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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FAMILY LITERACY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii's children 2 and families benefit immensely from participation in literacy 3 programs. Literacy programs primarily assist children with 4 learning to read, however, these prevention programs also serve to bridge the gap between home and school in Hawaii's community 5 6 by building stronger family relationships, improving the 7 academic tone within homes, and changing family attitudes toward . . 8 school.

9 The benefits of family literacy programs are evident in the work of existing nonprofits. For example, Read Aloud America is 10 11 a Hawaii nonprofit that brings children and parents together in 12 local schools and motivates them to read. Since 1999, Read 13 Aloud America has served eighty-nine Hawaii public schools and 14 over 328,000 adults and children. In addition to parents increasing their own reading time, eighty-seven per cent of 15 16 parents who participated in the program reported that their children's voluntary reading time had increased, and seventy-one 17

per cent reported their children spent less time with electronic
media. Teachers also see encouraging results and have reported
positive changes in student behavior, increased interest in
reading, and improved home to school relationships.

5 Read to Me International is another example of an existing 6 local organization committed to improving child literacy. 7 Active on the islands of Oahu, Hawaii, Molokai, and Kauai, this 8 nonprofit collaborates with community volunteers to educate 9 families about the importance of reading aloud to children and 10 of raising children who value reading.

11 The legislature further finds that child literacy programs 12 which have previously been supported by funds from the department of human services are currently suffering from a lack 13 14 of state funding. The governor's council for literacy was established in 1987 to work toward a literate Hawaii, and 15 16 Hawaii's families continue to need education and resources to 17 help children learn to read and to encourage families to become 18 more engaged in their local schools and community.

19 The purpose of this Act is to establish a statewide 20 literacy program under the department of human services, and to 21 appropriate funds for its establishment. By utilizing existing

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1 programs and collaborating with nonprofit groups to provide 2 direct services to Hawaii's families, the department of human 3 services will administer a literacy program that supports a bright future for Hawaii's children and families. 4 5 SECTION 2. Chapter 346, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 6 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 7 and to read as follows: 8 ***§346-** Statewide literacy program. (a) There shall be 9 established within the department a statewide literacy program 10to help increase Hawaii's literacy rates and benefit Hawaii's 11 children and families. The department shall administer the 12 literacy program. 13 (b) The department may contract with third-party 14 organizations and nonprofit organizations to assist with 15 implementing the statewide literacy program." 16 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general 17 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 18 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2015-2016 and 19 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 20 year 2016-2017 for the department of human services to establish



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a statewide literacy program, including all program costs and
hiring of any necessary staff.

3 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department4 of human services for the purposes of this Act.

5 SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.

6 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2015.
