HB 2543 Status	RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS TO ASSIST BIOTORK HAWAII LLC. Authorizes the issuance of special purpose revenue bonds of up to \$50,000,000 for BioTork Hawaii LLC for the development and operation of a facility to convert agricultural crops and by-products to biofuels and high-protein feed. Effective July 1, 2014.	EEP, FIN
<u>HB 1942</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS TO ASSIST WITH THE PLANNING, DESIGN, CONSTRUCTION, EQUIPPING, LAND LEASES, AND OTHER TANGIBLE ASSETS FOR A RENEWABLE ENERGY PROJECT WITH ENERGY STORAGE TECHNOLOGY ON THE ISLAND OF MOLOKAI. Authorizes the issuance of special purpose revenue bonds to assist Princeton Energy Group or a related special purpose entity with the financing of the planning, design, and construction of a renewable energy project with energy storage technology on the island of Molokai.	EEP, FIN
HB 2022 Status	RELATING TO LEED CERTIFICATION. Requires state departments with responsibilities for the design and construction of public buildings, facilities, and schools to design and construct such facilities to obtain LEED certification for all newly- constructed facilities and to obtain LEED certification for such facilities.	EEP, FIN
<u>HB 2029</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO ENERGY STAR PRODUCTS. Prohibits entities such as homeowners associations from denying a person the right to purchase and install ENERGY STAR products on or within a single family residential dwelling or townhouse the person owns.	EEP, CPC



HB 1584 Status	RELATING TO RENEWABLE ENERGY. Establishes a renewable energy facility siting process to expedite the review and action upon state and county permits necessary for the siting, development, construction, and operation of a renewable energy facility.	EEP, CPC, FIN
HB 1543 Status	RELATING TO NET ENERGY METERING. Requires credits for excess electricity that remain unused after each 12- month reconciliation period to be carried over to the next 12-month period. Requires the electric utility to make available to the eligible customer-generator the option of receiving compensation in lieu of credit for excess kilowatt-hours, at a rate to be determined by the PUC.	EEP, CPC
HB 1490 Status	RELATING TO ELECTRICAL POWER GENERATORS. Requires certain diesel-powered electrical power generators to be equipped with diesel particulate filters that remove no less than 85% of the particulate matter.	EEP, CPC
HB 1939 Status	RELATING TO CLEAN ENERGY. Extends the clean energy initiative program goals to 2050 and the renewable portfolio standards to 100% clean energy by 2050.	EEP, CPC
HB 1879 Status	RELATING TO ENERGY RESOURCES. Establishes solar shade regulations to protect solar energy system owners from shading caused by trees and shrubs on adjacent properties.	EEP
HB 2165 Status	RELATING TO SOLAR ENERGY. Permits the governing body of a county to create, by ordinance, a process for the recordation and enforcement of solar easements. Allows counties to require individuals claiming a solar right to record that right by filing a declaration with the county clerk. Permits the governing body of a county to require, by ordinance, the trimming of vegetation that blocks solar radiation from solar energy devices. Authorizes the ordinance to include a designation for the cost of trimming.	EEP, FIN
