A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ELECTIONS BY MAIL.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to: enable the
2	office of elections to establish voting by mail for federal,
3	state, and county primary, general, and special elections; and
4	require that all elections be conducted by mail from the date of
5	the 2014 primary election.
6	SECTION 2. Chapter 11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
7	by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and to read
8	as follows:

9	§11-	Procedures for conducting elections by mail. (a)
10	Ballot pa	ckages shall:
11	(1)	Include the ballot, a prepaid postage return
12		identification envelope, a secrecy envelope, and
13		instructions; and
14	(2)	Be mailed to each voter at the voter's address not
15		sooner than days and no later than days
16		before the date of the election.
17	(b)	Notwithstanding the dates of mailing in subsection
18	(a), for 1	pallot packages to be mailed:
19	(1)	To voters who live in places that do not receive daily
20		mail service from the United States Postal Service,
21		the mailings shall be made in a manner that enables

1		the voter to vote by mail or in person on or before
2		the date of the election; and
3	(2)	To voters who request an absentee ballot, the mailing
4		shall be made in accordance with chapter 15 and the
5		rules adopted thereunder; and
6	(3)	To new voters who register after the last date of the
7	•	mailing provided in subsection (a), the mailing shall
8		be made in a manner that enables the voter to vote on
9		or before the date of the election.
10	(c)	Notwithstanding subsections (a) and (b), ballot
11	packages 1	may be delivered or made available to voters who are
12	unable to	receive ballot packages by mail and who request a
13	ballot pa	ckage be delivered or made available for pick-up by the
14	voter. T	he delivery and availability shall be made in a manner
15	and using	a method as will ensure confidentiality as provided in
16	section 1	1-14.5. The receipt of the ballot package shall be
17	made to t	he voter in a manner that enables the voter to vote on
18	or before	the date of the election.
19	§11-	Public notice of mailing. Public notice of the
20	date or da	ates that ballot packages are mailed, delivered, and
21	made avai	lable shall be given by the chief election officer and

all county election offices in the manner prescribed in section

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1 1-28.5 when all ballot packages have been mailed, delivered, and 2 made available to voters. 3 Undeliverable ballot packages. Ballot packages **\$11-**4 that are mailed or delivered shall not be forwardable or 5 deliverable beyond the address of the voter as shown in the 6 register established and maintained by the clerk of the 7 respective county pursuant to part II. A ballot package that is 8 determined to be undeliverable by mail or other means to the 9 voter at the address shown in the register because of the death 10 of the voter, refusal of any person living at that address, or 11 the voter moved and is no longer residing at that address shall 12 be returned to the clerk who initiated the mailing, and as to a 13 voter that has moved, the clerk shall mail, deliver, or make 14 available the ballot package to the voter after the clerk has 15 determined or has been provided the new address of the voter. 16 Ballot instructions; ballot return. (a) Upon receipt of the ballot package, the voter shall comply with the 17 instructions included in the ballot package. The instructions 18 19 shall include directions on marking the ballot, inserting the marked ballot in the secrecy envelope, inserting the secrecy 20

envelope with the ballot in the return identification envelope,

and signing of the return identification envelope before mailing



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- 1 or delivering the return identification envelope containing the
- 2 secrecy envelope with the marked ballot.
- 3 (b) The instructions shall include information on election
- 4 fraud and voter fraud, as provided in sections 19-3(5) and
- 5 19-3.5, and notice that violation of either section may subject
- 6 the voter, upon conviction, to imprisonment, a fine, or both.
- 7 (c) Voters shall return the identification envelope
- 8 containing the secrecy envelope with the marked ballot by mail
- 9 or by delivery to a place of deposit so that the return
- 10 identification envelope is received at the office of the clerk
- 11 or the place of deposit not later than the time provided in
- 12 section 11-131 on the date of the election.
- 13 §11- Replacement ballots. (a) A voter may obtain a
- 14 replacement ballot if the ballot is destroyed, spoiled, lost, or
- 15 not received by the clerk. Replacement ballots shall be
- 16 provided to a voter who completes and signs a replacement ballot
- 17 request form. The form of the replacement ballot request shall
- 18 include information that allows the clerk to verify the
- 19 registration of the voter and ensure that another ballot has not
- 20 been returned by the voter.
- 21 (b) Upon receipt of the replacement ballot request form,
- 22 the clerk shall:

