A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HAWAII CORRECTIONAL INDUSTRIES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 354D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 2 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 3 and to read as follows:
- 4 "\$354D- Notwithstanding any other provision in this
- 5 chapter, no inmate services shall directly or indirectly result
- 6 in layoffs, reduction in force, job elimination, displacement,
- 7 replacement, furloughs, contracting out of, or result in the
- 8 failure to fund exempt civil service positions under section
- 9 76-16, any other provision of law, or bargaining unit positions
- 10 covered by chapter 89."
- 11 SECTION 2. Section 76-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 12 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
- 13 "(b) The civil service to which this chapter applies shall
- 14 comprise all positions in the State now existing or hereafter
- 15 established and embrace all personal services performed for the
- 16 State, except the following:

1	(1)	Commissioned and enlisted personnel of the Hawali
2		National Guard as such, and positions in the Hawaii
3		National Guard that are required by state or federal
4		laws or regulations or orders of the National Guard to
5		be filled from those commissioned or enlisted
6		personnel;
7	(2)	Positions filled by persons employed by contract where
8		the director of human resources development has
9		certified that the service is special or unique or is
10		essential to the public interest and that, because of
11		circumstances surrounding its fulfillment, personnel
12		to perform the service cannot be obtained through
13		normal civil service recruitment procedures. Any such
14		contract may be for any period not exceeding one year;
15	(3)	Positions that must be filled without delay to comply
16		with a court order or decree if the director
17		determines that recruitment through normal recruitment
18		civil service procedures would result in delay or
19		noncompliance, such as the Felix-Cayetano consent
20		decree;

1	(4)	Positions filled by the legislature or by either house
2		or any committee thereof;
3	(5)	Employees in the office of the governor and office of
4		the lieutenant governor, and household employees at
5		Washington Place;
6	(6)	Positions filled by popular vote;
7	(7)	Department heads, officers, and members of any board,
8		commission, or other state agency whose appointments
9		are made by the governor or are required by law to be
10		confirmed by the senate;
11	(8)	Judges, referees, receivers, masters, jurors, notaries
12		public, land court examiners, court commissioners, and
13		attorneys appointed by a state court for a special
14		temporary service;
15	(9)	One bailiff for the chief justice of the supreme court
16		who shall have the powers and duties of a court
17		officer and bailiff under section 606-14; one
18		secretary or clerk for each justice of the supreme
19		court, each judge of the intermediate appellate court,
20		and each judge of the circuit court; one secretary for

the judicial council; one deputy administrative

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1	director of the courts; three law clerks for the chief
2	justice of the supreme court, two law clerks for each
3	associate justice of the supreme court and each judge
4	of the intermediate appellate court, one law clerk for
5	each judge of the circuit court, two additional law
6	clerks for the civil administrative judge of the
7	circuit court of the first circuit, two additional law
8	clerks for the criminal administrative judge of the
9	circuit court of the first circuit, one additional law
10	clerk for the senior judge of the family court of the
11	first circuit, two additional law clerks for the civil
12	motions judge of the circuit court of the first
13	circuit, two additional law clerks for the criminal
14	motions judge of the circuit court of the first
15	circuit, and two law clerks for the administrative
16	judge of the district court of the first circuit; and
17	one private secretary for the administrative director
18	of the courts, the deputy administrative director of
19	the courts, each department head, each deputy or first
20	assistant, and each additional deputy, or assistant
21	deputy, or assistant defined in paragraph (16);

1	(10)	Firs	t deputy and deputy attorneys general, the
2		admi	nistrative services manager of the department of
3		the	attorney general, one secretary for the
4		admi	nistrative services manager, an administrator and
5		any	support staff for the criminal and juvenile

8	(11)	(A)	Teachers, principals, vice-principals, complex
9			area superintendents, deputy and assistant
10			superintendents, other certificated personnel,
11			not more than twenty noncertificated
12			administrative, professional, and technical
13			personnel not engaged in instructional work;
14		(B)	Effective July 1, 2003, teaching assistants,
15			educational assistants, bilingual/bicultural
16			school-home assistants, school psychologists,
17			psychological examiners, speech pathologists,
18			athletic health care trainers, alternative school
19			work study assistants, alternative school
20			educational/supportive services specialists,
21			alternative school project coordinators, and

1			communications aides in the department of
2			education;
3		(C)	The special assistant to the state librarian and
4			one secretary for the special assistant to the
5			state librarian; and
6		(D)	Members of the faculty of the University of
7			Hawaii, including research workers, extension
8			agents, personnel engaged in instructional work,
9			and administrative, professional, and technical
10			personnel of the university;
11	(12)	Empl	oyees engaged in special, research, or
12		demo	nstration projects approved by the governor;
13	(13)	(A)	Positions filled by inmates, patients of state
14			institutions, persons with severe physical or
15			mental disabilities participating in the work
16			experience training programs; provided that no
17			position under this subparagraph shall result
18			directly or indirectly in layoffs, reduction in
19			force, job elimination, displacement,
20			replacement, furloughs, contracting out of, or
21			result in the failure to fund exempt positions;

