A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE KAHO'OLAWE ISLAND RESERVE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. In Act 340, Session Laws of Hawaii 1993, the
- 2 legislature found that "the Island of Kaho'olawe is of
- 3 significant cultural and historic importance to the native
- 4 people of Hawaii." The legislature also found that due to
- 5 extensive erosion and other ecological problems, the presence of
- 6 unexploded ordnance, archaeological and other cultural and
- 7 historic sites, and the presence of native and endangered flora
- 8 and fauna, that a new management regime was needed to
- 9 effectively meet the unique challenges of restoring, preserving
- 10 and determining the appropriate use of Kaho'olawe.
- 11 The Kaho'olawe island reserve commission is funded
- 12 predominantly by a dwindling trust fund created in 1994 during
- 13 the federal unexploded ordnance cleanup of Kaho'olawe. Though
- 14 considerable, the federal appropriation totaling approximately
- 15 \$44,000,000 over a period of several years was not substantial

- 1 enough to establish a sustainable endowment for the long-term
- 2 restoration of Kaho'olawe.
- 3 As stated in the federally mandated Kaho'olawe island
- 4 conveyance commission final report to Congress in 1993, "in the
- 5 short term, federal funds will provide the bulk of the program
- 6 support for specific soil conservation projects and related
- 7 activities. In the longer term, however, state revenues will be
- 8 needed to continue and enhance those activities initiated with
- 9 federal funds." For the past twenty-one years, federal funding
- 10 has allowed the Kaho'olawe island reserve commission to establish
- 11 many of its innovative programs that emphasize ancestral and
- 12 traditional knowledge, utilize a cultural approach of respect
- 13 and connectivity to the environment, and integrate ancient and
- 14 modern resource management techniques.
- In 2004, the management and control of the Kaho'olawe island
- 16 reserve was transferred from the United States Navy to Hawaii,
- 17 with the Kaho'olawe island reserve commission being the State's
- 18 designated agency tasked with overseeing the use and restoration
- 19 of the reserve. During the past ten years, the Kahoʻolawe island
- 20 reserve commission has been able to develop innovative
- 21 restoration projects that work in the extremely harsh conditions



- 1 of Kaho'olawe and will serve as the foundation for the future
- 2 restoration of the island.
- 3 A 2013 fiscal audit of the Kaho'olawe rehabilitation trust
- 4 fund performed by the office of the auditor reported two key
- 5 findings: first, and more importantly, that the trust fund will
- 6 be depleted by 2016; and secondly, that the Kaho'olawe island
- 7 reserve commission lacks a comprehensive and quantifiable
- 8 restoration plan with performance measures to gauge whether
- 9 objectives are being met.
- 10 As Hawaii's natural resource managers work to maintain the
- 11 balance between the pressure of urbanized land use and
- 12 preserving and restoring natural resources, there still needs to
- 13 be remote intact ecosystems that will serve to counteract this
- 14 growth and provide a means of recovery, in case the State's
- 15 other main ecosystems collapse. Kaho'olawe's rich marine
- 16 ecosystem is a buffer that will serve to support and, if
- 17 necessary, repopulate neighboring waters. The Kaho'olawe island
- 18 reserve commission's ocean and land based programs serve to
- 19 ensure, protect, and restore the rich natural biodiversity and
- 20 biomass of the Kaho'olawe reserve, which one day may be the key
- 21 to Hawaii's survival. Therefore, it is necessary to consider



- 1 the expected increase in population and corresponding housing
- 2 development and the benefit from maintaining a large portion of
- 3 Hawaii intact for future generations.
- 4 In 2013, the Kaho'olawe island reserve commission began
- 5 developing a strategic plan for the use and management of the
- 6 Kaho'olawe island reserve through 2026, which will mark fifty
- 7 years of occupation of Kaho'olawe by the people of Hawaii. After
- 8 a two-year effort that engaged Hawaii's residents through
- 9 numerous community meetings and focus groups sessions held on
- 10 each island, the multi-organization Kaho'olawe strategic planning
- 11 working group developed an island-wide, community-based
- 12 strategic plan entitled I Ola Kanaloa, or "Life to Kanaloa."
- 13 The plan addresses the future restoration, management, and uses
- 14 of Kahoʻolawe for the State and a potential future sovereign
- 15 native Hawaiian entity. The plan was developed in accordance
- 16 with section 6K-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, which requires the
- 17 State to transfer management and control of the island and its
- 18 waters to the sovereign native Hawaiian entity upon its
- 19 recognition by the State and federal governments. Recognition
- 20 of a sovereign native Hawaiian entity is anticipated to occur
- 21 within the timeframe of the 2026 strategic plan.

- 1 Without additional funding, the Kaho'olawe island reserve
- 2 commission will not be able to continue its innovative
- 3 management regime beyond fiscal year 2015. The Kaho'olawe island
- 4 reserve commission's management and control of Kaho'olawe entails
- 5 not only restoring its ecosystems and protecting its endangered
- 6 and rare flora and fauna, but also ensuring meaningful and safe
- 7 use by people who visit the reserve.
- 8 The purpose of this Act is to utilize a portion of the
- 9 state conveyance tax to replenish the Kaho'olawe rehabilitation
- 10 trust fund:
- 11 (1) For the long-term rehabilitation and maintenance of
- 12 the Kaho'olawe island reserve;
- 13 (2) To protect and safeguard visitors; and
- 14 (3) To implement the innovative programs that are guided
- by I Ola Kanaloa.
- 16 SECTION 2. Section 6K-9.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 17 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
- 18 "(a) There is created in the state treasury a trust fund
- 19 to be designated as the Kaho'olawe rehabilitation trust fund to
- 20 be administered by the department with the prior approval of the
- 21 commission. Subject to Public Law 103-139, and this chapter:

 - (A) To natural area partnership and forest stewardship programs after joint consultation with the forest stewardship committee and the natural area reserves system commission;
