### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HOUSING.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

]	1	SECTION	1.	The	legislature	finds	that	Hawaii's	s isol	ated

- 2 location, more than 2,000 miles away from the nearest continent,
- 3 means that the State faces some unique challenges related to
- 4 affordable housing. The lack of available land, low wage
- 5 positions coupled with the high cost of living, the high cost of
- 6 construction, and shortage of public funds are only some of the
- 7 factors that have contributed to one of the lowest rates of home
- 8 ownership in the country and a strong need for affordable rental
- 9 housing.
- 10 The legislature further finds that renters in Hawaii face
- 11 many challenges. A 2011 Center for Housing Policy report noted
- 12 that Honolulu was tied for being the least affordable city for
- 13 renters nationwide. Honolulu was also ranked the third most
- 14 expensive city for rentals. The need for affordable housing in
- 15 Hawaii also affects moderate-income families. Individuals
- 16 falling into this "gap group" of average wage earners face
- 17 challenges, as they earn too much to qualify for low-income

- 1 housing programs, yet earn too little to afford market rate
- 2 housing.
- 3 The legislature also finds that according to the 2011
- 4 Hawaii Housing Planning Survey, the number of new housing units
- 5 that will have to be built between 2012 and 2016 to meet new
- 6 demand generated by changing demographic and economic conditions
- 7 might be as high as 50,000. Units that are not built represent
- 8 the shortage of units needed to fill the total demand for
- 9 housing units. This shortage, known as "needed units", is the
- 10 difference between total housing demand and expected supply.
- 11 The projected number of "needed units" in the State through 2016
- 12 includes over 6,000 ownership units and 13,000 rental units for
- 13 households with less than eighty per cent of the area median
- 14 income. During this same five-year period, about 2,600
- 15 affordable for-sale units and over 2,100 rental units will be
- 16 needed to meet the housing requirements of households earning
- 17 between eighty per cent and one hundred forty per cent of the
- 18 area median income; these are households that fall into the "gap
- 19 group" of wage earners.
- 20 The legislature additionally finds that rising housing
- 21 costs are also associated with increased homelessness or
- 22 families at-risk of becoming homeless. According to the 2012



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- 1 Homeless Service Utilization Report developed by the Center on
- 2 the Family at the University of Hawaii, a total of 13,980
- 3 individuals statewide experienced homelessness and received
- 4 shelter or outreach services during the 2012 fiscal year. This
- 5 figure includes those individuals who are at risk of losing
- 6 their housing.
- 7 The legislature finds that Hawaii has a definite, immediate
- 8 need for affordable housing. Addressing these needs will be a
- 9 challenge because of the sheer number of units needed to meet
- 10 demand and the various barriers that can prevent development and
- 11 preservation of affordable housing. Therefore, the public
- 12 sector, the private sector, and other interested stakeholders in
- 13 the community must work together to ensure that Hawaii's
- 14 residents have access to affordable housing.
- The purpose of this Act is to support Hawaii's goal of
- 16 meeting the projected number of needed affordable housing units
- 17 in the State by establishing an affordable housing task force
- 18 and appropriating funds to the rental housing trust fund. To
- 19 ensure the continued development of affordable housing,
- 20 appropriations to the rental housing trust fund must be made
- 21 each year through fiscal year 2017-2018.

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1	SECT	TION 2. (a) There is established the affordable
2	housing t	ask force to be placed within the Hawaii housing
3	finance a	and development corporation for administrative purposes.
4	(b)	The affordable housing task force shall be composed of
5	the follo	wing:
6	(1)	The governor's coordinator on homelessness;
7	(2)	A representative of the department of human services,
8		to be designated by the director of human services;
9	(3)	A representative of the department of health, to be
10		designated by the director of health;
11	(4)	A representative of the department of land and natural
12		resources, to be designated by the chairperson of the
13		board of land and natural resources;
14	(5)	A representative of the homeless programs office of
15		the department of human services, to be designated by
16		the director of human services;
17	(6)	A representative of the Hawaii public housing
18		authority, to be designated by the director of human
19		services;
20	(7)	A representative of the Hawaii housing finance and
21		development corporation, to be designated by the

1		director of business, economic development, and
2		tourism;
3	(8)	A representative of the Hawaii community development
4		authority, to be designated by the director of
5		business, economic development, and tourism;
6	(9)	A representative of the executive office on aging, to
7		be designated by the director of health;
8	(10)	A representative of the office of Hawaiian affairs, to
9		be designated by the chair of the office of Hawaiian
10		affairs board of trustees;
11	(11)	A representative of the department of Hawaiian home
12		lands, to be designated by the chairperson of the
13		Hawaiian homes commission;
14	(12)	A representative of the state historic preservation
15		division of the department of land and natural
16		resources, to be designated by the chairperson of the
17		board of land and natural resources;
18	(13)	A representative of the office of planning, to be
19		designated by the director of planning;
20	(14)	The chairperson of the state land use commission;
21	(15)	The director or head of each of the following:

1		(A)	The city and county of Honolulu department of
2			planning and permitting;
3		(B)	The county of Hawaii planning department;
4		(C)	The county of Kauai planning department; and
5		(D)	The county of Maui planning department; and
6	(16)	Othe	r representatives from community groups
7		expe	rienced in environmental protection, cultural
8		prot	ection, and other community-driven values, to be
9		appo	inted jointly by the president of the senate and
10		the	speaker of the house of representatives.
11	(c)	The	Hawaii housing finance and development corporation
12	shall pro	vide	administrative support to the affordable housing
13	task forc	e.	
14	(d)	The	members of the affordable housing task force shall
15	elect a c	hair	from among the members and shall adopt rules and
16	procedure	s for	the internal workings of the task force. Members
17	shall ser	ve wi	thout compensation but shall be reimbursed for
18	travel ex	pense	s necessary to carry out their duties.
19	(e)	The	task force shall comprehensively review all
20	proposals	for	affordable housing projects and shall assist the
21	counties	in st	reamlining the permit and approval regulatory

process for construction and development-related permits for



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- 1 affordable housing projects. The task force shall actively
- 2 discuss and monitor the production of all affordable housing
- 3 projects in the State until the date the task force dissolves.
- 4 (f) The task force shall cease to exist on June 30, 2019.
- 5 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 6 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$50,000,000 or so
- 7 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and
- 8 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 9 year 2014-2015 for the rental housing trust fund.
- 10 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the Hawaii
- 11 housing finance and development corporation for the purposes of
- 12 this Act.
- 13 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the rental housing
- 14 trust fund the sum of \$50,000,000 or so much thereof as may be
- 15 necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and the same sum or so much
- 16 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for the
- 17 development of affordable housing.
- 18 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the Hawaii
- 19 housing finance and development corporation for the purposes of
- 20 this Act.

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SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2013. 1

# S.B. NO. 93

### Report Title:

Affordable Housing; Affordable Housing Task Force; Rental Housing Trust Fund; Appropriation

### Description:

Establishes the affordable housing task force to review all proposals for affordable housing projects and assist the counties in streamlining the permit and approval regulatory process for affordable housing projects. Appropriates funds for the rental housing trust fund.

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
