

**TWENTY-NINTH DAY**

**Tuesday, March 11, 2014**

The House of Representatives of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 12:08 o'clock p.m., with Vice Speaker Mizuno presiding.

The invocation was delivered by Representative Bob McDermott, after which the Roll was called showing all Members present with the exception of Representatives Cachola, Kobayashi, Oshiro and Woodson, who were excused.

By unanimous consent, reading and approval of the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Twenty-Eighth Day was deferred.
