A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE DEPOSIT BEVERAGE CONTAINER PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that in 2005, the auditor
- 2 conducted an audit of the deposit beverage container program.
- 3 In that report, the auditor found that the department of health
- 4 failed to verify that the payments made to the redemption
- 5 centers coincided with the weight of recyclable materials that
- 6 redemption centers sent to recyclers. Instead, the department
- 7 was paying the redemption centers based upon the number of
- 8 containers the redemption centers claimed to have accepted from
- 9 consumers. In 2006, the department of health acknowledged the
- 10 weakness and potential for abuse of this accounting system, and
- 11 it proposed to reduce the possibility of over-paying redemption
- 12 centers by switching to a back-end payment system where
- 13 redemption centers would be paid based upon the weight of the
- 14 recyclable material sent to recyclers.
- 15 The legislature further finds that in 2008 and in 2010, the
- 16 auditor submitted second and third audit reports, respectively,
- 17 of the deposit beverage container program. At the time of those

- 1 reports, the deposit beverage container program had not yet
- 2 implemented a back-end payment system. Those reports reiterated
- 3 that payments to redemption centers were subject to fraud and
- 4 abuse because they were based upon unverified or unsupported
- 5 redemption numbers. In response to the second and third audit
- 6 reports, the department wrote that it was considering
- 7 implementing a back-end payment system.
- 8 In 2013, the auditor released a fourth audit report of the
- 9 deposit beverage container program. This report found that, due
- 10 to the department's failure to verify that redemption centers
- 11 actually accept the beverage container to which they are seeking
- 12 payment, the program made over-payments of \$6,200,000 during
- 13 fiscal years 2010 to 2012. Further, the department could not
- 14 account for 7,500,000 pounds of recyclable material. The
- 15 auditor again recommended that the department implement a back-
- 16 end payment system, and the department again responded that it
- 17 was considering implementing such a system.
- 18 The legislature finds that the deposit beverage container
- 19 program's continuous failure to implement a back-end payment
- 20 system has resulted in millions of dollars of waste.

         Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to implement the
 2
    auditor's recommendation for the deposit beverage container
 3
    program to use a back-end payment system.
 4
         SECTION 2. Section 342G-117, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
 5
    amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows:

         "(c) The handling fee shall be paid in addition to the
7
    refund value of each empty deposit beverage container. Payments

    for handling fees shall be calculated and paid by the department
    based on redemption center reports submitted to and verified by
9

    the department[; provided that there is no discrepancy in the
    reports.] pursuant to section 342G-119. The department [may

    choose to pay shall calculate the payment of the handling fee
13
    and refund value on the basis of the total weight of the
14
    containers received by material type and the average weight of
15
    each container type [+], as demonstrated by documentation

    submitted to the department pursuant to section 342G-119(b)(4);

    provided that the deposit beverage container is physically

    received by the redemption center."



9	(c)	Any collection report submitted pursuant to subsection

11	(2), or (3	3) that conflicts with the information required by
12	subsection	(b)(4), shall include an explanation of the conflict.
13	(d)	The department may deny payment for any collection
14	report tha	at contains a discrepancy or insufficient information
15	as determi	ned by the department.
16	<u>(e)</u>	The requests for payment pursuant to this section
17	shall be r	no less than two times per month."
