A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CONTRACTORS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that high housing costs 2 are a main reason why Hawaii is the most expensive place to live 3 in the country. Chapter 444, Hawaii Revised Statutes, requires 4 that a licensed contractor be hired for any construction work 5 that costs more than \$1,000 or that requires a building permit. 6 However, the "handyman exemption" to chapter 444, Hawaii Revised 7 Statutes, allows the hiring of a person not licensed as a 8 contractor if the total cost of the project, including labor, 9 materials, and all other costs, is equal to or less than \$1,000. 10 The legislature also finds that as housing costs have 11 increased in Hawaii, the cost of housing materials has also 12 increased. As a result, small home repair projects may easily 13 exceed \$1,000. Additionally, due to an increase in construction 14 in the State, residents who wish to remodel their homes or 15 complete small home repair projects may wait months before a 16 licensed contractor is available to perform the work. Despite

an increase in costs and a shortage of licensed contractors, the

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- 1 handyman exemption amount has not been increased since 1992.
- 2 Accordingly, the legislature finds that in order to combat high
- 3 housing costs, the "handyman exemption" should be expanded to
- 4 provide faster, easier access to construction services for
- 5 smaller projects.
- 6 The purpose of this Act is to raise the threshold under the
- 7 contractor licensing law's "handyman exemption" from \$1,000 to
- 8 \$2,000.
- 9 SECTION 2. Section 444-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 10 amended to read as follows:
- 11 "§444-2 Exemptions. This chapter shall not apply to:
- 12 (1) Officers and employees of the United States, the
- 13 State, or any county while in the performance of their
- 14 governmental duties;
- 15 (2) Any person acting as a receiver, trustee in
- 16 bankruptcy, personal representative, or any other
- 17 person acting under any order or authorization of any
- 18 court;
- 19 (3) A person who sells or installs any finished products,
- 20 materials, or articles of merchandise that are not
- 21 actually fabricated into and do not become a permanent

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l	fixed part of the structure, or to the construction,
2	alteration, improvement, or repair of personal
3	property;

- 4 (4) Any project or operation for which the aggregate 5 contract price for labor, materials, taxes, and all 6 other items is not more than [\$1,000.] \$2,000. 7 exemption shall not apply in any case where a building 8 permit is required regardless of the aggregate 9 contract price, nor where the undertaking is only a 10 part of a larger or major project or operation, 11 whether undertaken by the same or a different 12 contractor or in which a division of the project or 13 operation is made in contracts of amounts not more 14 than [\$1,000] \$2,000 for the purpose of evading this 15 chapter or otherwise;
 - (5) A registered architect or professional engineer acting solely in the person's professional capacity;
 - (6) Any person who engages in the activities regulated in this chapter as an employee with wages as the person's sole compensation;

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1	(8)	Any joint venture if all members thereof hold licenses
2		issued under this chapter;
3	(9)	Any project or operation where it is determined by the
4		board that less than ten persons are qualified to
5		perform the work in question and that the work does
6		not pose a potential danger to public health, safety,
7		and welfare; or
8	(10)	Any public works project that requires additional
9		qualifications beyond those established by the
10		licensing law and which is deemed necessary and in the
11		public interest by the contracting agency."
