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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO WILDLIFE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that there is broad 2 consensus that the trafficking of animals threatened with 3 extinction continues to grow at an alarming pace, threatening an 4 increasing variety of animal species. These species are threatened with extinction in large part due to the trafficking 5 6 of their parts and products. The National Strategy for 7 Combating Wildlife Trafficking, released in February 2014, 8 recognized the important role that states have in protecting 9 species that are subject to illegal wildlife trade. Federal law 10 regulates the transfer or importation of parts or products made 11 from endangered animal species, but because of increasing demand 12 for these products around the world, state authority needs to be 13 aligned with federal and international laws to appropriately 14 regulate these markets on a local level.

15 The legislature finds that in September 2015, the United 16 States and China announced a cooperative effort to take 17 comprehensive action to curb wildlife trafficking, stating that

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1 the "United States and China commit to enact nearly complete
2 bans on ivory import and export, including significant and
3 timely restrictions on the import of ivory as hunting trophies,
4 and to take significant and timely steps to halt the domestic
5 commercial trade of ivory."

6 The legislature finds that as Hawaii is the host of the 7 September 2016 World Conservation Congress held by the 8 International Union for the Conservation of Nature and the 9 United States, it is important to demonstrate Hawaii's 10 continuing leadership in global conservation challenges, 11 international wildlife trafficking, and endangered species 12 protection.

13 The legislature finds that the most effective way to 14 discourage illegal trafficking in animal species threatened with 15 extinction is to eliminate markets and profits. It is in the 16 public interest to protect animal species threatened with 17 extinction by prohibiting within the State of Hawaii, with 18 certain limited exceptions, the sale, offer for sale, purchase, 19 trade, barter for, and distribution of any part or product of 20 any species of elephant (Elephantidea), mammoth (Mammuthus), 21 rhinoceros (Rhinocerotidea), tiger (Pathera tigris), great ape

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1 (Hominoidea), Hawaiian monk seal (Neomonachus schauinslandi), shark (Elasmobranchii selachimorpha), ray (Elasmobranchii 2 3 batoidea), sea turtle (Chelonioidea), walrus (Odobenidae 4 odobenus), narwhal (Monodon monoceros), whale (Cetacea), 5 hippopotamus (Hippopotamus amphibious), lion (Panthera leo), 6 pangolin (Manis), cheetah (Acinonyx jubatus), jaguar (Panthera 7 onca), or leopard (Panthera pardus) that is identified as 8 threatened with extinction by specified international 9 conservation organizations. These animals are the most 10 trafficked species that are threatened with extinction as 11 documented by illegal wildlife product seizure data compiled by 12 TRAFFIC, a program of the World Wildlife Fund and the 13 International Union for Conservation of Nature, and data 14 collected by other international conservation organizations.

15 The purpose of this Act is to improve coordination between 16 state natural resource laws and other government authorities in 17 accordance with the intent expressed by section 183D-8, Hawaii 18 Revised Statutes. As other countries and states adopt laws to 19 protect endangered species, Hawaii needs to ensure that it is 20 not an attractive market for illegal wildlife trafficking.



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1	SECTION 2. Chapter 183D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated

4	" <u>§183D-A</u> Trafficking of certain wildlife prohibited. (a)		
5	Notwithstanding section 183D-6 to the contrary, no person shall		
6	sell, offer to sell, purchase, trade, barter for, or distribute		
7	any covered animal species part or product from the following		
8	animal species: elephant (Elephantidea), rhinoceros		
9	(Rhinocerotidea), tiger (Pathera tigris), great ape		
10	(Hominoidea), hippopotamus (Hippopotamus amphibious), lion		
11	(Panthera leo), pangolin (Manis), cheetah (Acinonyx jubatus),		
12	jaguar (Panthera onca), or leopard (Panthera pardus).		
13	(b) Unless otherwise authorized by the federal Marine		
14	Mammal Protection Act, 16 United States Code Chapter 31, the		
15	sale, offer to sell, purchase, trade, barter for, or		
16	distribution of any covered animal species part or product from		
17	the following animal marine species is prohibited: Hawaiian monk		
18	seal (Neomonachus schauinslandi), shark (various Elasmobranchii		
19	<u>selachimorpha), ray (Elasmobranchii batoidea), sea turtle</u>		
20	(Chelonioidea), narwhal (Monodon monoceros), whale (Cetacea), or		



