A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE REPEAL OF NON-GENERAL FUNDS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	SECTION 1. The purpose of this part is to repeal the
3	Captain Cook memorial fund.
4	The legislature finds that the fund is no longer necessary.
5	It has had no activity in recent years and a very small balance.
6	SECTION 2. Section 6E-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended to read as follows:
8	"[+]§6E-4[+] Administration. All state historic areas and
9	buildings surplus to the operations of the department of
10	accounting and general services shall be transferred by
11	executive order to the department[, except as provided in
12	section 6E 33]. All state projects and programs relating to
13	historic preservation shall come under the authority of the
14	department."
15	SECTION 3. Section 6E-33, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
16	repealed.



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1	[" [§6E-33] Captain Cook Memorial Fund. All moneys in the
2	Captain Cook memorial fund or which may be paid into the same
3	from the proceeds of sales or which may be received by way of
4	gift-or otherwise for any of the purposes provided by this
5	section, the acceptance of such gifts and the receipt of such
6	funds being authorized, shall be expendable by the comptroller
7	from time to time for any of the purposes provided by this
8	section, and any original historical documents or other
9	articles, or copies, facsimiles, or replicas thereof, so
10	collected, and copies of publications made under this section
11	shall be deposited in the archives of Hawaii to constitute a
12	collection to be known as the "Captain Cook Memorial
13	Collection".
14	The comptroller may purchase or otherwise acquire original
15	books, mementos, pamphlets, documents, or other articles of
16	historical value relating to the life of Captain James Cook, or
17	connected with the history, discovery, and exploration of the
18	Hawaiian Islands, or copies, facsimiles, or replicas thereof of
19	other data relating thereto, and prepare and publish in the
20	comptroller's discretion books, documents, pamphlets, or other
21	publications relating thereto.



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1	The comptroller may distribute free copies of such
2	publications to libraries, museums, and other places of
3	references open to the public in the United States or in other
4	countries, not to exceed, however, one third of the number of
5	copies of each-published. The remaining copies may be sold at
6	such reasonable prices as may be fixed by the comptroller, the
7	proceeds of such sales to be paid into the trust fund."]
8	PART II
9	SECTION 4. The purpose of this part is to repeal the
10	Kapolei recreational sports complex special fund.
11	The legislature finds that in 2002, the land originally
12	identified for the Kapolei recreational sports complex was
13	transferred to the University of Hawaii West Oahu, thus negating
14	the original purpose of the fund.
15	SECTION 5. Section 109-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
16	amended to read as follows:
17	"§109-3 Stadium special fund. There is created a special
18	fund to be known as the stadium special fund into which funds
19	collected by the authority shall be deposited[; provided that
20	all funds received pursuant to this section shall be kept
21	completely separate from the Kapolei recreational sports complex



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1	special fund. Moneys may not be transferred between the stadium
2	special fund and the Kapolei recreational sports-complex special
3	fund]. The stadium special fund shall be applied, used, and
4	disposed of for the payment of:
5	(1) The expenses of the operation, maintenance, promotion,
6	and management of; and
7	(2) All or a portion of the cost of financing any capital
8	improvement project for;
9	the stadium and related facilities; provided that all services
10	required for the stadium and related facilities shall be
11	performed by persons hired on contract or otherwise, without
12	regard for chapter 76; provided further that the authority shall
13	report to the legislature all receipts and expenditures of the
14	stadium special fund account twenty days prior to the convening
15	of each regular session."
16	SECTION 6. Section 109-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17	repealed.
18	[" [§109-9] Kapolei recreational sports complex special
19	fund. There is created a special fund to be known as the
20	Kapolei recreational sports complex special fund into which
21	funds-appropriated by the legislature, received pursuant to a



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1	management contract under section 109 2(3), or collected by the
2	authority from the operations of the Kapolei recreational sports
3	complex shall be deposited subject to contracts entered into
4	pursuant to section 109-2(3); provided that all funds-received
5	pursuant to this section shall be kept completely separate from
6	the stadium special fund. Moneys may not be transferred between
7	the Kapolei recreational sports complex special fund and the
8	stadium special fund The Kapolei [recreational] sports complex
9	special fund shall be applied, used, and disposed of for the
10	payment of:
11	(1) The expenses of the operation, maintenance, promotion,
12	and management of; and
13	(2) All or a portion of the cost of financing any capital
14	improvement project for;
15	the Kapolei recreational sports complex; provided that all
16	services required for the Kapolei recreational sports complex
17	shall be performed by persons hired on contract or otherwise,
18	without regard for chapter 76; provided further that the
19	authority shall report annually to the legislature all receipts
20	and expenditures of the Kapolei recreational [sports] complex



