A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE AHA MOKU ADVISORY COMMITTEE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that, over the past two hundred years, Hawaii has experienced extensive changes which 2 3 include the deterioration of the Hawaiian culture, language, values, and land tenure system, which has in part resulted in 4 the over-development of the coastline, alteration of fresh water 5 streams, destruction of life-giving watersheds, decimation of 6 the coral reefs, and the decline or endemic marine and 7 8 terrestrial species.

9 In an attempt to remedy this situation, in 2012, the 10 legislature established the aha moku advisory committee by Act 11 288, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012. The aha moku advisory committee was placed within the department of land and natural 12 resources for administrative purposes. Act 288, Session Laws of 13 14 Hawaii 2012, formally recognizes the aha moku system, a 15 traditional system of best practices based upon the indigenous 16 resource management practices of moku (regional) and ahapua'a (site-specific geographic area) that acknowledge the natural 17



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1 contours of land, the natural resources located within those 2 areas, and the methodology necessary to sustain resources and 3 the community. The role of the aha moku advisory committee is 4 to advise the board of land and natural resources and the 5 department of land and natural resources regarding the aha moku 6 system, on issues related to land and natural resources.

7 Since its creation in 2012, the aha moku advisory committee has continued to fulfill its mission and mandates as set forth 8 9 in Act 288 by working with the eight main Hawaiian islands which 10 encompass forty-three traditional moku in which five hundred eighty-nine ahupua'a are listed. In 2014, the aha moku advisory 11 12 committee documented its accomplishments in a report to the 13 legislature that was issued in English and Hawaiian languages 14 and included recommendations for the moku of Hawaii, Lanai, 15 Oahu, and Kauai. The report also lists the decisions of the 16 board of land and natural resources relating to those recommendations. Additionally, the report lists the almost 17 forty resource issues that came before the department of land 18 19 and natural resources divisions relating to the aha moku system. 20 Most of these issues were mitigated within the department of



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1 land and natural resources at a divisional level to the 2 satisfaction of the inquiring communities. 3 A purpose of the aha moku advisory committee is to 4 strengthen the rapport and communication between the department 5 of land and natural resources and the public, including the 6 native Hawaiian community, on issues regarding natural and cultural resources, thereby benefitting the entire State. The 7 aha moku advisory committee is well suited for this goal, and is 8 9 continuing to be successful with the beginning phases of these 10 efforts. However, although the legislature unanimously passed 11 Act 288 and appropriated funding in that Act, the aha moku advisory committee has never been funded. As a result of this 12 situation, while the aha moku advisory committee is well 13 situated within the department of land and natural resources and 14 15 is active, it has not been funded so that it can reach its full 16 mandate.

SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$120,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2015-2016 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year



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2016-2017 for the administrative and operational expenses of the
 aha moku advisory committee.

3 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department4 of land and natural resources for the purposes of this Act.

5 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general 6 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$30,000 or so much 7 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2015-2016 and the 8 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 9 2016-2017 for community outreach efforts of the aha moku 10 advisory committee.

11 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
12 of land and natural resources for the purposes of this Act.
13 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2015.
