A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that sexuality health
- 2 education promotes healthy attitudes on adolescent growth and
- 3 development, body image, gender and sexuality, dating,
- 4 relationships, and family. The legislature also finds that
- 5 sexuality health education should positively affect adolescent
- 6 behavior and provide teens with the information, skills, and
- 7 support they need to develop positive values, make healthy
- 8 decisions, and respect the important role that sexuality plays
- 9 throughout a person's life. Within the past few years, several
- 10 states, including Hawaii, have enacted laws that require school
- 11 districts that teach sexuality health education to include age
- 12 appropriate, medically accurate health education. The
- 13 legislature finds that the effectiveness of sexuality health
- 14 education in Hawaii's schools could be bolstered by providing
- 15 clearer guidance on a comprehensive approach to sexuality health
- 16 education, greater flexibility in the implementation of the
- 17 curricula, and greater public access to the curricula.



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1	The	purpose of this Act is to:
2	(1)	Specify additional elements in Hawaii's sexuality
3		health education law, including additional criteria
4		regarding implementation of sexuality health education
5		instruction; and
6	(2)	Require the department of education to provide
7		information on the curricula to the public.
8	SECTION 2. Section 321-11.1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
9	amended to read as follows:	
10	"[+]	§321-11.1[+] Medically accurate sexuality health
11	education	. (a) Sexuality health education programs funded by
12	the State	shall provide medically accurate and factual
13	information that [is]:	
14	(1)	<u>Is</u> age appropriate [and includes];
15	(2)	<u>Includes</u> education on abstinence, <u>monogamy</u> ,
16		contraception, and methods of disease prevention to
17		prevent unintended pregnancy and sexually transmitted
18		disease, including human immunodeficiency virus[+];
19	(3)	Helps students develop relationships and communication
20		skills to form healthy relationships that are based on

1		mutual respect and affection and free from violence,		
2		coercion, and intimidation;		
3	(4)	Helps students develop skills in critical thinking,		
4		problem solving, decision making, and stress		
5		management to make healthy decisions about sexuality		
6		and relationships; and		
7	<u>(5)</u>	Encourages students to communicate with their parents,		
8		guardians, and other trusted adults about sexuality		
9		and intimate relations.		
10	(b)	Beginning with the 2016-2017 school year, each public		
11	elementar	y, middle, intermediate, high, and alternative school		
12	operated	by the department of education shall provide sexuality		
13	health ed	ucation described under subsection (a).		
14	<u>(c)</u>	At their own discretion, teachers may answer in good		
15	faith any	question initiated by a student or students that is		
16	reasonably related to and consistent with the material of a			
17	course provided pursuant to subsection (a).			
18	<u>(d)</u>	The department of education may eliminate or modify		
19	components of instruction under subsection (a)(2) in elementary			
20	school fo	school for reasons of age appropriateness.		

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- 1 (e) Sexuality health education under subsection (a) shall
- 2 not discriminate on the basis of sex, race, ethnicity, national
- 3 origin, disability, religion, sexual orientation, or gender
- 4 identity.
- 5 (f) The department of education shall develop, maintain,
- 6 and make available to the public a current list of sexuality
- 7 health education curricula that are consistent with the
- 8 requirements under subsection (a).
- 9 (g) Beginning on January 1, 2016, the department of
- 10 education shall provide to the legislature an annual report no
- 11 later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular
- 12 session, on the participation rates and outcomes of the
- 13 department of education's policy to allow parents to opt-in to
- 14 participate in sexuality health education programs in the
- 15 previous school year.
- 16 [\(\frac{(b)}{}\)] (h) For the purposes of this section:
- 17 "Age appropriate" means suitable to a particular age or age
- 18 group based on developing cognitive, emotional, and behavioral
- 19 capacity typical for that age or age group.
- 20 "Factual information" means medical, psychiatric,
- 21 psychological, empirical, or statistical information that is

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- 1 verified or supported by research conducted by recognized
- 2 medical, psychiatric, psychological, and public health
- 3 professionals or organizations.
- 4 "Medically accurate" means verified or supported by
- 5 research conducted in compliance with accepted scientific
- 6 methods and recognized as accurate and objective by professional
- 7 organizations and agencies with expertise in the relevant field,
- 8 such as the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention,
- 9 the American Public Health Association, the American Academy of
- 10 Pediatrics, and the American College of Obstetricians and
- 11 Gynecologists.
- "Sexuality health education" means education in any medium
- 13 regarding human development and sexuality, including education
- 14 on pregnancy, family planning, and sexually transmitted
- 15 diseases."
- 16 SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 17 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 18 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
