H.B. NO. 2642

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EMPLOYMENT TRAINING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Alexander & Baldwin, 1 Inc. recently announced that their sugar plantation operations 2 in Hawaii are set to close at the end of 2016 and this year will 3 be the last sugar harvest on its 36,000-acre plantation on Maui. 4 The six hundred seventy-five people employed by its subsidiary, 5 Hawaiian Commercial & Sugar Company, will be laid off 6 progressively starting in March as their responsibilities come 7 to an end. The legislature further finds that the closure of 8 the sugar industry, as well as the shutdown of Heald College, 9 further wreaks havoc on the local economy. Such economic 10 devastation is nothing new; within a span of one month beginning 11 in March 2008, four large Hawaii companies (Molokai Ranch, Aloha 12 Airlines, ATA airlines, and Weyerhaeuser Company) closed their 13 doors, leaving 2,362 island employees jobless. 14

15 In response to the mass layoffs at Aloha Airlines, the 16 department of labor and industrial relations created the State's 17 rapid response team to address issues such as job readiness,



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1	training, medical benefits, public assistance and jobs search			
2	assistance to assist displaced workers.			
3	The purpose of this Act is to implement a program of			
4	benefits similar to the rapid response program that was put into			
5	place to assist displaced employees of Aloha Airlines.			
6	SECTION 2. Chapter 201, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is			
7	amended by adding two new sections to be appropriately			
8	designated and to read as follows:			
9	" §201- <u>Rapid Response Training.</u> (a) There is			
10	established the rapid response training program in the			
11	department of business, economic development, and tourism. The			
12	purpose of the program shall be to facilitate the development of			
13	a rapid response training capacity in Hawaii that will be			
14	capable of developing and delivering, for businesses and			
15	industries, short-term customized training programs, which			
16	cannot be provided in a timely fashion by existing training			
17	programs.			
18	(b) The program shall achieve its purpose by:			
19	(1) Working with the workforce development community,			
20	county economic development boards, business and			
21	industry associations, and other appropriate			



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1		entities to identify and market rapid response	
2		custom training to the business community;	
3	(2)	Contracting with firms requesting customized	
4		training to provide for the development and delivery	
5		of such training;	
6	(3)	Contracting with appropriate training providers for	
7		the development of customized training programs; and	
8	<u>(4)</u>	Upon commencement of training delivery, collecting	
9		fees from contracted firms for the training of their	
10		current or prospective employees.	
11	<u>(c)</u>	The department of business, economic development, and	
12	tourism s	shall contract for the development of custom training	
13	programs	with educational and training resources in the public	
14	and private sectors throughout the State, as may be appropriate		
15	to accom	plish the purpose of the program.	
16	(d)	The rapid response training program shall place a	
17	priority	on developing training programs that provide high-	
18	skilled v	workers for jobs paying the median wage in new or	
19	expanding	g businesses, and for which the rapid development and	
20	<u>delivery</u>	of training is important to the decision of the firm or	
21	industry	to make the proposed business investment. The program	



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1	shall also	place priority on business expansions that propose to
2	train or 3	cetrain workers who are unemployed or facing
3	unemployme	ent due to mass-layoff events.
4	<u>(e)</u>	The program shall develop measures of program
5	performance	ce to assess the impact of the training provided under
6	the rapid	response program on the supply of high skilled workers
7	in the eco	phomy and the impact on the development of sustained,
8	new busin	ess activity.
9	<u>§201</u>	- Rapid response training revolving fund. (a)
10	There is	established in the state treasury the rapid response
11	training	revolving fund, into which shall be deposited:
12	(1)	Appropriations by the legislature;
13	(2)	Training fees paid by firms or other agencies and
14		organizations related to training services;
15	(3)	Donations and contributions made by private
16		individuals or organizations for deposit into the
17		fund; and
18	(4)	Grants or transfers of funds provided by governmental
19		agencies or any other source.
20	<u>(b)</u>	Moneys in the rapid response training revolving fund
21	shall be	used by the department:



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1	(1)	To contract with appropriate training providers for
2		the development of rapid response custom training
3		programs; and
4	(2)	For administrative expenses, including but not limited
5		to supplies, equipment, and services necessary for the
6		appropriate administration of the rapid response
7		training program."
