A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE PUUHONUA COMMISSION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- SECTION 1. The legislature finds that in ancient Hawaii

 specific sites were set aside in each district and designated as

 places of refuge. These sites, known as puuhonua, were used as
- 4 sanctuaries for women, children, old or ailing men in times of
- 5 war; vanquished warriors fleeing from their would be
- 6 annihilators; criminals fleeing from revengeful pursuers; and
- 7 law breakers fleeing from punishment. The puuhonua were
- ${f 8}$ inviolable and their protection extended to the guilty as well
- 9 as the innocent. These sanctuaries further served as healing
- 10 centers and were a safe, secure area intended to provide a haven
- 11 and positive benefit for those utilizing them.
- 12 The legislature further finds that the concept of puuhonua
- 13 can be revitalized within today's correctional system to support
- 14 men and women who have previously made wrong decisions in their
- 15 lives. The legislature additionally finds that puuhonua should
- 16 be incorporated into the State's judicial branch and department
- 17 of public safety.

1 The purpose of this Act is to create a puuhonua commission 2 within the department of public safety, to provide formerly 3 incarcerated individuals a place to heal or become whole again 4 in a way that benefits society. 5 SECTION 2. Chapter 353, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 6 amended by adding a new section to part I, to be appropriately 7 designated and to read as follows: 8 Puuhonua commission; established. (a) There is "§353-9 established within the department of public safety for 10 administrative purposes the puuhonua commission. The commission 11 shall work with post-incarcerated persons, probationers, and 12 parolees to assist these individuals in the transition post-13 incarceration. The commission shall develop partnerships with 14 businesses, nonprofit organizations, churches, unions, 15 government agencies, schools, and other entities and 16 organizations that focus on assisting post-incarcerated persons, 17 parolees, and probationers. The commission shall develop a 18 network of support and assistance to address housing, 19 healthcare, vocational training, skill building, drug treatment,

job searches, counseling, mentorship, mental health issues, and

1	other needs of post-incarderated persons, parolees, and
2	probationers, as necessary.
3	(b) The commission shall meet at least once each quarter
4	co: review data and information from the commission's network of
5	support; review data provided by government agencies and
6	partners; interact with those who are in need of or who are
7	utilizing the commission's services; and address other issues as
8	needed.
9	(c) The commission may make recommendations to the
10	governor, legislature, county mayors, and county councils on
11	matters relevant to the commission's work.
12	(d) The commission shall consist of nine members to be
13	appointed as follows:
14	(1) Three members shall be appointed by the governor
15	pursuant to section 26-34; provided that at least one
16	member shall be a former inmate;
17	(2) Two members shall be appointed by the governor from a
18	list of nominees submitted by the president of the
19	senate;

1	(3)	Two members shall be appointed by the governor from a
2		list of nominees submitted by the speaker of the house
3		of representatives; and
4	(4)	Two members shall be appointed by the governor from a
5		list of nominees submitted by the office of Hawaiian
6		affairs.
7	(e)	The terms of the members shall be four years, and no
8	person sh	all be appointed consecutively to more than two terms,
9	in accord	ance with section 26-34.
10	<u>(f)</u>	There is to be established in each of the counties of
11	the State	a puuhonua commission advisory committee. Each
12	committee	shall consist of three members to be appointed as
13	follows:	one member shall be appointed by the governor pursuant
14	to sectio	n 26-34; and two members shall be appointed by the
15	governor	from a list of nominees submitted by the mayor of the
16	appropria	te county. Each committee shall meet at least once
17	each quar	ter. Each committee shall inform the puuhonua
18	commissio	n of the needs of probationers, parolees, and post-
19	incarcera	ted persons within the county.
20	(g)	Members of the commission and the advisory committees
21	shall ser	ve without compensation, but may be reimbursed from the

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*	ppecial fund for necessary and reasonable expenses incurred in
2	the performance of their duties, including travel expenses,
3	pending availability of funds.
4	(h) There is established in the state treasury the
5	puuhonua commission special fund, into which shall be deposited:
6	(1) Appropriations from the legislature; and
7	(2) All revenues from grants or donations made to the
8	commission.
9	Moneys in the puuhonua commission special fund shall be
10	used to support the puuhonua commission and puuhonua commission
11	advisory committees."
12	SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.
13	SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
