A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CLIMATE CHANGE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that there is 2 overwhelming evidence that human activities are altering the 3 earth's climate and that climate change will have significant 4 local and global health impacts. Climate change and related 5 health impacts transcend national borders and it is probable that climate change health impacts in other countries will 6 affect the health of people throughout the United States, 7 8 including Hawai'i. Famine, drought, extreme weather events, and regional conflicts, all likely consequences of climate change, 9 increase the incidence of disease and contribute to various 10 adverse health impacts, making it imperative to address climate 11 12 change at the national and local level. Climate change will 13 affect the health of people globally and in Hawai'i and it is 14 imperative to mitigate the health-related impacts.

15 The legislature further finds that as a result of Hawai'i's 16 unique geographic location and isolation, Hawai'i is particularly 17 vulnerable to the impacts of climate change, including



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1 contamination or decrease in the water, food, and energy supply. 2 Various potential health impacts of climate change include 3 respiratory allergies, airway diseases, food-borne diseases, 4 biotoxin exposure, heat-related illnesses, cancer, cardiovascular diseases, vector-borne diseases, and waterborne 5 diseases. Yet, Hawai'i's health community lacks the knowledge 6 7 and training required to prepare for and respond to various potential health impacts of climate change. 8 9 The purpose of this Act is to require the interagency 10 climate adaptation committee to: 11 (1) Assist with coordinating the implementation of climate 12 change policies developed by county, state, and 13 federal agencies; and 14 Prepare public health vulnerability and adaptation (2) 15 reports to assist the State's health professionals effectively and efficiently prepare for and respond to 16 17 various potential health impacts of climate change. 18 SECTION 2. Section 225P-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 19 amended to read as follows: 20 "[{] §225P-3[}] Interagency climate adaptation committee; 21 general functions, duties, and powers. (a) There is

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Report Title:

Interagency Climate Adaptation Committee; Duties; Reports

Description:

Requires the interagency climate adaptation committee to assist with coordinating the implementation of climate change policies developed by county, state, and federal agencies. Requires the committee to prepare public health vulnerability and adaptation reports to assist the State's health professionals effectively and efficiently prepare for and respond to various potential health impacts of climate change. (HD1)

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
