A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FOOD WASTE DISPOSAL.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. According to the United States Environmental
- 2 Protection Agency and the United States Department of
- 3 Agriculture, food waste is the second largest component in our
- 4 waste stream and accounts for twenty-five per cent of all
- 5 materials sent to our landfills. The city and county of
- 6 Honolulu alone disposes of 20,000 tons of food waste per year to
- 7 HPOWER, and incinerating wet food waste requires additional
- 8 energy to process and dry, resulting in HPOWER's reduced
- 9 operational efficiency.
- 10 High disposal tipping fees due to food waste weight are
- 11 passed on to consumers and can be reduced through food waste
- 12 diversion strategies. The city and county of Honolulu is
- 13 already operating a successful model program that requires food
- 14 waste diversion from the municipal solid waste stream for
- 15 commercial food waste generators.
- Recycling food waste and turning it into compost has high
- 17 environmental benefits, such as improving soil health,



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- 1 increasing drought resistance, and reducing the need for
- 2 supplemental water, fertilizers, and pesticides. Furthermore,
- 3 applying compost and organic matter to soils sequesters carbon
- 4 from the atmosphere, forming the largest land-based carbon sink,
- 5 mitigating climate change, and effectively reducing greenhouse
- 6 gas emissions. The legislature believes that food waste
- 7 diversion will help move Hawaii toward the Aloha+ Challenge
- 8 commitment of seventy per cent waste stream reduction by 2025.
- 9 The purpose of this Act is to:
- 10 (1) Require commercial entities that generate over one ton
- of commercial food waste annually to reduce such waste
- 12 to zero by January 1, 2025; and
- 13 (2) Create an advisory committee to investigate existing
- solid waste management infrastructure and resources
- necessary to support a food waste disposal reduction
- program.
- 17 SECTION 2. Chapter 342G, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 18 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 19 and to read as follows:
- 20 "§342G- Zero food waste; goal. (a) A commercial food
- 21 wholesaler or distributor, industrial food manufacturer or



- 1 processor, supermarket, resort, or conference center that
- 2 generates over one ton of commercial food waste annually shall
- 3 reduce such waste to zero by January 1, 2025.
- 4 (b) No later than January 1, 2019, the department of
- 5 health shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 to achieve the
- 6 goal identified in subsection (a)."
- 7 SECTION 3. (a) The office of solid waste management shall
- 8 convene a solid waste infrastructure advisory committee to:
- 9 (1) Review the current solid waste management
- infrastructure in the State;
- 11 (2) Evaluate the sufficiency of existing solid waste
- 12 management infrastructure to meet the requirements for
- eliminating food waste in the municipal solid waste
- 14 stream by 2025; and
- 15 (3) Recommend development or construction of new solid
- waste management infrastructure in the State.
- 17 (b) The solid waste infrastructure advisory committee
- 18 shall be composed of the following members, to be appointed by
- 19 the director of health:
- 20 (1) Four representatives from the solid waste management
- 21 districts from Oahu, Kauai, Maui, and Hawaii Island;

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1	(2)	one representative from the solid waste correction
2		industry, who shall own or operate a material recovery
3		facility;
4	(3)	Two representatives from the solid waste commercial
5		hauling industry; provided that one of the
6		representatives shall serve rural or underserved areas
7		of the State;
8	(4)	One representative from the recycling industry for
9		food residuals or leaf and yard residuals;
10	(5)	One representative from a Hawaii institution or
11		business subject to the requirements of food waste
12		diversion from the municipal solid waste stream;
13	(6)	One representative from the food industry; and
14	(7)	One representative from the community.
15	The	state solid waste management coordinator or the
16	coordinat	or's designee shall serve as an ex officio member of
17	the advis	ory committee.
18	(c)	The solid waste infrastructure advisory committee
19	shall hav	e the following duties:
20	(1)	Review the existing systems analysis of the State
21		waste stream to determine whether the existing solid

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1		waste management facilities operating in the State
2		provide sufficient services to comply with the
3		requirements of food waste diversion from the
4		municipal solid waste stream by 2025, and meet any
5		demand for services;
6	(2)	Summarize the locations or service sectors where the
7		State lacks sufficient infrastructure or resources to
8		comply with the requirements of food waste diversion
9		from the municipal solid waste stream by 2025,
10		including the infrastructure necessary in each
11		location;
12	(3)	Estimate the cost of constructing the necessary
13		infrastructure identified in paragraph (2);
14	(4)	Review options for generating the revenue sufficient
15		to fund the costs of constructing necessary
16		infrastructure; and
17	(5)	Review and determine additional needs for enforcement
18		of food waste diversion from the municipal solid waste
19		stream.
20	(d)	No later than twenty days prior to the convening of
21	the regul	ar session of 2017, the solid waste infrastructure

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1	advisory committee shall submit, to the subject-matter			
2	committees in the senate and the house of representatives that			
3	have jurisdiction over solid waste management issues, a report			
4	of its findings and recommendations, including the information			
5	identified in subsection (c).			
6	(e) Members of the solid waste infrastructure advisory			
7	committee shall serve without compensation but shall be			
8	reimbursed for all expenses necessary for the performance of			
9	their duties.			
10	(f) The solid waste infrastructure advisory committee			
11	shall be dissolved on January 1, 2025.			
12	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general			
13	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much			
14	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2016-2017 for the			
15	counties to comply with the new mandates imposed under this Act.			
16	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the counties for			
17	the purposes of this Act, in the following amounts:			
18	City and County of Honolulu \$			
19	County of Hawaii \$			
20	County of Kauai \$			
21	County of Maui \$.			

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- 1 SECTION 5. The legislature finds that the appropriations
- 2 to the counties under section 4 satisfies requirements under
- 3 article VIII, section 5, of the state constitution regarding the
- 4 sharing of costs for state-imposed mandates to the counties.
- 5 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2016.
