A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HISTORIC PRESERVATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECT	ION 1. The legislature finds that:
2	(1)	Since the establishment of chapter 6E, Hawaii Revised
3		Statutes, and the enactment of the federal
4		Archaeological and Historic Preservation Act (Public
5		Law 93-291), thousands of archaeological studies have
6		been carried out in the State;
7	(2)	Many of these studies have resulted in the collection
8		of tens of thousands of archaeological artifacts and
9		other archaeological resources;
10	(3)	The State lacks an archaeological repository, and thus
11		the collections generated by these archaeological
12		studies are stored by the organizations that collected
13		the archaeological materials;
14	(4)	It is unknown how much material has been collected as
15		a result of those studies;

1	(5)	It is not clearly understood where all collections are
2		housed or the conditions under which they are stored;
3		and

(6) The public interest requires that these artifacts and archaeological resources be stored or curated to ensure that they are available for future research and education.

Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to make an appropriation to the state historic preservation division of the department of land and natural resources to conduct a study to determine the size and condition of archaeological collections currently in private storage, and to assess alternatives for providing safe and secure curation facilities for these and future archeological collections.

SECTION 2. The state historic preservation division of the department of land and natural resources shall conduct a study to assess the size and condition of archaeological collections in the State and examine the need for alternatives for safely storing those collections for future research and educational purposes. The study shall:

1	(1)	Determine the amount of archaeological material		
2		currently in private storage;		
3	(2)	Assess the quality of the storage facilities currently		
4		in use;		
5	(3)	Estimate the additional amount of archaeological		
6		material that is likely to be produced as a result of		
7		archaeological studies conducted by 2025;		
8	(4)	Assess alternatives for providing safe and secure		
9		storage of archaeological collections; and		
10	(5)	Assess the feasibility and cost of the various		
11		alternatives, including planning, designing,		
12		constructing, and operating state-owned archaeological		
13		curation facilities.		
14	The	state historic preservation division shall submit a		
15	report of	its findings and recommendations, including any		
16	proposed	legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty		
17	7 days prior to the start of the regular session of 2018.			
18	SECT	ION 3. There is appropriated out of the general		
19	revenues	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$65,000 or so much		
20	thereof a	s may be necessary for fiscal year 2016-2017 for the		
21	state his	toric preservation division to conduct a study to