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1	walrus (O	dobenidae odobenus), insofar as the species,

3	<u>(1)</u>	The Convention on International Trade in Endangered
4		Species of Wild Fauna and Flora, Appendices 1 or 2;

8	(3)	The Endangered Species Act as threatened or

12	(c)	The sale, offer to sell, purchase, trade, barter for,
13	<u>or distri</u>	bution of any covered animal species part or product
14	from mamm	oth (Mammuthus) is prohibited, even though the species
15	<u>is extinc</u>	<u>t.</u>
16	(d)	The following are exempt from the prohibitions of this
17	section:	
18	(1)	The covered animal species part or product is part of
19		a bona fide antique; provided that the antique status
20		of the antique is established by the owner or seller
21		with historical documentation showing the antique is



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1		not less than one hundred years old, the covered
2		animal species part or product is less than twenty per
3	,	cent by volume of the antique, and any animal species
4		part or product is a fixed component or components of
5		a larger manufactured item and is not, in its current
6		form, the primary source of value of the item;
7	(2)	The distribution of the covered animal species part or
8		product is for a bona fide educational or scientific
9		purpose, or to or from a museum;
10	(3)	The distribution of the covered animal species part or
11		product is to a legal beneficiary of an estate, trust,
12		or other inheritance, upon the death of the owner of
13		the covered animal species part or product;
14	(4)	The covered animal species part or product is less
15		than twenty per cent by volume of a musical
16		instrument, including string instruments and bows,
17		wind and percussion instruments, and pianos, if the
18		owner or seller provides historical documentation
19		demonstrating provenance and showing the item was
20		manufactured no later than 1975;

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
1	(5)	Guns and knives whose composition contains less than
2		twenty per cent ivory, including mammoth ivory, or
3		rhinoceros horn;
4	(6)	The intrastate sale, offer for sale, purchase, trade,
5		barter for, or distribution of the covered animal
6		species part or product is expressly authorized by
7		federal law or permit; or
8	<u>(7)</u>	Traditional cultural practices that are expressly
9		protected under article XII, section 7, of the state
10		constitution.
11	<u>(e)</u>	There is a presumption of possession with intent to
12	sell a co	vered animal species part or product when the part or
13	product i	s possessed by a retail or wholesale establishment or
14	other for	um engaged in the business of buying or selling similar
15	items. T	he rebuttable presumption shall not preclude a finding
16	<u>of intent</u>	to sell based on any other evidence that may serve to
17	independe	ntly establish such intent.
18	<u>(f)</u>	For purposes of this section, "covered animal species
19	part or p	roduct" means any item that contains, or is wholly or
20	partially	made from, any covered animal species."



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1	SECT	ION 3. Section 183D-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended b	y amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
3	"(b)	Any person violating section <u>183D-A,</u> 183D-25.5, 183D-
4	26, 183D-	27, 183D-32, 183D-62, or 183D-64 shall be guilty of a
5	misdemean	or, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished as
6	follows:	
7	(1)	For a first conviction by a mandatory fine of not less
8		than \$200, or by imprisonment of not more than one
9		year, or both;
10	(2)	For a second conviction within five years of a
11		previous conviction, by a mandatory fine of not less
12		than \$1,000, or by imprisonment of not more than one
13		year, or both, and all firearms, animal parts,
14	•	products, or items containing prohibited animal parts
15		or products used in the commission of the violations
16		shall be considered contraband to be forfeited to and
17		disposed of by the State; and
18	(3)	For a third or subsequent conviction within five years
19		of the first two or more convictions, by a mandatory
20		fine of not less than \$2,000, or by imprisonment of
21		not more than one year, or both, and all firearms,



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1 animal parts, products, or items containing prohibited 2 animal parts or products used in the commission of the 3 violations shall be considered contraband to be 4 forfeited to and disposed of by the State." 5 SECTION 4. In codifying the new section added by section 2 6 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute 7 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating the new sections in this Act. 8 9 SECTION 5. New statutory material is underscored. 10 SECTION 6. If any provision of this Act, or the 11 application thereof to any person or circumstance, is held 12 invalid, the invalidity does not affect other provisions or 13 applications of the Act that can be given effect without the 14 invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions 15 of this Act are severable. 16 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on December 31, 17 2016; provided that no enforcement actions shall be taken under

18 this Act until December 31, 2017.