Ţ		(B)	Positions filled with students in accordance with
2			guidelines for established state employment
3			programs; and
4		(C)	Positions that provide work experience training
5			or temporary public service employment that are
6			filled by persons entering the workforce or
7			persons transitioning into other careers under
8			programs such as the federal Workforce Investment
9			Act of 1998, as amended, or the Senior Community
10			Service Employment Program of the Employment and
11			Training Administration of the United States
12			Department of Labor, or under other similar state
13			programs;
14	(14)	A cus	stodian or guide at Iolani Palace, the Royal
15		Maus	oleum, and Hulihee Palace;
16	(15)	Posi	tions filled by persons employed on a fee,
17		cont	eact, or piecework basis, who may lawfully perform
18		their	duties concurrently with their private business
19		or p	cofession or other private employment and whose
20		duti	es require only a portion of their time, if it is

1		impracticable to ascertain or anticipate the portion
2		of time to be devoted to the service of the State;
3	(16)	Positions of first deputies or first assistants of
4		each department head appointed under or in the manner
5		provided in section 6, article V, of the state
6		constitution; three additional deputies or assistants
7		either in charge of the highways, harbors, and
8		airports divisions or other functions within the
9		department of transportation as may be assigned by the
10		director of transportation, with the approval of the
11		governor; four additional deputies in the department
12		of health, each in charge of one of the following:
13		behavioral health, environmental health, hospitals,
14		and health resources administration, including other
15		functions within the department as may be assigned by
16		the director of health, with the approval of the
17		governor; an administrative assistant to the state
18		librarian; and an administrative assistant to the
19		superintendent of education;
20	(17)	Positions specifically exempted from this part by any
21		other law; provided that:

1		(A) Any exemption created after July 1, 2014, shall
2		expire three years after its enactment unless
3		affirmatively extended by an act of the
4		legislature; and
5		(B) All of the positions defined by paragraph (9)
6		shall be included in the position classification
7		plan;
8	(18)	Positions in the state foster grandparent program and
9		positions for temporary employment of senior citizens
10		in occupations in which there is a severe personnel
11		shortage or in special projects;
12	(19)	Household employees at the official residence of the
13		president of the University of Hawaii;
14	(20)	Employees in the department of education engaged in
15		the supervision of students during meal periods in the
16		distribution, collection, and counting of meal
17		tickets, and in the cleaning of classrooms after
18		school hours on a less than half-time basis;
19	(21)	Employees hired under the tenant hire program of the
20		Hawaii public housing authority; provided that except
21		during the time period specified in paragraph (27),

1		not more than twenty-six per cent of the authority's
2		workforce in any housing project maintained or
3		operated by the authority shall be hired under the
4		tenant hire program;
5	(22)	Positions of the federally funded expanded food and
6		nutrition program of the University of Hawaii that
7		require the hiring of nutrition program assistants who
8		live in the areas they serve;
9	(23)	Positions filled by persons with severe disabilities
10		who are certified by the state vocational
11		rehabilitation office that they are able to perform
12		safely the duties of the positions;
13	(24)	The sheriff;
14	(25)	A gender and other fairness coordinator hired by the
15		judiciary;
16	(26)	Positions in the Hawaii National Guard youth and adult
17		education programs; and
18	(27)	From July 1, 2012, to June 30, 2015, persons hired or
19		contracted to perform repair, maintenance, or capital
20		improvement projects work on vacant housing units

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T	under the jurisdiction of the hawair public housing
2	authority.
3	The director shall determine the applicability of this
4	section to specific positions.
5	Nothing in this section shall be deemed to affect the civil
6	service status of any incumbent as it existed on July 1, 1955."
7	SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.
8	SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on June 30, 2015;
9	provided that the amendments made to section 76-16(b), Hawaii
10	Revised Statutes, in section 2 of this Act shall not be repealed
11	when section 76-16(b), Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed and
12	reenacted on July 1, 2015, pursuant to Act 159, Session Laws of
13	Hawaii 2012.

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Report Title:

Hawaii Correctional Industries; Inmate Services; Exempt Civil Service

Description:

Specifies that inmate services shall not directly or indirectly result in layoffs, reduction in force, job elimination, displacement, replacement, furloughs, contracting out of, or result in the failure to fund exempt civil service positions under section 76-16, HRS, any other provision of law, or bargaining unit positions covered by chapter 89, HRS.

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
