#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 5 SECTION 4. The department of business, economic
- 6 development, and tourism's Hawaii community-based economic
- 7 development technical and financial assistance program shall
- 8 conduct a study to determine the feasibility of establishing a
- 9 training and mentoring program for qualified prison inmates, to
- 10 be called the reentry academy for training and entrepreneurial
- 11 resources (RAFTER), to facilitate their reentry into society.
- In conducting the study, the department shall cooperate
