A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO WILDLIFE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that there is broad
2	consensus that the trafficking of animals threatened with
3	extinction continues to grow at an alarming pace, threatening an
4	increasing variety of animal species. These species are
5	threatened with extinction in large part due to the trafficking
6	of their parts and products. The National Strategy for
7	Combating Wildlife Trafficking, released in February 2014,
8	recognized the important role that states have in protecting
9	species that are subject to illegal wildlife trade. Federal law
10	regulates the transfer or importation of parts or products made
11	from endangered animal species, but because of increasing demand
12	for these products around the world, state authority needs to be
13	aligned with federal and international laws to appropriately
14	regulate these markets on a local level.
15	The legislature finds that in September 2015, the United
16	States and China announced a cooperative effort to take
17	comprehensive action to curb wildlife trafficking, stating the

- 1 "United States and China commit to enact nearly complete bans on
- 2 ivory import and export, including significant and timely
- 3 restrictions on the import of ivory as hunting trophies, and to
- 4 take significant and timely steps to halt the domestic
- 5 commercial trade of ivory."
- 6 The legislature finds that as Hawaii is the host of the
- 7 September 2016 World Conservation Congress held by the
- 8 International Union for the Conservation of Nature and the
- 9 United States, it is important to demonstrate Hawaii's
- 10 continuing leadership in global conservation challenges,
- 11 international wildlife trafficking, and endangered species
- 12 protection.
- 13 The legislature finds that the most effective way to
- 14 discourage illegal trafficking in animal species threatened with
- 15 extinction is to eliminate markets and profits. It is in the
- 16 public interest to protect animal species threatened with
- 17 extinction by prohibiting within the State of Hawaii, with
- 18 certain limited exceptions, the sale, offer for sale, purchase,
- 19 trade, barter for, and distribution of any part or product of
- 20 any species of elephant (Elephantidea), mammoth (Mammuthus),
- 21 rhinoceros (Rhinocerotidea), tiger (Pathera tigris), great ape

- 1 (Hominoidea), Hawaiian monk seal (Neomonachus schauinslandi),
- 2 shark (Elasmobranchii selachimorpha), ray (Elasmobranchii
- 3 batoidea), sea turtle (Chelonioidea), walrus (Odobenidae
- 4 odobenus), narwhal (Monodon monoceros), whale (Cetacea),
- 5 hippopotamus (Hippopotamus amphibious), lion (Panthera leo),
- 6 pangolin (Manis), cheetah (Acinonyx jubatus), jaguar (Panthera
- 7 onca), or leopard (Panthera pardus) that is identified as
- 8 threatened with extinction by specified international
- 9 conservation organizations. These animals are the most
- 10 trafficked species that are threatened with extinction as
- 11 documented by illegal wildlife product seizure data compiled by
- 12 TRAFFIC, a program of the World Wildlife Fund and the
- 13 International Union for Conservation of Nature, and data
- 14 collected by other international conservation organizations.
- The purpose of this Act is to improve coordination between
- 16 state natural resource laws and other government authorities in
- 17 accordance with the intent expressed by section 183D-8, Hawaii
- 18 Revised Statutes. As other countries and states adopt laws to
- 19 protect endangered species, Hawaii needs to ensure that it is
- 20 not an attractive market for illegal wildlife trafficking.

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SECTION 2. Chapter 183D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 1 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 2 and to read as follows: 3 "§183D-A Trafficking of certain wildlife prohibited. (a) 4 Notwithstanding section 183D-6 to the contrary, no person shall 5 sell, offer to sell, purchase, trade, barter for, or distribute 6 any covered animal species part or product from the following 7 animal species: elephant (Elephantidea), rhinoceros 8 (Rhinocerotidea), tiger (Pathera tigris), great ape 9 (Hominoidea), hippopotamus (Hippopotamus amphibious), lion 10 (Panthera leo), pangolin (Manis), cheetah (Acinonyx jubatus), 11 jaguar (Panthera onca), or leopard (Panthera pardus). 12 (b) The sale, offer to sell, purchase, trade, barter for, 13 or distribution of any covered animal species part or product 14 from the following animal marine species is prohibited: Hawaiian 15 monk seal (Neomonachus schauinslandi), shark (various 16 Elasmobranchii selachimorpha), ray (Elasmobranchii batoidea), 17 sea turtle (Chelonioidea), narwhal (Monodon monoceros), whale 18 (Cetacea), or walrus (Odobenidae odobenus), insofar as the 19 species, subspecies, or distinct population segment is listed 20 21 on:

