A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO COLLECTIVE BARGAINING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECT	ION 1. Section 89-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended as	s follows:
3	1. I	By amending subsections (a) and (b) to read:
4	"(a)	All employees throughout the State within any of the
5	following	categories shall constitute an appropriate bargaining
6	unit:	
7	(1)	Nonsupervisory employees in blue collar positions;
8	(2)	Supervisory employees in blue collar positions;
9	(3)	Nonsupervisory employees in white collar positions;
10	(4)	Supervisory employees in white collar positions;
11	(5)	Teachers and other personnel of the department of
12		education under the same pay schedule, including part-
13		time employees working less than twenty hours a week
14		who are equal to one-half of a full-time equivalent;
15	(6)	Educational officers and other personnel of the
16		department of education under the same pay schedule;
17	(7)	Faculty of the University of Hawaii and the community
18		college system;



1	(8)	Personnel of the University of Hawaii and the
2		community college system, other than faculty;
3	(9)	Registered professional nurses;
4	(10)	Institutional, health, and correctional workers;
5	(11)	Firefighters;
6	(12)	Police officers; [and]
7	(13)	Professional and scientific employees, who cannot be
8		included in any of the other bargaining units $[-]$; and
9	(14)	First responders, including state law enforcement
10		officers and state and county ocean safety and water
11		safety officers.
12	(b)	Because of the nature of work involved and the
13	essential	ity of certain occupations that require specialized
14	training,	supervisory employees who are eligible for inclusion
15	in units	(9) through $[\frac{(13)}{(14)}]$ shall be included in units (9)
16	through [$\frac{(13)}{(13)}$, respectively, instead of unit (2) or (4).
17	2.	By amending subsection (d) to read:
18	"(d)	For the purpose of negotiating a collective
19	bargainin	g agreement, the public employer of an appropriate
20	bargainin	g unit shall mean the governor together with the
21	following	employers:

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1	(1)	For bargaining units (1), (2), (3), (4), (9), (10),				
2		[and] (13), and (14), the governor shall have six				
3	votes and the mayors, the chief justice, and t					
4		Hawaii health systems corporation board shall each				
5		have one vote if they have employees in the particular				
6		bargaining unit;				
7	(2)	For bargaining units (11) and (12), the governor shall				
8		have four votes and the mayors shall each have one				
9		vote;				
10	(3)	For bargaining units (5) and (6), the governor shall				
11		have three votes, the board of education shall have				
12		two votes, and the superintendent of education shall				
13		have one vote;				
14	(4)	For bargaining units (7) and (8), the governor shall				
15		have three votes, the board of regents of the				
16		University of Hawaii shall have two votes, and the				
17	·	president of the University of Hawaii shall have one				
18		vote.				
19	Any decis	ion to be reached by the applicable employer group				
20	shall be	on the basis of simple majority, except when a				
21	harqainin	a unit includes county employees from more than one				

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    county. In such case, the simple majority shall include at
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    least one county."
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         SECTION 2. Section 89-11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
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    amended by amending subsection (e) to read as follows:
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         "(e)
               If an impasse exists between a public employer and
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    the exclusive representative of bargaining unit (2), supervisory
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    employees in blue collar positions; bargaining unit (3),
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    nonsupervisory employees in white collar positions; bargaining
    unit (4), supervisory employees in white collar positions;
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    bargaining unit (6), educational officers and other personnel of
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    the department of education under the same salary schedule;
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    bargaining unit (8), personnel of the University of Hawaii and
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    the community college system, other than faculty; bargaining
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    unit (9), registered professional nurses; bargaining unit (10),
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    institutional, health, and correctional workers; bargaining unit
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    (11), firefighters; bargaining unit (12), police officers; [or]
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    bargaining unit (13), professional and scientific employees [\tau];
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    or bargaining unit (14), first responders, including state law
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    enforcement officers and state and county ocean safety and water
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    safety officers, the board shall assist in the resolution of the
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    impasse as follows:
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(1)	Mediation. During the first twenty days after the
	date of impasse, the board shall immediately appoint a
	mediator, representative of the public from a list of
	qualified persons maintained by the board, to assist
	the parties in a voluntary resolution of the impasse.

- (2) Arbitration. If the impasse continues twenty days after the date of impasse, the board shall immediately notify the employer and the exclusive representative that the impasse shall be submitted to a three-member arbitration panel who shall follow the arbitration procedure provided herein.
 - (A) Arbitration panel. Two members of the arbitration panel shall be selected by the parties; one shall be selected by the employer and one shall be selected by the exclusive representative. The neutral third member of the arbitration panel, who shall chair the arbitration panel, shall be selected by mutual agreement of the parties. In the event that the parties fail to select the neutral third member of the arbitration panel within thirty days from the date of impasse, the board shall request the

1		American Arbitration Association, or its
2		successor in function, to furnish a list of five
3		qualified arbitrators from which the neutral
4		arbitrator shall be selected. Within five days
5		after receipt of such list, the parties shall
6		alternately strike names from the list until a
7		single name is left, who shall be immediately
8		appointed by the board as the neutral arbitrator
9		and chairperson of the arbitration panel.
10	(B)	Final positions. Upon the selection and
11		appointment of the arbitration panel, each party

- appointment of the arbitration panel, each party shall submit to the panel, in writing, with copy to the other party, a final position which shall include all provisions in any existing collective bargaining agreement not being modified, all provisions already agreed to in negotiations, and all further provisions which each party is proposing for inclusion in the final agreement.
- (C) Arbitration hearing. Within one hundred twenty days of its appointment, the arbitration panel shall commence a hearing at which time the parties may submit either in writing or through

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oral testimony, all information or data supporting their respective final positions. The arbitrator, or the chairperson of the arbitration panel together with the other two members, are encouraged to assist the parties in a voluntary resolution of the impasse through mediation, to the extent practicable throughout the entire arbitration period until the date the panel is required to issue its arbitration decision.

(D) Arbitration decision. Within thirty days after the conclusion of the hearing, a majority of the arbitration panel shall reach a decision pursuant to subsection (f) on all provisions that each party proposed in its respective final position for inclusion in the final agreement and transmit a preliminary draft of its decision to the parties. The parties shall review the preliminary draft for completeness, technical correctness, and clarity and may mutually submit to the panel any desired changes or adjustments that shall be incorporated in the final draft of its decision. Within fifteen days after the

1	transmittal of the preliminary draft, a majority
2	of the arbitration panel shall issue the
3	arbitration decision."