1	(1)	Verify the registration of the voter and that another
2		ballot has not been returned by the voter;
3	(2)	Note on the registry of voters that the voter has
4		requested a replacement ballot;
5	(3)	Mark the return identification envelope as a
6		replacement ballot, and
7	(4)	Issue the ballot package containing the replacement
8		ballot by mail, by delivery, or by making the ballot
9		package available for pick up by the voter requesting
10		the replacement ballot.
11	(c)	Voters requesting a replacement ballot shall return
12	the ident	ification envelope containing the secrecy envelope with
13	the marke	d replacement ballot by mail or by delivery to a place
14	of deposi	t so that the return identification envelope is
15	received	at the office of the clerk or a place of deposit not
16	later tha	n the time provided in section 11-131 on the date of
17	the elect	ion.
18	§11-	Counting of mail-in ballots. A mail-in ballot
19	shall be	counted only if:
20	(1)	It is returned in the return identification envelope;
21	(2)	The return identification envelope is signed by the

voter to whom the ballot is mailed or delivered;

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1	(3)	The signature on the return identification envelope is
2		verified by the clerk with the signature of the voter
3		shown on the registry of voters; and
4	(4)	The return identification envelope is received at the
5		office of the clerk or at the place of deposit not
6		later than the time stated in section 11-131 on the
7		date of the election.
8	Not	sooner than the day before the date of the election,
9	the secre	cy envelope shall be opened in the preparation of the
10	counting	of the ballots on the date of the election; provided
11	that coun	ting of the mail-in ballots shall not commence sooner
12	than	o'clock on the date of the election."
13	SECT	ION 3. Section 11-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
14	amended a	s follows:
15	1.	By adding a new definition to be appropriately inserted
16	and to re	ad:
17	" <u>"</u> Pl	ace of deposit" means any state public library or any
18	other sit	e designated by the chief elections officer for
19	receiving	return identification envelopes in an election
20	conducted	by mail pursuant to part ."
21	2.	By amending the definitions of "ballot" and "voting
22	system" t	o read:

- 1 ""Ballot", a ballot including an absentee ballot is a 2 written or printed, or partly written and partly printed paper 3 or papers containing the names of persons to be voted for, the office to be filled, and the questions or issues to be voted on. 4 5 "Ballot" includes a ballot used in an election conducted by 6 mail. A ballot may consist of one or more cards or pieces of 7 paper, or one face of a card or piece of paper, or a portion of 8 the face of a card or piece of paper, depending on the number of 9 offices, candidates to be elected thereto, questions or issues 10 to be voted on, and the voting system in use. It shall also 11 include the face of the mechanical voting machine when arranged 12 with cardboard or other material within the ballot frames, 13 containing the names of the candidates and questions to be voted 14 on. "Voting system", the use of paper ballots, electronic 15 ballot cards, voting machines, voting by mail, or any system by 16 **17** which votes are cast and counted." 18 SECTION 4. Section 11-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 19 amended to read as follows:

"§11-4 Rules [and regulations]. The chief election



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1 procedures, and the selection, establishment, use, and operation 2 of all voting systems now in use or to be adopted in the State, 3 and all other similar matters relating thereto as in the chief 4 election officer's judgment shall be necessary to carry out this 5 title. In making, amending, and repealing rules [and regulations] 6 7 for voters who cannot vote at the polls in person or receive or 8 return ballots by mail, and all other voters, the chief election 9 officer shall provide for voting by [such] these persons in **10** [such] a manner as to [insure] ensure secrecy of the ballot and 11 to preclude tampering with the ballots of these voters and other 12 election frauds. [Such] The rules [and regulations], when 13 adopted in conformity with chapter 91 and upon approval by the 14 governor, shall have the force and effect of law." 15 SECTION 5. Section 11-17, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 16 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows: **17** "(a) The clerk, not later than 4:30 p.m. on the sixtieth 18 day after every general election, shall remove the name of any 19 registered voter who did not vote in that general election, and 20 also did not vote in the primary election preceding that general 21 election, and also did not vote in the previous general

election, and also did not vote in the primary election

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- 1 preceding that general election, and also did not vote in the
- 2 regularly scheduled special elections held in conjunction with
- 3 those primary and general elections, if any, with the exception
- 4 of:
- 5 (1) Those who submitted written requests for absentee
- 6 ballots as provided in section 15-4; or
- 7 (2) Anyone who preregistered pursuant to section 11-12(b).
- 8 If a person voted, at least once, in any of the above-mentioned
- 9 elections, the person's name shall remain on the list of
- 10 registered voters. For this purpose "vote" means the depositing
- 11 of the ballot in the ballot box whether the ballot is blank or
- 12 later rejected for any reason. In the case of voting machines,
- 13 "vote" means the voter has activated the proper mechanism and
- 14 fed the vote into the machine. In the case of an election by
- 15 mail conducted pursuant to part , "vote" means the voter has
- 16 returned the ballot to the county clerk by mail or by delivering
- 17 the ballot to a place of deposit."
- 18 SECTION 6. Section 11-92.1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 19 amended as follows:
- 20 1. By amending the title to read:
- 21 "\$11-92.1 Election proclamation; [establishment of a new
- 22 precincts."

