the

18 report states in pertinent part, "The purpose of the *Increased* 2013-0200 SB SMA.doc



- 1 Food Security and Food Self-Sufficiency Strategy (Strategy) is
- 2 to increase the amount of locally grown food consumed by Hawaii
- 3 residents. This will increase food self-sufficiency which is a
- 4 component of food security. The Strategy is a living document
- 5 intended as a first step toward continued dialog and
- 6 implementation."
- 7 The three strategic objectives of the Increased Food
- 8 Security and Food Self-Sufficiency Strategy are increasing
- 9 demand for and access to locally grown foods, increasing
- 10 production of locally grown foods, and providing policy and
- 11 organizational support to meet food self-sufficiency needs.
- 12 The purpose of this Act is to implement the recommendations
- 13 of the Increased Food Security and Food Self-Sufficiency
- 14 Strategy by:
- (1) Establishing state planning and policy objectives for
- 16 the economy of increased demand for and access to
- 17 locally grown foods and increased production of
- 18 locally grown foods; and
- 19 (2) Making various appropriations accordingly.
- 20 SECTION 2. Chapter 141, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 21 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 22 and to read as follows:

3	departmen	t an agricultural development and food security program
4	that shal	l have the objectives described in section 226-6(a)."
5	SECT	ION 3. Section 226-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

16		islands where employment opportunities may be limited.
17	(2)	A steadily growing and diversified economic base that
18		is not overly dependent on a few industries, and
19		includes the development and expansion of industries
20		on the neighbor islands.
21	(3)	Increased demand for and access to locally grown foods

16	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and					
17	the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal					
18	year 2014-2015 for the department of agriculture to establish ar					
19	agricultural development and food security program pursuant to					
20	this Act.					
21	The sums	appropriated shall be expended by the department				
22	of agriculture	for the purposes of this Act.				

- 1 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general 2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and 3 4 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 5 year 2014-2015 for the department of agriculture to produce 6 product promotional materials along with other endeavors such as 7 in-store promotions. 8 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 9 of agriculture for the purposes of this Act. SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general 10 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 11 12 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and 13 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 14 year 2014-2015 for the department of agriculture to expand and 15 improve branding and labeling programs for locally grown foods. **16** The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department of agriculture for the purposes of this Act. 17 18 SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 19 or so 20 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and 21 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 22 year 2014-2015 for publicity to promote farmers markets.

- 3 SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the general
- 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so

- 7 year 2014-2015 for a farm to school pilot program in charter
- 8 schools of the State.

- 19 SECTION 10. There is appropriated out of the general
- 20 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 21 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and
- 22 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal



- 1 year 2014-2015 for the establishment of specialists to certify
- 2 farm food safety.
- The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 4 of agriculture for the purposes of this Act.
- 5 SECTION 11. There is appropriated out of the general
- 6 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 7 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and
- 8 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 9 year 2014-2015 to develop regional agriculture infrastructure
- 10 master plans.
- 11 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 12 of agriculture for the purposes of this Act.
- 13 SECTION 12. There is appropriated out of the general
- 14 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 15 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and
- 16 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 17 year 2014-2015 to restore positions in food inspection, pest
- 18 control, and biosecurity.
- 19 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 20 of agriculture for the purposes of this Act.
- 21 SECTION 13. There is appropriated out of the general
- 22 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so

- much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and 1
- 2 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- year 2014-2015 to restore positions in market research and 3
- agricultural statistics. 4
- 5 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 6 of agriculture for the purposes of this Act.
- 7 SECTION 14. There is appropriated out of the general
- revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 8 or so
- 9 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and
- 10 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 11 year 2014-2015 to provide funding for research, training, and
- 12 education on agricultural food development and food security.
- The sums appropriated shall be expended by the University 13
- 14 of Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.
- 15 SECTION 15. New statutory material is underscored.
- 16 SECTION 16. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
- **17** provided that sections 4 through 7 shall take effect on July 1,
- 18 2013.
