A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE JOINT TERRORISM TASK FORCE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the world is under 2 terroristic attack, and the State must be vigilant to protect 3 its islands and residents. As one of the largest military 4 outposts in the nation and the critical site of United States 5 military presence in the pacific, Hawaii may be a target of 6 terroristic threats or attacks. In the wake of international 7 terrorism, Hawaii must ensure preparedness and proper procedures 8 should a terroristic threat or attack take place.

9 The legislature further finds that it is the duty of our 10 federal and State governmental departments to prepare the proper 11 procedures for such potential terroristic threats or attack and 12 develop a counterterrorism plan that addresses the security 13 issues and necessary response. Ultimately, a partnership 14 between the various federal and State law enforcement agencies 15 to development this plan is in the State's best interest.

1 The purpose of this bill is to establish in the office of 2 the governor a joint terrorism task force of various State and 3 federal law enforcement agencies to fight terrorism. SECTION 2. (a) 4 There is established in the office of the 5 governor a joint terrorism task force of various State and 6 federal government law enforcement agencies to fight terrorism. 7 The federal agencies are invited to participate on a voluntary basis. 8 9 (b) The task force shall develop an emergency 10 counterterrorism plan for the State that addresses certain 11 security issues resulting from a terroristic attack or 12 terroristic threat to the State and any necessary response. 13 The adjutant general of the department of defense (c) 14 shall serve as chairperson of the task force. 15 In addition to the adjutant general of the department (d) 16 of defense, the task force shall consist of the following 17 members or their representatives: 18 (1) The secretary of the United States Department of 19 Homeland Security, who is invited to participate on a 20 voluntary basis;

(f) The task force shall submit reports of its findings
 and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the
 legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
 the regular session of 2017.

(g) The task force shall cease to exist on June 30, 2017.
SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2016-2017 for costs
incurred by the joint terrorism task force pursuant to this Act.
The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of the
governor for the purposes of this Act.

12 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2016.