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         2. By amending subsection (a) to read:
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         "(a) The chief election officer shall issue a proclamation
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    [whenever a new precinct is established in any representative
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    district.] listing all polling places and places of deposit.
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    The chief election officer shall provide [a suitable polling
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    place for each precinct.] one or more precincts within a
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    representative district as the chief elections officer deems
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    necessary for voters who are unable to participate in elections
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    by conducted by mail pursuant to part . Schools,
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    recreational halls, park facilities, and other publicly owned or
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    controlled buildings, whenever possible and convenient, shall be
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    used as polling places. The chief election officer shall make
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    arrangements for the rental or erection of suitable shelter for

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         In the event of a flood, tsunami, earthquake, volcanic
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    eruption, high wind, or other natural disaster, occurring prior
    to an election, that makes a precinct inaccessible, the chief
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    election officer or county clerk in the case of county elections
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    may consolidate precincts within a representative district.
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    the extent of damage caused by any natural disaster is such that
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    the ability of voters, in any precinct, district, or county, to
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    exercise their right to vote is substantially impaired, the
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    chief election officer or county clerk in the case of county
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    elections may [require the registered voters of the affected
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    precinct to vote by absentee ballot pursuant to section 15 2.5
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    and may postpone the conducting of an election in the affected
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    precinct for no more than twenty-one days; provided that any
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    such postponement shall not affect the conduct of the election,
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    tabulation, or distribution of results for those precincts,
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    districts, or counties not designated for postponement.

- 14 consideration for signing the same, whether the bribe
- or promise of gain be offered or accepted before or

- 17 (2) Any person who wilfully tears down or destroys or
- 18 defaces any election proclamation or any poster or
- notice or list of voters or visual aids or facsimile
- 20 ballot, issued or posted by authority of law;
- 21 (3) Any person printing or duplicating or causing to be
- 22 printed or duplicated any ballot, conforming as to the



1		size, weight, shape, thickness, or color to the
2		official ballot so that it could be cast or counted as
3		an official ballot in an election;
4	(4)	Every person who is disorderly or creates a
5		disturbance whereby any meeting of the precinct
6		officials or the board of registration of voters
7		during an election is disturbed or interfered with; or
8		whereby any person who intends to be lawfully present
9		at any meeting or election is prevented from
10		attending; or who causes any disturbance at any
11		election; and every person assisting or aiding or
12		abetting any disturbance;
13	(5)	Every person who, either in person or through another,
14		in any manner breaks up or prevents, or endeavors to
15		break up or prevent, the holding of any meeting of the
16		board of registration of voters, or in any manner
17		breaks up or prevents, or endeavors to break up or
18		prevent, the holding of any election;
19	(6)	Any person, other than those designated by section 11-
20		132, who remains or loiters within the area set aside
21		for voting as set forth in section 11-132 during the



time appointed for voting;

1	(7)	Any person, including candidates carrying on any
2		campaign activities within the area described in
3		section 11-132 during the period of time starting one
4		hour before the polling place opens and ending when
5		the polling place closes for the purpose of
6		influencing votes. Campaign activities shall include
7		the following:
8		(A) Any distribution, circulation, carrying, holding
9		posting, or staking of campaign cards, pamphlets
10		posters and other literature;
11		(B) The use of public address systems and other
12		public communication media;
13		(C) The use of motor caravans or parades; and
14		(D) The use of entertainment troupes or the free
15		distribution of goods and services;
16	(8)	Any person who opens a return envelope containing [an
17		absentee]:
18		(A) An absentee ballot voted under chapter 15, other
19		than those persons authorized to do so under
20		chapter 15; or
21		(B) A ballot voted under part other than those
22		authorized to do so under that part;

1	(9)	Any unauthorized person found in possession of any
2		voting machine or keys thereof;
3	(10)	Every person who wilfully violates or fails to obey
4		any of the provisions of law, punishment for which is
5		not otherwise in this chapter specially provided for."
6	SECTI	ON 9. Section 11-91.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	repealed.

18	primary or	general election, may be conducted by mail or at

20	under-the-	supervision of the county clerk.

1 (d) The chief election officer shall adopt rules pursuant 2 to chapter 91 to provide for uniformity in the conduct of federal, state, and county elections by mail."] 3 4 SECTION 10. There is appropriated out of the general 5 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 6 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and 7 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary is 8 appropriated for fiscal year 2014-2015 for the purpose of 9 implementing and administering the election by mail voting 10 system. 11 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the office of 12 elections for the purposes of this Act. 13 SECTION 11. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 14 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 15 SECTION 12. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2013; 16 provided that sections 3 through 9 shall take effect on July 1, 17 2014. 18 INTRODUCED BY
