### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HUNTING.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the enhancement and 2 maintenance of sustainable public hunting opportunities for 3 subsistence and recreational purposes are of critical importance to the State and its people. A coordinated resource management 4 5 effort involving stakeholders is needed to prevent and offset the loss, destruction, or degradation of public hunting areas on 6 any island of the State and expeditiously find replacement land 7 8 for hunting. 9 The purpose of this Act is to establish a game commission to serve in an advisory capacity to the governor and the board 10 11 of land and natural resources. 12 SECTION 2. Chapter 183D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 13 and to read as follows: 14 Game commission. (a) There is established 15 "§183Dwithin the department a game commission, which shall serve in an 16 advisory capacity to the governor and the board. The game 17

1	commissio	n shall consist of nine members to be appointed by the
2	governor	in the manner provided in section 26-34. Membership or
3	the game	commission shall include one member representing each
4	county an	d five members at-large; provided that:
5	(1)	Each member shall demonstrate strong interest in the
6		preservation, protection, and promotion of public
7		hunting in Hawaii and shall have knowledge,
8		experience, and expertise in hunting;
9	(2)	At least one member shall have knowledge, experience,
10		and expertise in the area of native Hawaiian cultural
11		practices;
12	(3)	At least one member shall have expertise in tourism;
13		and
14	(4)	No more than three members shall represent, be
15		employed by, or be under contract to any sector of
16		government.
17	(d)	The game commission shall select its own chairperson
18	from amon	g its members. The members shall receive no
19	compensat	ion for their services on the game commission but shall
20	be entitl	ed to reimbursement for necessary expenses, including

1	travel ex	penses, while attending meetings and while in the
2	discharge	of their duties.
3	<u>(c)</u>	The game commission may establish policies and
4	criteria	regarding the management, protection, and promotion of
5	public hu	nting in Hawaii and may adjust existing department
6	policies	and procedures relating to hunting, particularly
7	regarding	chapter 183D and chapters 13-122, 13-123, and 13-124,
8	<u>Hawaii Ad</u>	ministrative Rules.
9	(d)	The game commission shall:
10	(1)	Consult and advise the governor and the board on any
11		matter affecting hunting, including proposed rules and
12		regulations;
13	(2)	Evaluate and approve a five-year game management plan
14		and any changes to the plan as necessary;
15	(3)	Establish criteria to be used in determining whether
16		an area is suitable for hunting;
17	(4)	Conduct studies of areas for sustainable yield game
18		production or enhancement;
19	(5)	Recommend to the governor and the board areas suitable
20		for game production or enhancement;

1	(6)	Establish policies and criteria regarding the
2		management, protection, and permitted uses of areas
3		that are used for hunting;
4	(7)	Advise the governor and the board on any matter
5		relating to the conservation and sustainability of
6		Hawaii's unique game and non-game resources;
7	<u>(8)</u>	Develop ways and means to extend and strengthen game
8		management areas, other designated hunting areas, and
9		mixed-use areas with the State;
10	(9)	Advise the board and other public agencies that manage
11		state-owned land or natural resources regarding areas
12		under their respective jurisdictions that may be
13		appropriate for hunting and game production;
14	(10)	In carrying out its duties, consult the most
15		comprehensive up-to-date compilation of scientific
16		data;
17	(11)	Make recommendations relating to the process of
18		hunting rules modification;
19	(12)	Collaborate with the board on the use and allocation
20		of the wildlife revolving fund.

1	(13)	Collaborate with agencies and persons who gather
2		information and implement hunting programs and data;
3		and
4	(14)	Take testimony and acquire information as it desires
5		and communicate its findings and recommendations to
6		the board.
7	<u>(e)</u>	Any action taken by the game commission shall be by a
8	simple ma	jority of its members. Five members shall constitute a
9	quorum.	
10	<u>(f)</u>	Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, the game
11	commissio	n shall be subject to sections 26-34, 26-35, 26-35.5,
12	and 26-36	<u>.</u>
13	(g)	The department shall provide administrative support to
14	the game	commission. Federal moneys and other moneys that
15	become av	ailable to the department may be used to off-set
16	administr	ative costs incurred by the department.
17	(h)	The game commission shall submit a report to the
18	legislatu	re no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
19	the regul	ar session of 2016, and each regular session
20	thereafte	r, on its efforts to comply with this section,

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- 1 including a summary of its activities during the year preceding
- 2 the regular session for which the report was prepared.
- 3 (i) The game commission may adopt rules pursuant to
- 4 chapter 91 to implement this section."
- 5 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 6 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 7 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2015-2016 and the
- 8 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 9 2016-2017 for the establishment of a game commission pursuant to
- 10 this Act.
- 11 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 12 of land and natural resources for the purposes of this Act.
- 13 SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.
- 14 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2015.
