

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO REMNANTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 The legislature finds that the definition of 2 the term "remnant" in section 171-52, Hawaii Revised Statutes, 3 along with broad interpretations of the definition, have led to confusion regarding its scope and applicability. This ambiguity 4 has resulted in a lack of transparency, as significant parcels 5 6 of public lands, including public land trust lands, have been 7 disposed of without legislative approval or public auction, 8 which otherwise would have been required. The legislature further finds that given the history and 9 10 sensitivity of land use and ownership in Hawaii, the limited 11 land resources of our island state, the state constitutional 12 requirement that ensures that public lands are held in trust for 13 subsistence, native Hawaiian cultural and religious purposes, 14 and for the benefit of future generations, it is necessary to clarify the definition of the term "remnant". 15

The purpose of this Act is to clarify the definition of the term "remnant" for purposes relating to the disposition of

3	SECT	ION 2. Section 171-52, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
4	amended by	y amending subsections (a) and (b) to read as follows:		
5	"(a)	Definition. The term "remnant" means a parcel of		
6	land that	serves no public purpose, economically or physically		
7	[unsuitab	le or undesirable], for present or future development		
8	or utilization as a separate unit by reason of location, size,			
9	shape, <u>liability</u> , or other characteristics[A] and the			
10	alienation of which has been deemed to not violate the State's			
11	mandate to conserve and protect its natural resources for the			
12	benefit of current and future generations. No land shall be			
13	determined to be a remnant [may be:] unless the land:			
14	(1)	[Land] Is acquired by condemnation [which] that is in		
15		excess of the needs for which condemned;		
16	(2)	[Vacated,] <u>Is vacated,</u> closed, abandoned, or		
17		discontinued road, street or alley or walk, railroad		
18		ditch, or other right-of-way[-]; or		
19	<u>(3)</u>	Has been determined by the attorney general to		
20		present, if retained by the State, a significant and		
21		unavoidable risk of liability beyond that generally		

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1		asso	ciated with undeveloped natural areas based on		
2		engi	neering reports, land surveys, or a history of		
3		inju	ries to persons or property specifically		
4		conc	erning the parcel being considered as a remnant.		
5	(d)	Disp	osition restriction. No parcel shall be disposed		
6	of as a r	remnant [solely]:			
7	(1)	Solely for the reason that it lacks an adequate			
8		acce	ss[-]; and		
9	(2)	Unle	ss the board finds that:		
10		(A)	The parcel does not contain natural or cultural		
11			resources necessary for the exercise of native		
12			Hawaiian subsistence, cultural, or religious		
13			practices pursuant to the state constitution;		
14		<u>(B)</u>	The uneconomic nature of the parcel is primarily		
15			attributable to circumstances beyond the State's		
16			control;		
17		(C)	There is substantial evidence in the record		
18			supporting the decision to dispose of the parcel;		
19			and		
20		(D)	No public purpose would be served by retaining		
21			the parcel."
