<u>HB 1717</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO THE RETENTION OF BIOLOGICAL EVIDENCE. Establishes specific offenses for which evidence shall be retained. Allows law enforcement agencies to petition the court to dispose of biological evidence. Requires the court to use a preponderance of evidence standard in determining whether to allow the law enforcement agency to dispose of the biological evidence.	PBS, JUD

Establishes the offense of Unsworn Falsification to a Law Enforcement Officer prohibiting a person from intentionally or knowingly making a false statement, or making or using a false document, to an officer during the course of an investigation that is materially false, fictitious, or fraudulent. <u>HB 2333</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO THE STATEWIDE INTEGRATED SEX OFFENDER TREATMENT PROGRAM. Amends Chapter 353E, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), to include juveniles, to reflect nationally recognized best practices in the statewide, integrated programming for sex offenders, and to identify the coordinating body for the sex offender treatment program as the "Sex Offender Management Team." Exempts the Program from the requirements of Chapter 92, HRS.	PBS, JUD
<u>HB 2335</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO CORRECTIONAL HEALTH CARE. Allows the Director of Public Safety to appoint the Mental Health Branch Administrator and Mental Health Section Administrators without regard to Chapter 76, Hawaii Revised Statutes.	PBS, LAB, FIN