1	(1)	The Convention on International Trade in Endangered
2		Species of Wild Fauna and Flora, Appendices 1 or 2;
3	(2)	The International Union for the Conservation of Nature
4		Red List as vulnerable, endangered, or critically
5		endangered; or
6	(3)	The Endangered Species Act as threatened or
7		endangered.
8	<u>(c)</u>	The sale, offer to sell, purchase, trade, barter for,
9	or distri	bution of any covered animal species part or product
10	from mamm	oth (Mammuthus) is prohibited, even though the species
l1	is extino	et.
12	(d)	The following are exempt from the prohibitions of this
13	section:	
14	(1)	The covered animal species part or product is part of
15		a bona fide antique; provided that the antique status
16		of the antique is established by the owner or seller
17		with historical documentation showing the antique is
18		not less than one hundred years old, and the covered
19		animal species part or product is less than twenty per
20		cent by volume of the antique;

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1	(2)	The distribution of the covered animal species part or
2		product is for a bona fide educational or scientific
3	•	purpose, or to or from a museum;
4	(3)	The distribution of the covered animal species part or
5		product is to a legal beneficiary of an estate, trust,
6		or other inheritance, upon the death of the owner of
7		the covered animal species part or product;
8	(4)	The covered animal species part or product is less
9		than twenty per cent by volume of a musical
10		instrument, including string instruments and bows,
11		wind and percussion instruments, and pianos, if the
12		owner or seller provides historical documentation
13		demonstrating provenance and showing the item was
14		manufactured no later than 1975;
15	<u>(5)</u>	Guns and knives whose composition contains less than
16		twenty per cent ivory or rhinoceros horn;
17	(6)	The ivory is a fixed component or components of a
18		larger manufactured item and is not, in its current
19		form, the primary source of value of the item;
20	<u>(7)</u>	The intrastate sale, offer for sale, purchase, trade,
21		barter for, or distribution of the covered animal

1		species part or product is expressly authorized by	
2		federal law or permit; or	
3	(8)	Traditional cultural practices that are expressly	
4		protected under article XII, section 7, of the state	
5		constitution.	
6	<u>(e)</u>	There is a presumption of possession with intent to	
7	sell a co	vered animal species part or product when the part or	
8	product i	s possessed by a retail or wholesale establishment or	
9	other forum engaged in the business of buying or selling similar		
10	items. The rebuttable presumption shall not preclude a finding		
11	of intent to sell based on any other evidence that may serve to		
12	independe	ently establish such intent."	
13	SECT	TION 3. Section 183D-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
14	amended l	by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:	
15	" (b)	Any person violating section 183D-A, 183D-25.5, 183D-	
16	26, 183D	-27, 183D-32, 183D-62, or 183D-64 shall be guilty of a	
17	misdemea	nor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished as	
18	follows:		
19	(1)	For a first conviction by a mandatory fine of not less	
20		than \$200, or by imprisonment of not more than one	
21		year, or both;	

1	(2)	For a second conviction within five years of a
2		previous conviction, by a mandatory fine of not less
3		than \$1,000, or by imprisonment of not more than one
4		year, or both, and all firearms used in the commission
5		of the violations shall be considered contraband to be
6		forfeited to and disposed of by the State; and
7	(3)	For a third or subsequent conviction within five years
8		of the first two or more convictions, by a mandatory
9		fine of not less than \$2,000, or by imprisonment of
10		not more than one year, or both, and all firearms used
11		in the commission of the violations shall be
12		considered contraband to be forfeited to and disposed
13		of by the State."
14	SECT	ION 4. In codifying the new sections added by section
15	2 of this	Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
16	appropria	te section numbers for the letters used in designating
17	the new s	ections in this Act.
18	SECT	ION 5. New statutory material is underscored.
19	SECT	ION 6. If any provision of this Act, or the
20	applicati	on thereof to any person or circumstance, is held
21	invalid,	the invalidity does not affect other provisions or

- 1 applications of the Act that can be given effect without the
- 2 invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions
- 3 of this Act are severable.
- 4 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on December 31,
- 5 2016; provided that no enforcement actions shall be taken under
- 6 this Act until December 31, 2017.
