# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO REQUIREMENTS FOR CHILD CARE PROVIDERS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Section 346-151, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by amending the definition of "child abuse record check" 3 to read as follows: ""Child abuse record check" means an examination of an 4 5 individual's child abuse confirmation history through: An initial name inquiry into the state child welfare 6 (1) 7 record files; Subsequent child abuse confirmation history checks for 8 (2) new hires [and], rehires[+], and household members; 9 10 (3) [An annual] A name inquiry into state child welfare 11 record files [-]; and (4) A name inquiry into other states' child abuse and 12 13 neglect registries in states where the individual has 14 resided during the past five years." SECTION 2. Section 346-152.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 15 amended to read as follows:
