A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the University of
- 2 Hawaii center on aging is a key partner in the aging network and
- 3 provides consultation, research, and program development and
- 4 evaluation in collaboration with government and service
- 5 providers.
- 6 The legislature also finds that gerontological education
- 7 and workforce development are critical to preparing for the
- 8 State's aging population. Hawaii's population is aging at a
- 9 faster rate than the rest of the nation, and kupuna in Hawaii
- 10 have the highest life expectancy in the nation. Between 1980
- 11 and 2010, Hawaii's population of individuals age sixty and older
- 12 increased one hundred forty per cent. By 2030, it is expected
- 13 that twenty-three per cent of the State's overall population
- 14 will be older adults.
- 15 The legislature further finds that the development of
- 16 Hawaii's workforce to care for and address the needs of older
- 17 adults has not kept pace with the growing population of kupuna.
- 18 The University of Hawaii center on aging has recognized this gap HB493 SD2 LRB 16-2110.doc



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- 1 and will be well-equipped to address the need with two
- 2 additional faculty positions. Currently staffed by an interim
- 3 director and administrative assistant, the center on aging's
- 4 capacity to expand and create educational initiatives is
- 5 limited. An associate/full professor position and an
- 6 assistant/associate specialist position will enable the center
- 7 on aging to achieve its educational mission. Specifically, the
- 8 center on aging can develop and teach gerontology courses on
- 9 campus and provide continuing education and technical assistance
- 10 in the community. The development and teaching of gerontology
- 11 courses will be invaluable, enabling students from all
- 12 disciplines to view their studies with an aging lens and to
- 13 better prepare for, support, and address the needs of older
- 14 adults. Finally, the center on aging will be able to offer
- 15 opportunities for lifelong learning, continuing education, and
- 16 training for professionals in the aging network.
- 17 The purpose of this Act is to fund an associate/full
- 18 professor position and an assistant/associate specialist
- 19 position within the University of Hawaii center on aging.
- 20 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 21 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$86,532 or so much

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- 1 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2016-2017 to fund
- 2 one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) associate/full professor
- 3 position within the University of Hawaii center on aging.
- 4 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the University of
- 5 Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.
- 6 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 7 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$88,596 or so much
- 8 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2016-2017 to fund
- 9 one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) assistant/associate
- 10 specialist position within the University of Hawaii center on
- 11 aging.
- 12 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the University of
- 13 Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.
- 14 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
