#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGRICULTURE.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Alexander & Baldwin (A&B), the owner of 2 Hawaiian Commercial & Sugar Co. (HC&S), recently announced the
- 3 anticipated closure of Hawaii's last sugar plantation. A&B
- 4 plans to close its thirty-six thousand-acre HC&S sugar
- 5 plantation operation on the island of Maui by the end of 2016
- 6 and transition to a diversified crop model. Starting in March
- 7 2016, HC&S intends to begin terminating its six hundred seventy-
- 8 five employees as their particular functions are completed, with
- 9 about half being retained through the end of the harvest in late
- **10** 2016.
- 11 This closure is devastating news. It will impose severe
- 12 challenges and hardship upon the displaced workers and their
- 13 families, the communities and businesses on Maui, and
- 14 ultimately, the Maui economy.
- 15 The legislature finds that in response to this impending
- 16 crisis, a concerted effort by the State, county of Maui, and all
- 17 the stakeholders is critically needed. Action must be taken now

1 to assist those who will be displaced, stabilize the Maui 2 economy, and transition and prepare for a better future. 3 The legislature further finds that a key component in this 4 regard is the aggressive expansion of diversified agriculture. 5 Diversified agriculture will provide displaced HC&S workers and 6 businesses and farms on Maui with critically-needed employment 7 and economic opportunities. Furthermore, the expansion of 8 diversified agriculture comports with the State's responsibility 9 to conserve and protect agricultural lands, promote diversified 10 agriculture, increase agricultural self-sufficiency, and assure 11 the availability of agriculturally suitable lands that is 12 mandated by article XI, section 3 of the state constitution. 13 Diversified agriculture also promotes food security, which 14 the legislature finds must be a priority goal of the State. In 15 this regard, approximately ninety per cent of the food consumed **16** in the State must be shipped in from the continental United 17 States or foreign countries. Hawaii's geographic isolation 18 subjects the State to shipping interruptions that are beyond its 19 control. The aging agricultural workforce, together with a 20 reluctance of the youth to work in the agricultural fields, only 21 increases the challenges of reaching the goal of food security.

- 1 An expansion of diversified agriculture will enable displaced
- 2 HC&S workers to help Maui and the State meet its important food
- 3 security goals.
- 4 The legislature further finds that the agribusiness
- 5 development corporation was established by Act 264, Session Laws
- 6 of Hawaii 1994, to create a vehicle and process to make optimal
- 7 use of agricultural assets for the economic, environmental, and
- 8 social benefit of the residents of the State. When the
- 9 agribusiness development corporation was established, the sugar
- 10 and pineapple industries were downsizing and the plantations
- 11 were expected to release seventy-five thousand acres of
- 12 agricultural lands and fifty million gallons of irrigation water
- 13 per day, over the following decade. The agribusiness
- 14 development corporation was tasked with administering a dynamic
- 15 and aggressive program to assist the transition from plantation
- 16 operations into other agricultural enterprises, to carry on
- 17 marketing analysis to direct the needed agricultural evolution,
- 18 and provide leadership for the development, financing,
- 19 improvement, or enhancement of agricultural enterprises. The
- 20 legislature finds that this kind of proactive and dynamic action

1	is exactly	y what is needed today to address the many difficult
2	challenge	s of the HC&S closure.
3	The	purpose of this Act is to require the agribusiness
4	developme	nt corporation to ensure that the agricultural lands
5	and infra	structure to be released from sugarcane production on
6	the islan	d of Maui by A&B are used to optimize reaching the
7	State's g	oal of increasing and supporting the development of
8	diversifi	ed agriculture by requiring the corporation to, with
9	the assis	tance of state agencies:
10	(1)	Monitor the closure of the HC&S sugarcane plantation;
11	(2)	Identify lands for possible acquisition by the State,
12		through various means, suitable for diversified
13		agriculture and an agricultural park and incubator;
14		and
15	(3)	Support the development and sustainability of
16		diversified agriculture by investigating and
17	,	determining the feasibility of:
18		(A) Establishing agricultural cooperative
19		associations;

1	(B)	Establishing public-private partnerships to
2		provide historically appropriate workforce
3		housing;
4	(C)	Retro-fitting existing facilities into an
5		agricultural technology park;
6	(D)	Establishing an agricultural foreign-trade zone;
7	(E)	Establishing an education and workforce pipeline
8		with high schools and the University of Hawaii
9		Maui College; and
10	(F)	Assisting the research and development of
11		diversified agriculture on Maui.
12	SECTION 2	. To ensure that the agricultural lands and
13	infrastructure	of the HC&S thirty-six thousand-acre sugar
14	plantation ope	ration on the island of Maui that are anticipated
15	to be released	from sugarcane production by A&B are used to
16	optimize reach	ing the State's goal of increasing and supporting
17	diversified ag	riculture, the agribusiness development
18	corporation sh	all:
19	(1) With	the assistance of the department of business,
20	econ	omic development, and tourism, monitor the
21	term	ination of operations of A&B's sugarcane

plantation on Maui and request from A&B information
and updates related thereto;

