A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PLASTIC.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 342H, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 2 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
- 3 to read as follows:
- 4 "PART . SINGLE-USE PLASTIC CHECKOUT BAGS
- 5 §342H-A Definitions. As used in this part, unless context
- 6 otherwise requires:
- 7 "Business" means any commercial enterprise or establishment
- 8 operating in the State, including an individual proprietorship,
- 9 joint venture, partnership, corporation, limited liability
- 10 company, or other legal entity, whether for profit or not for
- 11 profit, and includes all employees of the business or any
- 12 independent contractors associated with the business.
- "Compostable plastic bag" means a checkout bag that is
- 14 provided to a customer for the purpose of transporting groceries
- 15 or other retail goods, that meets current ASTM D6400 standard
- 16 specifications for compostability, and that is labeled with:

- 3 (2) The word "Compostable" on both sides of the bag in
 4 either green color lettering that is at least one inch
 5 in height, or as otherwise specified; or within a
 6 green color band that is at least one inch in height
 7 in order to be readily and easily identifiable.
- 8 "Customer" means a person who purchases merchandise from a 9 business.
- 10 "Department" means the department of health.
- "Mil" means one thousandth of one inch.
- "Non-recyclable paper bag" means a paper bag that is not a
 recyclable.
- "Pass-through charge" means a charge of 10 cents per bag to

 15 be collected by businesses from their customers when providing
- 16 recyclable paper bags, reusable bags, or compostable bags, and
- 17 retained by businesses to offset the cost of bags and other
- 18 related costs.
- "Recyclable paper bag" means a paper bag that:
- 20 (1) Is one hundred per cent recyclable;

1	(2)	Contains a minimum of forty per cent post-consumer
2		recycled content; and
3	(3)	Displays the words "Reusable" and "Recyclable" in a
4		highly visible manner on the outside of the bag.
5	"Reu	sable bag" means a bag with handles that is
6	specifica	lly designed and manufactured for multiple reuse and is
7	made of:	
8	(1)	Cloth or other washable fabric; or
9	(2)	Durable material suitable for reuse, including plastic
10		that is at least 2.25 mils thick.
11	"Sin	gle-use plastic checkout bag" means a carryout bag that
12	is provid	led at the point of sale by a business to a customer for
13	the purpo	se of transporting groceries or other retail goods, is
14	made from	n non-compostable plastic, and is not specifically
15	designed	and manufactured for multiple reuse.
16	§342	H-B Inapplicability of part. This part shall not
17	apply to:	
18	. (1)	Bags used by customers inside a business to package
19		loose items, such as fruits, vegetables, nuts, ground
20		coffee, grains, candies, or small hardware items;

1	(2)	Bags used to contain or wrap frozen foods, meat or
2		fish, flowers or potted plants, or other items to
3		contain dampness;
4	(3)	Bags used to protect or transport prepared foods,
5	·	beverages, or bakery goods;
6	(4)	Bags provided by pharmacists to contain prescription
7		medications;
8	(5)	Newspaper bags for home newspaper delivery;
9	(6)	Door-hanger bags;
10	(7)	Laundry, dry cleaning, or garment bags, including bags
11		provided by hotels to guests to contain wet or dirty
12		clothing;
13	(8)	Bags sold in packages containing multiple bags
14		intended for use as garbage, pet waste, or yard waste
15		bags;
16	(9)	Bags used to contain live animals, such as fish or
17		insects sold in pet stores;
18	(10)	Bags used to transport chemical pesticides, drain-
19		cleaning chemicals, or other caustic chemicals sold at
20	·	the retail level; provided that this exemption shall
21		he limited to one had her customer. or

- 1 (11) Compostable plastic bags.
- 2 §342H-C Ban on single-use plastic checkout bags and non-
- 3 recyclable paper bags. (a) No business shall provide single-
- 4 use plastic checkout bags or non-recyclable paper bags to any
- 5 customers.
- 6 (b) All businesses shall charge customers a pass-through
- 7 charge for every recyclable paper bag, reusable bag, or
- 8 compostable plastic bag provided at the point of sale.
- 9 (c) All businesses shall indicate on the customer
- 10 transaction receipt the total number of recyclable paper bags,
- 11 compostable plastic bags, or reusable bags provided and the
- 12 total amount of the pass-through charge.
- 13 §342H-D Penalties; injunctive relief. (a) Any business
- 14 that violates any provision of this part shall:
- 15 (1) Discontinue the distribution of bags prohibited by
- 16 this part; and
- 17 (2) Be assessed a fine of not less than \$100, but not more
- than \$1,000 for each day of the violation.
- 19 (b) The department may apply for and the court may grant
- 20 an injunction restraining any business from violating this part
- 21 or any rule adopted pursuant to this part.

- 1 §342H-E Rules. The department may adopt rules in
- 2 accordance with chapter 91 to implement this part.
- 3 §342H-F Relation to county ordinances. This part shall
- 4 not prohibit the enactment or operation of any county ordinance
- 5 that is at least as stringent as this part; provided that no
- 6 county ordinance shall supersede or prevent the operation of
- 7 section 342H-C."
- 8 SECTION 2. In codifying the new sections added by section
- 9 1 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
- 10 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
- 11 the new sections in this Act.
- 12 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2016.

Bans businesses from providing single-use plastic checkout bags and non-recyclable paper bags to customers. Assesses a fee that businesses shall charge for allowable bags provided to customers. Allows for penalties from the Department of Health.
