## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO NATURAL RESOURCES.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the trafficking of
2	animals threatened with extinction continues to grow at an
3	alarming pace, threatening an increasing variety of animal
4	species. The threat of extinction is due in large part to the
5	trafficking of animal parts and products. The National Strategy
6	for Combating Wildlife Trafficking, released in February 2014,
7	recognized the important role that states have in protecting
8	species that are subject to illegal wildlife trade. Federal law
9	regulates the transfer and importation of parts or products made
10	from endangered and threatened animal species, but due to the
11	increasing demand for these products around the world, it is
12	important to align state authority with federal and
13	international laws to appropriately regulate these markets on a
14	local level.
15	The legislature further finds that the most effective way

to discourage illegal trafficking is to eliminate markets and

profits. It is in the public interest to protect animal species

- 2 certain limited exceptions, the sale, offer for sale, purchase,
- ·3 trade, possession with intent to sell, or barter for any part or
- 4 product of any species of elephant (Elephantidae), mammoth
- 5 (Mammuthus), rhinoceros (Rhinocerotidae), tiger (Panthera
- 6 tigris), great ape (Hominoidea), shark and ray (Elasmobranchii),
- 7 sea turtle (Chelonioidea), walrus (Odobenus rosmarus), narwhal
- 8 (Monodon monoceros), whale (Cetacea), hippopotamus (Hippopotamus

- 14 animals represent some of the most trafficked species threatened
- 15 with extinction according to illegal wildlife product seizure
- 16 data gathered by the World Wildlife Fund-TRAFFIC, International
- 17 Union for the Conservation of Nature, and other international
- 18 conservation organizations.
- 19 The legislature further finds that in September 2015, the
- 20 United States and China announced a cooperative effort to take
- 21 comprehensive action to curb wildlife trafficking, including

- 1 significant restrictions on the import of ivory as hunting
- 2 trophies and halting the domestic commercial trade of ivory. As
- 3 the host of the upcoming International Union for the
- 4 Conservation of Nature World Conservation Congress with the
- 5 United States in September 2016, it is important to demonstrate
- 6 Hawaii's continuing leadership in global conservation challenges
- 7 such as international wildlife trafficking and endangered
- 8 species protection.
- 9 The purpose of this Act is to improve coordination between
- 10 state and other government authorities as encouraged in section
- 11 183D-8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and to remove any potential
- 12 conflicts of law that unintentionally make Hawaii an attractive
- 13 market for illegal wildlife trafficking as other countries and
- 14 states pass legislation to protect global populations of
- 15 endangered species.
- 16 SECTION 2. Chapter 183D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 17 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 18 and to read as follows:
- 19 "§183D- Wildlife trafficking; prohibited. (a) No
- 20 person shall sell, offer to sell, purchase, trade, possess with
- 21 intent to sell, or barter for any part or product from the

- 12 (Chelonioidea), monk seal (Neomonachus), narwhal (Monodon
- 13 monoceros), whale (Cetacea), or walrus (Odobenus rosmarus)
- 14 insofar as the species, subspecies, or distinct population
- 15 segment is listed:
- 16 (1) On appendix I or II of the Convention on International
- 17 Trade in Endangered Species; or
- 18 (2) As endangered or threatened under the Endangered
- 19 Species Act.
- 20 (c) Unless otherwise authorized by federal law including
- 21 the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act (16

9	<u>(d)</u>	No person shall sell, offer to sell, purchase, trade,
10	possess w	ith intent to sell, or barter for any part or product
11	from mammo	oth (Mammuthus), although the species is extinct.
12	<u>(e)</u>	To the extent permitted under federal law, none of the
13	prohibition	ons set forth in this section shall apply if:
14	(1)	The covered animal species part or product is part of
15		a bona fide antique; provided that:
16		(A) The antique status of such a part or product is
17		established by the owner or seller thereof with
18		historical documentation showing the antique to
19		be not less than one hundred years old;

1	•	(B) The covered animal species part or product is
2		less than twenty per cent by volume of such an
3		antique; and
4		(C) The covered animal species part or product is a
5		fixed component or components of a larger
6		manufactured item and is not, in its current
7		form, the primary source of value of the item;

9		product is:
10		(A) For a bona fide educational or scientific

12		(B) To or from a museum;

6	<u>(5)</u>	The sale, offer for sale, purchase, trade, possess
7		with intent to sell or barter of the covered animal
8		species part or product is expressly authorized by
9		federal law or permit; or
10	(6)	The activity is authorized under section 183D-6.
11	<u>(f)</u>	There is established a rebuttable presumption of
12	possession	n with intent to sell a covered animal species part or
13	product w	hen the part or product is possessed by a retail or
14	wholesale	establishment or other forum engaged in the business
15	of buying	or selling similar items. This rebuttable presumption
16	shall not	preclude a finding of intent to sell based on any
17	other evi	dence that may serve to independently establish such
18	intent.	
19	<u>(g)</u>	None of the prohibitions set forth in this section
20	shall app	ly to traditional cultural practices expressly

1	protected under article XII, section 7, of the state
2	constitution.
3	(h) For the purposes of this section, "covered animal
4	species part or product" means any item that contains, or is
5	wholly or partially made from, any covered animal species.
6	(i) The department of land and natural resources may adopt
7	rules pursuant to chapter 91, as needed, to further implement or
8	enforce this section."
9	SECTION 3. Section 183D-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10	amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
11	"(b) Any person violating section 183D- , 183D-25.5,
12	183D-26, 183D-27, 183D-32, 183D-62, or 183D-64 shall be guilty
13	of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished
14	as follows:
15	(1) For a first conviction by a mandatory fine of not less
16	than \$200, or by imprisonment of not more than one
17	year, or both;
18	(2) For a second conviction within five years of a
19	previous conviction, by a mandatory fine of not less
20	than \$1,000, or by imprisonment of not more than one

year, or both, and all firearms, animal parts,

T	•	products, or items containing prohibited animal parts
2		or products used in the commission of the violations
3		shall be considered contraband to be forfeited to and
4		disposed of by the State; and
5	· (3)	For a third or subsequent conviction within five years
6		of the first two or more convictions, by a mandatory
7		fine of not less than \$2,000, or by imprisonment of
8		not more than one year, or both, and all firearms,
9		animal parts, products, or items containing prohibited
10		animal parts or products used in the commission of the
11		violations shall be considered contraband to be
12		forfeited to and disposed of by the State."
13	SECT	ION 4. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
14	matured,	penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
15	begun bef	ore its effective date.
16	SECT	ION 5. If any provision of this Act, or the
17	applicati	on thereof to any person or circumstance, is held
18	invalid,	the invalidity does not affect other provisions or
19	applicati	ons of the Act that can be given effect without the
20	invalid p	rovision or application, and to this end the provisions
21	of this A	ct are severable.

- 2 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
- 3 provided that there shall be no enforcement actions pursuant to
- 4 this Act prior to June 30, 2017.