- 3 With the assistance of the department of agriculture (2) 4 and the department of land and natural resources, 5 identify lands currently being used for the HC&S 6 thirty-six thousand-acre sugar plantation operation on 7 the island of Maui that are suitable for diversified 8 agriculture and development of an agricultural park 9 and incubator, to assist former sugarcane workers and 10 new farmers to acquire the necessary capital and 11 capacity to engage in diversified farming. 12 corporation shall also develop acquisition plans and 13 strategies for those suitable lands, including 14 purchase, lease, exchange, public-private partnership with A&B or other stakeholders, or a combination 15 16 thereof. The plans and strategies shall also include 17 estimations of acquisition and operating costs and the 18 proposed means of financing.
  - (3) With the assistance of the department of agriculture and University of Hawaii college of tropical agriculture and human resources, determine the impact

2	association under chapter 421, Hawaii Revised
3	Statutes, made up of former sugarcane workers and new
1	farmers, on the transition of the sugarcane lands to
5	diversified farming;

- (4) With the assistance of the Hawaii housing finance and development corporation, determine the feasibility of a public-private partnership with A&B or other stakeholders to provide workforce housing with priority given to the preservation and restoration of structures that reflect the historic character of Maui;
- (5) With the assistance of the high technology development corporation, determine the feasibility of acquiring and retrofitting the existing facilities of the sugarcane operation to establish an agricultural technology park in or near Pu'unene, Maui, for the handling, preparation, storage, processing, and packing of agricultural products produced by an agricultural cooperative association;

1	(6)	With the assistance of the department of business,
2		economic development, and tourism, determine the
3		feasibility of establishing an agricultural foreign-
4		trade zone to enable importers, manufacturers, and
5		distributors to realize cost-savings benefits that
6		will increase the competitiveness of diversified
7		agriculture on Maui;
8	(7)	Collaborate with the department of education and the
9		workforce development council, to establish an
10		education and workforce pipeline with high schools and
11		the University of Hawaii Maui College; and
12	(8)	Collaborate with the University of Hawaii college of
13		tropical agriculture and human resources to aid the
14		research and development of diversified agriculture on
15		Maui by troubleshooting, patents, and exploring new
16		crops and niche value-added crops that thrive on
17		former sugarcane lands.
18	SECT	ION 3. Commencing with the regular session of 2017,
19	the agrib	usiness development corporation shall submit a report
20	to the le	gislature no later than twenty days prior to the
21	convening	of each regular session that includes:

1	(1)	The status of the implementation or progress of the	
2		mandates described in section 2 of this Act;	
3	(2)	The timeframe and costs associated with developing,	
4		implementing, operating, and sustaining the projects,	
5		programs, and tasks described in section 2 of this	
6		Act; and	
7	(3)	Necessary proposed legislation.	
8	SECT	ION 4. All state agencies, including the department of	
9	the attor	ney general; department of agriculture; department of	
10	business,	economic development, and tourism; department of land	
11	and natural resources; department of education; University of		
12	Hawaii co	llege of tropical agriculture and human resources;	
13	Hawaii ho	using finance and development corporation; workforce	
14	developme	nt council; and legislative reference bureau shall	
15	assist th	e agribusiness development corporation, upon its	
16	request,	in any matters related to this Act.	
17	The	legislative reference bureau shall, upon the request of	
18	the agrib	usiness development corporation, assist in the	
19	preparati	on of the annual report required by section 3 of this	
20	Act; prov	ided that the corporation shall deliver to the bureau	
21	all infor	mation and materials deemed necessary by the bureau for	

- 1 the preparation of the report no later than forty days prior to
- 2 the convening of each regular session.
- 3 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
- 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 5 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2016-2017 for
- 6 monitoring, investigating, inter-agency collaboration,
- 7 feasibility studies, reports, and any other matters related to
- 8 the purposes of this Act.
- 9 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the agribusiness
- 10 development corporation for the purposes of this Act.
- 11 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
- 12 provided that section 5 shall take effect on July 1, 2016.

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#### Report Title:

HC&S Sugarcane Plantation Closure; Diversified Agriculture; Agribusiness Development Corporation; Appropriation

#### Description:

Requires the Agribusiness Development Corporation to prepare for the closure of the HC&S thirty-six thousand-acre sugar plantation on Maui by, among other things, monitoring the closure; identifying suitable lands for acquisition by the State; and investigating the means necessary to develop and sustain diversified agriculture on the former sugarcane lands. Makes an appropriation.

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