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1	special fund account no later than twenty days prior to the
2	convening of each regular session."]
3	PART III
4	SECTION 7. The purpose of this part is to address the
5	statewide geospatial information and data integration special
6	fund. More specifically, this part repeals the special fund and
7	requires that fees generated by the statewide geographic
8	information system program be deposited into the general fund.
9	The legislature finds that the statewide geospatial
10	information and data integration special fund is not necessary.
11	It has no balance or annual revenues.
12	SECTION 8. Section 225M-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
13	amended to read as follows:
14	"§225M-6 Fees for statewide planning and geographic
15	information system services and products. The office of
16	planning may charge fees for statewide planning and geographic
17	information system services and products. All fees collected
18	for statewide planning and geographic information system
19	analyses and other related services shall be deposited into the
20	[statewide geospatial information and data integration special]
21	general fund [for the sole purpose of supporting the statewide



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planning and geographic information system]. The office shall 1 adopt rules setting fees for statewide planning and geographic 2 3 information system services and products." SECTION 9. Section 225M-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 5 repealed. 6 ["[§225M-7] Statewide geospatial information and data integration special fund. (a) There is established in the 7 state treasury the statewide geospatial information and data 8 9 integration special fund, into which shall be deposited: (1) Moneys directed, allocated, or disbursed to the 10 statewide geospatial information and data integration 11 program from other government agencies or private 12 sources to help support the acquisition of hardware, 13 software, applications, and databases; 14 (2) Moneys directed, allocated, or disbursed to the 15 statewide geospatial technologies program from non -16 17 state sources, including but not limited to grants, awards, and donations; 18 (3) Moneys-collected as fees for statewide planning and 19 geographic information system services rendered; and 20



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1	-(4)-	Investment-earnings credited to the assets of the fund
2		and all interest on special fund balances.
3	-(d)	The statewide geospatial information and data
4	integrati	on special fund shall be used to help defray the cost
5	of, inclu	ding but not limited to the following:
6	(1)	Programs and activitics to implement this chapter,
7		including the provision of state funds to match
8		federal funds from the United States Geological Survey
9		or other federal-departments; and
10	(2)	Operating costs of the statewide planning and
11		geographic information system, including acquisition
12		and-maintenance of hardware or software necessary-to
13		implement this chapter, acquisition and maintenance of
14		geospatial and other data, application development,
15		training, and other products or services of general
16		benefit to the statewide geospatial information and
17		data integration program-and its stakeholders."]
18		PART IV
19	SECT	ION 10. The purpose of this part is to repeal the food
20	distribut	ion program revolving fund.

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1	The legislature finds that the revolving fund has no
2	balance or recent activity. Thus, the legislature finds that
3	the revolving fund is not necessary.
4	SECTION 11. Section 302A-1315, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
5	repealed.
6	[" \$302A-1315 Food distribution program revolving fund.
7	(a) There is established the food distribution program
8	revolving fund to be administered by the department.
9	(b) The food distribution program revolving fund shall
10	consist of:
11	(1) Administrative-fees collected by the department for
12	administering and operating the food distribution
13	program;
14	(2) All interest earned on the deposit or investment of
15	moneys in the food distribution program revolving
16	fund; and
17	(3) Any other moneys made available to the food
18	distribution program revolving fund from other
19	sources.
20	(c) The food distribution program revolving fund shall be
21	used by the department for the collection and disbursement of

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1	generated revenue to support the administration and operation of
2	the food distribution program pursuant to 7 Code of Federal
3	Regulations section 250.15.
4	(d)—The-balance in the food-distribution program revolving
5	fund shall not exceed \$2,000,000 to pay for services rendered by
6	state-contracted warehouses for the distribution of federal
7	commodity foods-to-the recipient agencies. Any moneys remaining
8	in the revolving fund in excess of \$2,000,000 at the end-of each
9	fiscal year shall lapse to the credit of the general fund."]
10	PART V
11	SECTION 12. The purpose of this part is to repeal the
12	career and technical training projects revolving fund for the
13	University of Hawaii at Hilo.
14	The legislature finds that the revolving fund is not
15	necessary.
16	SECTION 13. Section 304A-2268, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17	repealed.
18	["[\$304A-2268] Career and technical training projects
19	revolving fund; University of Hawaii at Hilo. There is
20	established the career and technical training projects revolving
21	fund for the career and technical training projects of the



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1	community colleges and the University of Hawaii at Hilo into
2	which shall-be-deposited-the-receipts from fees for services,
3	supplies, and use of equipment provided by or in connection with
4	these projects. Funds deposited in this account shall be
5	expended for vocational and technical training projects, and
6	supplies, equipment, and services related thereto."]
7	PART VI
8	SECTION 14. The purpose of this part is to repeal the
9	University of Hawaii alumni special fund.
10	The legislature finds that the special fund is not
11	necessary.
12	SECTION 15. Section 304A-2175, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
13	repealed.
14	[" [§304A-2175] University of Hawaii alumni special fund.
15	There is established the University of Hawaii alumni special
16	fund-into which-shall be deposited funds and proceeds received
17	by the university from alumni activities and donations from
18	alumni. Funds deposited into this special fund may be expended
19	by the university for all costs associated with conducting
20	alumni-affairs, activities, and programs for the university
21	system, including but not limited to expenses for honoraria,



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1	hotel and room rentals, food and refreshment, printing and
2	mailing, banners and signs, plaques and awards, airfare and per
3	diem, leis, rental of audiovisual, musical, and stage equipment,
4	and activity supplies and materials, without regard to statutory
5	competitive bidding requirements."]
6	PART VII
7	SECTION 16. The purpose of this part is to repeal the
8	animal research farm, Waialee, Oahu special fund.
9	The legislature finds that the special fund is not
10	necessary. The University of Hawaii has ceased operation of the
11	animal research farm.
12	SECTION 17. Section 304A-2177, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
13	repealed.
14	[" [§304A-2177] Animal research farm, Waialee, Oahu special
15	fund. There is established the animal research farm, Waialee,
16	Oahu-special fund for the animal research farm, Waialee, Oahu,
17	operated by the college of tropical agriculture and human
18	resources of the University of Hawaii, into which shall be
19	deposited the receipts from fees realized from the sale of
20	livestock, services, and supplies. Funds deposited into this



1	special fund shall be expended for animal research, and services
2	and supplies related thereto."]
3	PART VIII
4	SECTION 18. The purpose of this part is to address the
5	public health nursing services special fund, which is the source
6	of funding for the program providing case management services
7	for medically fragile children.
8	More specifically, this part repeals the special fund, but
9	retains the case management services program.
10	The legislature finds that the special fund has a
11	relatively low balance and minimal activity. Thus, the
12	legislature finds that the special fund is not necessary.
13	The legislature believes that case management services for
14	medically fragile children is worthy of continuation.
15	Accordingly, the legislature retains reference to the program in
16	statute and intends that it be provided with general funds.
17	SECTION 19. Chapter 321, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
18	amended by amending the title of part XXXV to read as follows:
19	"[{]PART XXXV.[] PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING SERVICES SPECIAL FUND]
20	CASE MANAGEMENT SERVICES FOR MEDICALLY FRAGILE CHILDREN"



1	SECTION 20. Section 321-432, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended to read as follows:
3	"[[]§321-432[]- Public health nursing services special
4	fund. (a) There is established within the state treasury a
5	special fund to be known as the public health-nursing services
6	special fund. The special fund shall be administered and
7	expended by the department of health in accordance with this
8	section.
9	(b)] Case management services for medically fragile
10	children. The department of health shall [expend the special
11	funds-to] provide ongoing case management services and [to
12	provide] staff training in case management services in
13	collaboration with the department of human services' medicaid
14	early and periodic screening, diagnosis, and treatment program,
15	including but not limited to:
16	(1) Assessment of children who are medically fragile to
17	determine service needs;
18	(2) Development of a specific care plan;
19	(3) Referral for and linkages to services to implement the
20	specific care plan; and
21	(4) Monitoring and follow-up.



1 [(c) The special fund shall consist of medicaid] Medicaid 2 reimbursements received by the department for case management 3 services provided to families of medically fragile children[-] 4 shall be deposited into the general fund." 5 PART IX SECTION 21. The purpose of this part is to repeal the 6 7 blind shop revolving and handicraft fund. 8 The legislature finds that the revolving fund has a 9 relatively low balance. Thus, the legislature finds that the 10 revolving fund is not necessary. 11 Although the revolving fund is repealed, this part retains 12 the department of human services' authority to provide the blind 13 workshop and home labor program using other sources of funding 14 to be determined under the executive budget process. SECTION 22. Section 347-12, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 15 16 amended to read as follows: 17 "§347-12 Blind shop [revolving] and handicraft [fund.] 18 program. The [department of budget and finance shall create and 19 maintain-a-revolving fund entitled "blind shop revolving-and handicraft fund". This fund may be used by the] department of 20 21 human services [for] may provide a workshop [purposes] or home



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1	labor [purposes] program for the blind or others, who, in the			
2	opinion of the department of human services, will [be benefited			
3	by-such] benefit from the experience [and all moneys in the fund			
4	may be expended for materials, machinery, and other facilities			
5	and for the erection, operation, and conduct of such workshops			
6	and for the payment of such compensation as the department of			
7	human services authorizes. All proceeds derived from the sale			
8	of products of the workshops or the home labor shall be			
9	deposited in the fund]. Under the program, the department may			
10	train blind or other persons to produce crafts and other			
11	products for sale.			
12	This section shall be subject to any federal policies,			
	rules, or regulations[, which] <u>that</u> may be applicable in order

20	SECT	ION 24. On June 30, 2015, all unencumbered balances
21	remaining	in the accounts and funds repealed by this Act shall



1 lapse to the credit of the general fund; provided that the 2 director of finance shall transfer the unencumbered balance in 3 the Captain Cook memorial fund to the state parks special fund. 4 PART XI 5 SECTION 25. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 6 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 7 SECTION 26. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2015. 8
